

RPM Updated to Near Newsletter Speed

RPM now comes to you so fast that the ink may still be wet when you get it. The news is now the very newest, and our Play Sheet programming guide is even more advanced than usual.

Programmers have been the first to tell us, that our "picks" don't miss and that the programming guide is used for programming new singles and new LPs. It isn't unusual to hear that DJs are reading direct from RPM, and our Star Line feature gives programmers insight into the biographical details of the artists whose records are reaching the top of the chart. US record companies watch RPM for early action of their discs in Canada, and record companies in Canada tell us that Canada is fast becoming a "fast breaking" market for new records, and many hits are originating in Canada.

Canadian programmers have made their mark on the international scene with many hits from Canada.

It was recently reported to RPM that a major label has set up a "finders system" in Canada to locate new masters fast for release in the US. A US publisher is planning a set up in Canada that will feed new material by Canadian composers to the US. It looks like Canada's music industry has focussed the eyes of the world on itself.

RPM Chart Now Torn Apart With Details

RPM's Cross Canada Chart Action now shows Canadian copyrights and the performance rights of originating Canadian material. As well this week we introduce a new feature. CCCA forthwith will also show domestic production to indicate which records were made in Canada. We hope to go one step further in the weeks to come to show which records are placed in the US for the sake of our many readers with US record companies who might be eyeing Canada for a master on the loose. There aren't too many of these nowadays.

RPM AWARD TO TOP CANADIAN DISC JOCKEY

For the past 11 months, RPM has been keeping tab on DJs across Canada, and along with the industry votes for the RPM Annual Awards, RPM will (on the basis of our calculations) for the first time this year pick a top CANADIAN air personality. The basis of our survey will be kept secret, but we have figured out a way of making this award that will definitely and unbiasedly give us a DJ award for the top CANADIAN air personality. All air personalities with Canadian stations will be eligible.

It was impossible to make this award a part of our ballot because Canada is so far-flung, and such an award would not be practicable on a national basis with so many regions, but our award will be based on Canadianism, promotional attitude, and influence in the industry.

All the winners will be announced in the January 17th edition of RPM.

Quality's Contest "Try This" Takes Off Across The Country

Ed Lawson's promo baby on "Hey Little Girl" by The Try This, sparked radio station enthusiasm and good listener reaction. Listeners were given clues as to the identity of the artist and those guessing correctly were awarded prizes of LPs. Now that the secret is out label copy will be changed and the artist Jimmie Cross given label credit. Jimmie first established himself with his controversial release of "I Want My Baby Back".

into #11 spot for Arc. Capitol again with the Young Canadians comes up with a "Joker" that may be a winner. And J.B. for RCA gets picks everywhere with "Poor Anne" (obviously not Patrician Anne who did real well). Chart listing of Canadian product is up 25% over a month ago with many more stations joining the race.

Robert B. Sour Elected President Of BMI (Canada)

Harold Moon, General Manager of BMI (Canada) announces the election of Robert B. Sour as President of BMI (Canada). Mr. Sour has also been elected to the Board of Directors of BMI (Canada). He is President as well as a Director of the Board of Broadcast Music Incorporated, New York, member of NARAS and CMA.

Mr. Sour first joined BMI as lyric editor back in February of 1940. His own compositions include "Body and Soul", "Walking By The River", "I See A Million People" and "We Could Make Such Beautiful Music Together", the latter being the first song in BMI's repertory.

Mr. Sour makes his home in New York city, is married, father of four and grandfather of two. He takes over this position left vacant by the tragic death of Judge Burton in Vancouver last March.



EASTERN CANADA: Raymond H. MacLeod, reviewer and entertainment columnist for The Halifax Herald, puts out a showbiz column that would make some of hogtown's columnists turn green with envy. From Ray comes news that Cathy MacKinnon has been signed for a week in January on NBC's Merv Griffen TVer. Cathy, who has had tremendous success with her Arc LP releases,

is also skedded for a taping of the Bell Telephone hour the latter part of this month. One of the big groups to put in an appearance in Halifax, The Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem, gave an interesting bit of info to Ray. They claim "there are only three types of songs in Ireland, and they all owe their existence to the British. The rebel ballads came from centuries of fighting John Bull, the laments from losing to him, and the drinking songs from trying to forget about him."

UPPER CANADA: Lynda Layne's promotional activities will now be looked after by The Fred White Publicity and Promotion company. Lynda has been active taping national TVers and making PAs in and around her hometown of Kitchener.

WESTERN CANADA: Wes Dakus fills us in on his label representation around the world. In the U.S. the Dakus releases are on Swan while Barry Allen is on Dot. Both Dakus and Allen releases are on Capitol in Canada and CBS in Europe. Wes Dakus' LP has been chalking up good sales in western Canada. Barry Allen releases his first Capitol album the first of the year. /// Kent Chauvin keeping tabs on Vancouver-town activities has it that The Rolling Stones show at the Agrodome was a sellout. Mad Mel made a brief re-

turn to the personality ring and emceed the show. Gary Lewis and The Playboys make the Vancouver scene Dec. 28. The Big "O" show, starring Roy Orbison and The Candyman, turned out to be a smash. The Queen Elizabeth Theatre will never be the same after these two successful shows. The activities were looked after by CKLG and included on the bill, Vancouver's own Chessmen and Little Daddy and the Bachelors. Vancouver's own Terry Black is getting good air exposure with his latest Arc release of "Poor Little Fool". The Town is still talking about the CKLG Mustang Hunt. Two lucky teenagers found the hidden keys in Stanley Park.

OTTAWA: By-Town's most aggressive and successful booking agency, The Leonard Alexander Agency, grabbed the Watchers away from hogtown and are making big stars of this Saint John group. Rumours have it that Terry Begley, a very hard working manager, may be looking after their affairs. On top of this the boys have been signed back into the Marquise Club in Ste. Eustache for a number of weeks. More bookings are in store for this great stage band. /// Sandy Gardiner, besides being the most informative of teen type columnists (Ottawa Journal), led a safari of himself and The Staccatos into hogtown this week and made the final preparations for the release of the next single and LP by the now nationally-known and successful Staccatos. 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APEX: The eyes and ears of the world are slowly turning toward Canada and with this event we are in need of a new breed of promotion and salesmen. Apex is all set for this impending invasion of Canada by Canadians. Al Mair is one of the most enthusiastic touters of Canadian talent we have come

across. He not only boosts talent from his own company (Compo) but always speaks well of competitive artists and groups. Latest from Al is that Montrealer Kenny Hamilton, doing nicely with "Dear Brothers", has been held over for 12 weeks at the Americana Hotel in Miami. With his success in the south comes his release in the US. Rumours have it that Kenny will also make an Ed Sullivan appearance. Hottest Canadian artist on the Apex roster is Gordon Lightfoot with his "Like Tom Thumb's Blues". Gordon moves into Miami for a one-niter this week. On the international front it looks like Sinatra all the way. Many stations across the nation are picking a day to salute this highly respected performer. The Kingston Trio are gaining ground with "Parchment Farm" as is Trini Lopez with "Sinner Man".

FRONTIER: This aggressive little record company out of Waterloo presents their best in Country, Western and Bluegrass which includes Nick Foley and The Rambling Esquires with "Green River Blues" — Bill Neat "A Rolling Stone Am I" — Rex Roat "Firin' The Strings" (inst) Stu Clayton "Little Artic Sweetheart" and "Unhappy Girl" by Phyllis Rice.

CAPITOL: The big news from Paul White is the excitement generated over the new LP release of the Beatles. A single will also be released before Christmas. "Like A Dribbling Fram" by Race Marbles, having been picked by the Frisco prophet is a sure bit for Canadian charts. Many stations across the nation are already giving chart room to this novelty number.

RCA: News from Stan Kulin has it that the DuCats have made a good showing in the Maritimes with good re-orders on their first outing of "Off The Hook" and "Good Thing Going". The boys, who hail from Newfoundland, will release an LP the first of the year. The first of the year is shaping up to be one of the largest of Canadian LP releases to date. Plans are now under way to release between 25 and 30. Newest Canada International artists are Montrealers Enzo Anthony and Therese Dero. Mama's & Papa's are the newest and hottest group for the Dunhill label. Their release of "California Dreamin'" could be a giant. The Playboys appear on an all Canadian bill at the Forum in Montreal Dec. 29. Dave Boxer hosts.

SPARTON: The latest Eurotone Series is

The new Beatle album "Rubber Soul" was debuted on WABC last week and caused sensational reaction. With Christmas almost around the corner,

WABC again plays Santa to their listeners. Moms and Dads send in post cards with their children's wishes. Several cards are selected and winners announced on the air. So far electric train sets, radios, model airplanes and doll houses have been awarded. "Ballad From Viet Nam" will be Mitch Miller's first for Decca. Ren Grevatt notes that the song, published in the U.S.A. by The Richmond Organization, was written by Pham Dhuy, foremost Vietnamese journalist, teacher, performer and folklore authority. English lyrics were supplied by Steve Addiss, who brought the song back to the U.S. Also from Grevatt news that Musicor Records star, Gene Pitney broke the record for this year's highest-grossing tour which was previously held by the Rolling Stones.

Bill Downs, heading up the successful Eskee label, is getting good Canadian reaction on "You Don't Mean Me No Good" by the Jelly Beans. Beau Hannon, who has been playing Canada for the past three years and is presently at the Fallsway Motel in Niagara Falls, will debut his Eskee disc the latter part of this month.

LOS ANGELES: Bob Marcucci sends news that his charge, Barry Young, has a big hit on his hands with "One Has My Name". Copies sold are already over the quarter million mark. A new LP release will be out for Barry on the Dot label featuring some of his own material but also including "Yesterday" and "Chapel In The Moonlight." Bob is now managing Lou Christie, who is presently making it with "Lightnin' Strikes". Lou is taping several west coast TVers during his stay in L.A.

one of the most interesting LP releases by far. "The Fiery Drums Of Africa" by Dinizulu and His Africans — "Mamusiu I Tatusiu" (Songs For Mom And Dad) by the Ed Zavaski Ork and "Kur Banguoja Nemunelis" (Where The Nemunas Flows) by Baritone Algero Brazis, should add that something different ingredient that programmers are looking for.

QUALITY: Sonny & Cher look good for chart action from coast to coast with "The Letter". The Len Barry outing of "Hearts Are Trump" gets good reaction as a strong follow-up to his "1-2-3". The "Hey Little Girl" by Try This is also gaining speed across the nation.

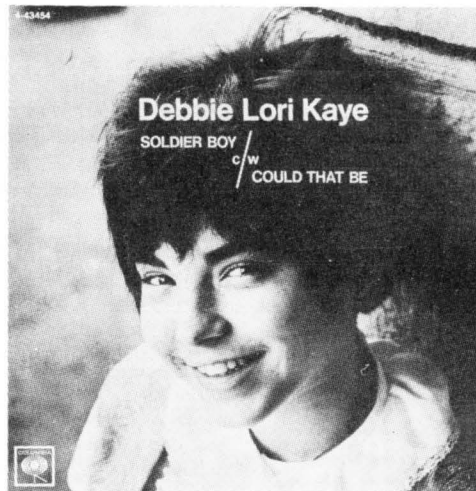

All new releases will be aired, both sides, then Calgary and area listeners will be asked to phone in their opinion as to what side or any other criticisms. Russ also intros his Canadian segment with a suitable fanfare. The Vernon singing talent will be available shortly when his "Ruf-Nec" LP is released on Rodeo. These are all original songs of the oil fields. /// Hank Secord is settling nicely into his new spot at CKRM Regina and appreciates the effort put forth by some record companies in supplying him with new releases. "Heartache No. 5" by Sharon Strong looks good at 'RM, as does Bert Cuff's "Seven Days A Week". The Earl Roach entry of "Christmas Roses" is also getting good listener response.

UPPER CANADA: Harry Burkman's Country Wide Music Survey out of CKOT Tillsonburg gives both sides of the Gary Buck Sparton release the nod. "Liza" and "Look Behind" have been steady chart climbers.
