CANADIAN COUNTRY SHAPES UP

The Canadian country market is now beginning to show signs of being in the competition race. Recordings of late have been on a highly competitive level and from reports of country radio personalities across the country they have never been so impressed with the quality of Canadian country recordings. George Taylor's Rodeo Record company has had a great deal of success with their recent singles and album releases. "Come Home Newfoundlander" by Tom Jim and Garth, although not strictly in the country vein, has seen action on charts from coast to coast. The Irwin Prescott single of "The Auctioneer" and his subsequent album release have been widely acclaimed and has established Irwin as a country artist to watch. Angus Walker, another Rodeo artist (on Melbourne) has also gained much recognition as an up and coming country singer. One of the newest gal country singer, Shirley Ann is now gaining country DJ fans across the country with her Melbourne single of "Turn Me Around". The Arc folks have hit a winning streak with their country artists as well. Phil Anderson, President of Arc, has found much more attention being given by Canadians to their Canadian country artists. Bert Cuff's single release of "Isle Of Newfoundland" has sold over 5000 in Newfoundland alone. Jimmy James, Donn Reynolds and Artie MacLaren have all experienced good reaction across the country. June Davey, who is the only English known female country artist in Quebec, has just released her Point album "Patsy Cline and Kitty Wells" which is certainly on a par with any of the foreign product available. Paul Menard, well known through his weekly appearances on CTV's "Country Music Hall" has just released his Point album "Paul Menard Plays Don Messer" and this too is comparable with anything on the market. Paul Menard, June Davey and Angus Walker, better known as The Hackamores, have been making the club scene in Toronto and Montreal and back many of the country records out of Montreal. They recently played Toronto's Edison Hotel and found that Toronto's downtown crowd were hip to the country sound. Paul has just left on a 9 day tour of the west, kicking off the junket in Calgary April 25. Menard is no stranger to the air waves, having been a member of the Bobby Hill show for the past five years. This show was heard through the week on the CBC Trans Canada Network. There is much more to come from the Canadian country scene. Watch for Doug Trineer's release of "Green Beret" and "Doug Trineer Sings The Golden Hits". Bruce Shaver, prexy of Bison Records out of Aylmer, Ontario, has just sponsored a Nashville session for Odie Burkman with release skedded for the early part of May. Frontier Records is also beginning to feel its oats with Scotty Gibbs getting set for his album release. As far as group singers are concerned, Melbourne's Rhythm Pals, are probably the most popular. Their recent releases have been given exposure on country, GMP and MOT stations from coast to coast. Capitol Records has also shown an interest in the Canadian country scene with their recent signing of Gary Buck.


BARRY ALLEN To Tour East

Edmonton: Alberta's favourite son, Barry Allen moves into Upper Canada for a series of oneniters and television appearances. His latest Capitol single "Love Drops" has been charted on stations from coast to coast with the exception of large cities at the extreme ends of Canada. Both Vancouver and Halifax have ignored this ready made chart item. Red Robinson of CFUN and the CBC's TVer "Let's Go" is reported as having expressed an opinion that Canadian records are being held back and gaining recognition as regional hits only rather than being given the chance to compete on a national basis. Frank Cameron who is with CHNS radio in Halifax is also host of a CBC "Music Hop" show and in an excellent position to give that needed boost to national artists as well as to those on the local scene.

CANADIAN GROUPS LIMITING USE OF CANADIAN MATERIAL



COLUMBIA'S LARRY LEE JUMPS FOR CHART


Columbia's Bob Martin has begun a series of promotional activities to kick off the single release of "Toodle Oo Kangaroo" by Larry Lee & The Leesures. Also from Columbia comes the sure hit of "Rainy Day Women" by Bob Dylan who seems to keep popping back just when he has been supposedly pegged out. Stations from coast to coast have "picked" and "chartlisted" this best Dylan yet. With Gene Pitney's appearance throughout Upper Canada, April 30 to May 2nd, radio stations are on the Pitney kick which should result in better than average record sales. The newest by Bobby Kris and The Imperials "She Belongs To Me" is Canada's first "ragarock" produced single and should see chart action for The Imperials. In the easy listening field, Columbia's release of "Color Me Barbra" by Barbra Streisand is bound to be a must for GMP stations across the Dominion, as well as Eydie Gorme's latest "Don't Go To Strangers" which has already been given the nod by US trades.



EDITORIAL - NEW YORK DECISION ON RCMP RECORD

RPM was recently accused of ignoring the current controversy on the Centennial recording planned for the RCMP band and apparently vetoed by the AFM in New York. Canada's press, radio and television have given much space to this item. In every account the blame was laid to the AFM in Canada.

The neglected factor in this case is that it was the NEW YORK office of the AFM that refused permission to the record company involved, not the Canadian branch. According to reports reaching RPM, the Canadian branch of the AFM has no say in the matter. The fuss over this current incident is not justified in that much of what can or cannot happen in Canada in the music industry is decided by New York because of the constitution of the AFM which each Canadian member of the AFM has signed and become a party to. This is just one of many such instances which have harnessed the Canadian music industry. Some attempt should be made by Canadian union members to place these decisions in the hands of Canadians in Canada. Since they are citizens of Canada working in Canada, the Canadian executive should make a Canadian decision on this Canadian matter. Canadian musicians should make moves to make their union. Canadian, There are already strong indications that many members are anxious to push for this change.



BAD CEDES TO PLAY HUBARDS SHORE CLUB

Halifax: Ray MacLeod, showbiz touter for the Halifax Chronicle, has it that the popular East Coast rockers, The Bad Cedes, will be resident summer group for the well known Hubbards Shore Club, just outside Halifax. The Bad Cedes, Brian Ahearn, Jami e Piers, John Redmond, Ken Tobias and Bruce MacFarland are experts in the way-out swing folk music, and apparently have many original works that impressed U.S. recording brass. The Flamingo has turned to local talent with the appearances of Dick Fry, Graham Bowser and The Scotians. Adam Timoon is also set for an appearance. Popular Halifax acts back on the circuit again are Ernie Barry and Maria Elena at The Candlelight. Mel Howard also makes a return, possibly with a group although he is preferred as a single-o. Bucky Adams has apparently picked up two sidemen from Montreal and has opened at The Black Knight with Go Go gal Mary Ann Hanah, Dick Byrne is one of the most popular performers at The Privateer. His song, "Corina" which he originally penned for The Five Sounds is one of the most asked for songs in the Halifax area. Frank Cameron of CHNS radio has apparently tabbed it a "sure hit" if recorded.

THE COMPO COMPANY COULD SCORE WITH KELLY & GAIL

"Falling Sugar" by Kelly & Gail has had a resurgence of popularity and for this reason it goes back on the RPM 100. This Colpix release has been somewhat of a sleeper but is now beginning to pick up action stateside and could be a giant for producer Bob Marcucci. Following her "Boots" success. Nancy Sinatra is again setting records for instant chart listings of her newest on Reprise "How Does That Grab You Darlin". Trini Lopez is also setting his sights on the upper portion of the charts with his "I'm Coming Home Cindy''. Ronnie Dove's recent ap-pearance at Toronto's Embassy has boosted record sales of his "Let's Start All Over Again" Danny Harrison, one of Upper Canada's favourites and now making his home in Nelson B.C. and just as popular there, has just released his Coral single of "Girl Girl Girl" and from all reports this "raga-rock" entry is well on it's way to scoring much chart action. Still the big seller with The Compo folks is Petula Clark and her latest "A Sign Of The Times". Her album "My Love" is selling like a single and getting "picks" on both MOT and GMP stations.

RUSSELL ENTERPRISES SLATED TO BOOST QUID

Victoria: Russ Freethy, prexy of Russell Enterprises, was so knocked out over the Eagle release of "Crazy Things" by The Quid that he has begun a promotion to boost this Winnipeg produced disc, up and down the West Coast.



Denny Millar of CFNB Radio Atlantic (Bridgewater, Nova Scotia) has been chosen "DJ Of The Month" in the May issue of "Teen Life", an American monthly publication on the pop music field. The information was apparently sent to the mag by one of Denny's fans, name of Bonnie Havill, who wrote a pretty fair evaluation of her "fave DJ".

The dance scene in Moose Jaw has picked up to a furious pace according to CHAB's Ted Hockaday. The Temple Gardens is the scene of a wild live broadcast over CHAB every Thursday night. The Gardens feature "Canada's Most Repulsive Band", Mozart and The Wolfgang. Ted also has news of the success sound of The Troubadors Three from Saskatoon. Their limited release of "Every Nite" is getting local exposure. The weaker sex are having a field day in Vancouver, thanks to Peggy Keenan,

Promotion Manager of CKLG, who has been pushing the kitchen crowd along with the theatregoers and clothes fanciers. The second CKLG Theatre Party which was sponsored by Eaton's featured a demonstration of natural gas cooking, starring B.C. grown chicken combined with Delta Rice recipes and cooked on Tappan-Gurney gas ranges. The show took place at the Orpheum Theatre with CKLG awarding a prize a minute beginning at 10 AM. 60 prizes in all were given out including certificates from Grassie Jewellers and spring hats from Camille Hat Shop. The grand prize was an RCA Victor stereo combination set. CKLG again held its "Crazy Hat" contest which was so popular at the Feb 18 Party. The show was delayed for an hour while the strong arm of the law gave protection to Lewis and emcee Collins. The show also starred The S'Quires, Barry Allen, Wes Dakus and The Rebels. The Guess Who's made the scene at the Calgary Gardens April 14 through the efforts of the Calgary Demoley. April 22 Johnny Rivers and his Go Go Bat Girls moved into the Calgary Stampede Corral. CFAC has been giving good exposure to the better Canadian releases including "Devil To Angel" by The Allan Sisters. "That's Why I Love You" by Joey Hollingsworth. The Rhythm Pals' "Big Lazy Old River" and "Ann" by The Courriers.

Terry "D" Mulligan telephoned the news that CJME's presentation of Wes Dakus, Barry Allen and The Guess Who drew 1200 Queen City Bubble-gummers. Morris Marshall, former Champ guitarist, appeared with The Guess Who. Rod Kennard and The T.K's, The "D" Men and The Chevrons are local groups now making the popularity scene. Local bands are being featured on CJME each Saturday afternoon from the Double Go Seven Discotheque. Simpson's Sears are apparently ready to experiment with teen groups.




