Bob Martin just back from the CCBA convention in Niagara Falls reports great reaction on the appearance of The Travellers. Also starting to show strong for Columbia is a new single by Canadian Ronnie Fraser "Stop Look Listen". This one has jumped on the CHOK Sarnia chart. The Sandy Selsie newie "There Was A Night On The Water" is also showing moves to chart action and is "pick" of the week at C-HOW Welland.

Paul White of Capitol comes out with a real helper to radio stations this week with his "Sizzle Sheet". A list of the Beatle numbers, who wrote them and sings them. We were surprised to see so many well known writers represented such as Meredith Wilson, Bacharach, Scott and Marlow. Paul is getting ready for the onslaught of English concerts and will be off to Montreal for the opening show of the Dave Clark Five, which will also see their new single "Everybody Knows" on most of the charts across Canada. The Esquires have just released another single "So Many Other Boys" and this one could be the one that makes it for them. They will also be appearing with the Dave Clark Show. As a matter of fact when the Clark show hits Toronto it will be the first time any big name in the industry has appeared with so many of the local talent. We understand there will be at least six groups as well as Bobby Curtola.

RCA Victor is bringing out a "Canada-International" release. The release contains ten albums, seven from Canada and one each from Italy, France and The West Indies. Featured artists include Paul Anka, Paolo Noel, Maurice Chevalier and Phil Nimmons plus the Band of the Royal 22nd Regiment (Van Doos) and the steel drum band of Frankie Francis. John Gary will be releasing his "Christmas Album" soon and the lineup of selections looks great. One in particular "White Christmas". We mentioned last week to watch out for the Lorne Green single "Ringo". Several stations have picked and a few have charted this disc.

It takes two to play the publicity game. Many radio stations and columnists have written to complain about the lack of public relations from artists and groups. We were asked about a group from Edmonton called the Chieftones. A writer from a large magazine would like to do an article on this and other groups in Canada but she can't seem to get any cooperation. We have the same problem, sometimes it takes a great deal of digging to find out any news about a group. For instance, the Chieftones have supposedly signed with a Memphis Recording Company. This is news. We would like to hear more.

Walt says..

A FUNNY THING HAPPENED ON THE WAY TO THE PRINTER. In an unprecedented wave of activities with radio stations this week, we at RPM were stunned by telephone calls and letters from radio people regarding two subjects. One, a recent article on the industry by a disc jockey, and the other, a flood of enquiries as to "What Can Our Station do to help the music industry in Canada?" This whole newly aroused interest in Canada comes as a bit of a blow. Why have stations suddenly become aware of product that has been in existence for at least the past two years? Many stations have been doing more than submitting their charts. Now an accompanying list of "picks" (Canadian) and playlist singles (Canadian) are arriving in the mail as well. Radio stations heretofore not heard from are suddenly interested in letting us know of their pro-Canadian activity.
Strangely enough, one of the "greats" of the in-

dustry predicted this turn of events last September. Further, it is happening in exactly the way described. At the same time, one Canadian producer has been swamped with offers to "pick up" his Canadian mas-ters for release in the US, and a BIG MONEY deal is pending, that may make Canada a major contributor on the world music scene.

THIS TYPE OF ENCOURAGEMENT and interest is what is needed to spark the interest of the buying public where lies the real support of our industry, but first things FIRST EXPOSURE.

Frank had his listeners telephone the station to talk to Bobby. The lines were jammed for an hour. His new release "Alone and Lonely" is already getting terrific reaction in Halifax. "I'm Sorry" by Donald Lautrec is also getting considerable air play. "Unless You Care" by Terry Black has been number one for two weeks. Frank notes that the Maritimes stations were the first to list this record in the top ten. Frank also has a beef. Not enough stations playing Shirley Matthews' new single "Feel So Pretty" and not enough literature being released about Canadian artists.

Bob Wood at CKCK Regina reports "Las Vegas Scene" getting good air play and feels this one should be in the top 25 before too long. Bob is getting heavy phone response on the new Lorne Greene outing "Ringo". "Automatic reaction" by Nino & Ebbtides is slow but it's starting to move "Leader of the Pack". Looks like it's going to be, should make it easy to the top 5. Hank Snow, Wilf Carter,

Kitty Wells and Tennessee Mountain Boys played in Regina Oct. 10 to 2 packed houses. Next in line for appearance is Roger Miller.

Congratulations to Johnny Murphy new Music Director at CFGM.

The columnist can get away with it but it will be amusing to see the fancy footwork of the radio station when the Rolling Stones' single "Time Is On My Side" hits the top of the charts.

The CHED Good Guys have a new twist in Battles coming up. It's the "Battle of the Bands", with the CHED Marksmen, The Pharaohs, New CHED Excels, Joan Miciak and Pat Harris. All this talent in one nite.

CJME Regina shows 9 Canadian content singles on their chart this week. Somewhat of a record record.

CHSJ in Saint John shows 7 Canadian records this week including 1st, 2nd and 3rd spots. This is also a record. Bob Gibbons (Rockin' Robert) at CHSJ writes that the Bobby Curtola show sas a sellout.

Nice to hear from the folks up CJKL way. This Kirkland Lake station is celebrating it's 30th anniversary this year.

Phyllis Marshal Day was celebrated in Montreal by CJAD and from all reports Phyllis won her way into the hearts of broadcasters in Ottawa as well. Her new LP "That Girl Phyllis Marshall" on Columbia is Pick album of the week at CKEY Toronto.

Bruce Ruggles at CFCH North Bay has an interesting feature each nite called "Spotlight" which gives info on recording stars, their age, where they were born etc. Bruce also has a Sunday afternoon show called RPM.

The Newbeats "Everythings Gonna Be Alright" will be appearing at the Club 888 in Toronto Friday Oct. 30. The Regents who appear regularly at Club 888 have just released their new disc on Quality "Nite Train to Tunisia" f/s "Dance of the Ookpiks".

"I DON'T THINK WE GOT THAT RECORD"

Every day all over Canada the mail arrives at radio stations and in it often can be found the HITS OF TO-MORROW or an important new release. Days or weeks later an angry phone call or letter goes out to a record company complaining about the record not being received.

This week RPM went out into the field to investigate the "missing promo copy". And we have come up with a great

number of facts.

An official of the post office department insists the records arrive at their destination. What happens to them after that is anyone's guess. "Often bags of contest letters go to the station, and if a parcel, check, or letter is in the contest mail, and it gets thrown out after the winner is selected, then the station is just out of luck.' He went on to say, "Shortage of postage still gets the mail there (regardless of class) and it is either refused, or a fine charged and left." He mentioned "dead letters" and assured us that if there is a return address these are returned. One company official told us that he had never seen a record returned because the disc jockey it was addressed to had left or had died.

The Post Office Act makes it illegal to open mail (regardless of class) that is not addressed to you. An ex-D.J. told us about the mail sitting around in reception areas (mentioning particularly promo records) that could easily be picked up by anyone. Librarians admitted there was a bad situation in keeping all the records received together. "Too many people have access to the library". One radio station has an elaborate system of keeping all new releases for 90 days filed by artists name. Same librarian found six "dogs" I requested in

WHERE IS THE REAL PROBLEM? Not with the record company. Not with the post office, but with the radio station itself. Possibly our investigation might improve the situation.

They produced Connie Francis' latest release, "Don't Ever Leave Me", giving her the strongest record she's had in many a moon.

Sammy Davis, looking and feeling fine, despite his nightly performances on the stage in "Golden Boy", recorded a beautiful new version of the Tony Bennett hit, "Who Can

I Turn To" for an album.

Few people know that Jay and the Americans were talking of splitting right before the release of their hit, "Come A Little Bit Closer". There's nothing like having a hit when things seem to be going all wrong.

Joey Reynolds reports Dick Contino was sensational on his (Joey's) TV show. Dick's latest Dot LP is called "Dick

Contino on Stage".

Record companies are beginning to look more often to the independent producer than before. Al Kasha, who just recorded Peggy Lee "Talk To My Baby" will soon be recording Nancy Ames for Liberty. Strong indications of the same trend in Canada for producers.

Waiting to break big on the charts is "Right Or Wrong"

by Ronnie Dove and "Cindy Go Home" by Paul Anka.

Julie London will record an album backed by the swingin' Richard Wess band. Talking about swingin' bands, be sure to pick up the new Timi Yuro LP on Philips. You'll hear Bobby Scott's arrangements groovin' in the background.

Some surprise swingings...Bobby Rydell to Capitol. Up until a month ago, a deal was being negotiated with Columbia...Stu Phillips back to Colpix. Stu left Capitol to return to his old home because he wanted to do more motion picture

scoring.

The Animals were surprisingly professional on the Ed Sullivan show (Oct. 19). They didn't seem to have any audio

trouble and the group's overall sound was great.

The follow-up to "I'm On The Outside Looking In" by Little Anthony and the Imperials is a blockbuster. It has the feel of a Burt Bacharach record. Diane Renay makes a style change on her next record. Only time will tell whether record buyers want the old or the new Diane. Looks like a Top Ten record for Diane.


JACOBSON

Stanley David Jacobson, Producer of Canada's Top TV teen show "Music Hop" was born in Saint John, New Brunswick. At 34, youthful Jacobson has a vast background of writing, producing, and directing that ranges from summer stock to repertoire theatre and on to television and television

spectaculars.

Jacobson wrote the TV series for young people "While We're Young" in 1960 for the CBC and in '61 the "Tommy Ambrose Show". In '62 Jacobson produced and directed independently "The Billy O'Connor Show". He has come to specialize in music shows and as well as his current very successful "Music Hop", on November 9th the CBC will show "The Hank Snow Country Special" directed, produced and written by Jacobson.

Jacobson is revered by young talent because (while others have turned their backs on young artists) Stan has opened the door to develop the talent we will need in years to come as the music and television industries grow. As one observer put it "he's opened the eyes of the public to what we can do, because he is doing it...with young people, our young people.



For Good Music Stations we can highly recommend the new Phyllis Marshall LP on Columbia "That Girl" and the Courriers "From Sea To Sea" on RCA plus a single by Greg Hamon "Amelia" (Bigland) that seems to be getting more air play in the Toronto area every day. These are all Canadian content recordings. These are the newest releases but are not by far the only recordings suitable for GMP stations (see Canadian Content).

George Wilson at CKFH recommends very highly the new John Gary LP "So Tenderly" on RCA Victor also "Deep

Velvet" by George Shearing on Capitol.

Helen Hatton of CHUM-FM has just received two LP's of the new RCA Victor Canada-International series and will be reviewing both of these this coming week. "Music In The Round' with the Cable Concert Band directed by Howard Cable which includes a Suite of Dances from "Alls Well That Ends Well" and "Stratford Fanfares" both written by Canadian Louis Applebaum. The LP also includes Howard Cable's "Newfoundland Rhapsody" plus "Round Dance" by John Weinzweig and the RCMP Regimental March written by Chas. O'Neil. The second LP is "Souvenir of Quebec" with the Cable Concert Band directed by Maurice De Celles and includes "March Narechal Du" written by Emilien Ellard. Both these LP's are 100% Canadian content. Helen also mentions the Columbia release of "The 3rd. Symphony of Leonard Bernstein" (Kaddish), written in memory of President Kennedy. Helen also recommends as a must for programming, the new John Vickers LP on RCA which is being hailed by critics as "The most Caruso like voice since Caruso". Telefunken will soon be releasing "The Old Works" which will be handled by London. This is one release that Helen is anxiously waiting for.

The Gaslight Singers (Mercury) are getting a great deal of airplay in the Toronto area of late. These three folk singers have been making the rounds of important TV shows south of the border and gradually their popularity is becoming nation-wide. This LP should be of particular interest to Canadians, the founder and lead is Canadian Earl Zimmerman.

"Cherry Bough" one of the most popular cuts on the Courriers LP "From Sea To Sea" (RCA) will be released shortly as a single. Tune was written by Russell Kronick,


one of the Courriers.

Soon to be released is another fantastic LP from Johnny Mathis "Ballads Of Broadway" (Columbia) and the new Randy Sparks LP "The Back Porch Majority" on Epic. Randy, who at one time was the lead for the new Christy Minstrels has put together this three girl, four man group and could score big. If you like bossa nova type music then look forward to the new Capitol outing of Laurindo Almeida's "Guitar From Ipanema". Remember how big "Ebb Tide" was? The most popular version was by Frank Chacksfield. He has just released "The New Ebb Tide" on London which is part of the new Phase Four series and scoring very well across the country.

David Clayton Thomas is a rugged 23 year old Toronto singer who literally burst into prominence with his recent recording of "Boom Boom", which experienced considerable chart action. David has been much in demand as a "hop" artist for several years. Not only in Toronto but over most of Upper Canada. "Boom Boom" catapulted him into record prominence.

David wrote his latest side "Barby Lee" his first effort at songwriting. Soon he will be appearing with the Dave Clark Five on their Canadian tour which will include Toronto and London Ontario. David's group The Fabulous Shays have had much to do with the success of David. He readily admits that without this tight knit group his job would be much more difficult.

David has appeared many times on television and more appearances are on tap including network shows.



Country Music Stations because they are classed as such, many times miss out on singles that could very easily be classified as having "that Nashville Sound" and could invariably be a factor in the record becoming a hit. We have, on occasion heard records on CFGM that definitely are not country in the broadest sense but they do have the Nashville flavor. One example is "Jolie Jacqueline" which appeared on most country charts. The imaginary barriers between pop and country are no longer there.

The biggest country show of the year hit Kitchener last week with Buck Owens, George Jones, George Morgan and Marion Worth and the one who is reported to have been tops in popularity Roger Miller.

A new Chex-Mate in Peterboro looking after the country show is Sean Eyre. His show "Sunshine Sean".
