

Cam Finley of CJBQ Belleville informs us of a recently launched popular music show covering the Quinte area. This is a drastic change from their standard format of adult programming, but it is being well received from both a teen and adult point of view. It's encouraging to hear news of changes such as this. Many who claim to be "family stations" rarely program for the teenager.

GARBAGE ONE MAN'S OPINION

In a recent article in the Toronto Telegram's supplement "After Four", Bob McAdory, disc jockey at CHUM, writes about "Garbage! That's What They'd Have Me Play - Pure Garbage". He goes on to say "Canadian disc jockeys are getting a little tired of the wailing, whining, and moaning of record companies that they are not promoting Canadian talent". He emphasizes that Canadian deejays would give preference to a Canadian artist "providing that the record is good." And he demands that the record be "good "good." enough to compete with anything that's produced anywhere." Taking a positive approach he goes on, "This rarely happens."

He takes a full swing at the entire Canadian industry with the exception of three records and generalizes "You'd be amazed at some of the unbelievable garbage that is produced in this country". In a comment on Canadian talent he asks comically "This is ta-

lent?"

We are in complete agreement with these comments which reemphasize our stand that records must be judged on their own merits. However, the word "garbage" in reference to Canadian records might be considered very poor taste. Some may feel this article seems to be designed to undermine the entire industry. It suggests that overnight we compete with the world for perfection. To say this article and such thinking might "kill" the industry is an understatement. The word that comes to mind is "murder".

This could well set the industry back two years, and one might ask "Can a responsible radio station, program Canadian content safely?" Possibly McAdory has hit the nail on the head, and possibly many can learn from his comments that in a country where it is suggested there is NO Payola, the investment of money and time is wasted on a music industry.

The article is very thought provoking, and possibly many of us should take heed of the standards by which product will be judged. Keeping in mind that we are competing against 30 years of experience in recording, and studios that are valued at \$500,000 to \$750,000. It therefore stands to reason that it will take that much

skill, that much money, and that much time to become competitive.

The policies of Canadian stations, and programmers are strange, and it is questionable what constitutes a HIT record, and talent. Essentially radio stations are not in the record business, and merely use records as a convenience to programming. The record industry should be indeed grateful to radio stations for playing their records.

In view of this article, everyone in the industry might take the next two weeks to consider the value of continuing in the Canadian

music business or possibly to forget the whole thing.

GARBAGE? TALENT? Then why are American companies interested in Canadian artists and Canadian productions?? Obviously they are trying to buy our . . . GARBAGE????

DATELINE NEW YORK by Harriet Wasser

First let me say how pleased I am to be writing for RPM from New York. I consider this quite an honour and this column will give me a chance to get news to you as soon as it happens . . if not sooner. Although much of what goes on in the music industry stems from many American production centres, New York is regarded as the "heart" of the music business. I hope you find this column informative.

The most talked about record on the scene right now is "Leader of the Pack" by the Shangri-las. The question asked most often (even by people who haven't heard the record) is, "Have you heard the new Shangri-las' record?

It's a smash!"

Although a lot of American publishers and record producers are finding the going rough because of the British craze, many of them are enjoying their greatest success due to unexpected releases. Today a publisher prays for a smash in England knowing the record will then be released in the US. There are American publishers enjoying the success of The Beatles, The Animals et al, in a way that would never have been possible before.

A very talented folk singer by the name of Bonnie Dobson will be recording shortly for Mercury Records here. Many people think she has the potential of a Joan Baez.

Bonnie is a Canadian girl.

It's wonderful to realize that records like "On The Street Where You Live" by Andy Williams and "Funny Girl" by Barbara Streisand can get played on all the "Top 40" stations and that "Summer Song" by Chad and Jeremy and Elvis' "Ask Me" can get exposure on many of the "good music" stations.

Don Costa, who travels more than any ten people is very excited about an LP by Kathy Keegan, soon to be released on his DCP label. Kathy was the first person ever to record the song "Good Life". As a result of her record,

the song was picked up by other artists.

"Shindig" was highly praised by the TV critics here, proving that even a show geared at a teenage audience can be accepted by adults. This would seem like the perfect show to showcase Terry Black. If ads are any indication of a company's interest in a record, it should be said that Interphon (a division of Vee Jay) Records is doing a fine job for Terry's current release "Unless You Care". It's the top Canadian record.

Already starting to break big on charts is "The Things In This House" by Bobby Darin, also "I Won't Tell" by

Tracey Dey.

Bob Crewe returned from England with the happy news that "Rag Doll" was the #3 record over there. The group had not had a big hit in England since "Walk Like A Man".

MAN of the WEEK

GORDON FREDERIC KEEBLE



Gordon Frederic Keeble has been broadcasting for 30 years. He began in 1934 as a freelance actor and vocalist in Toronto. He was an announcer at CFCH (North Bay), CHEX (Peterboro) and CKGB (Timmins).

In 1942 Keeble became an announcer-producer at the CBC in Toronto. He rose to chief announcer with the Dominion network. In 1946 he became Radio Director of F. H. Hayhurst Advertising in Toronto which gave him broad experience in the broadcasting field.

In 1948 Keeble took over as station manager of CFCF, Montreal. CFCF rose to greater heights under Keeble.

In 1950 he became executive V-P and G.M. of S.W. Caldwell Ltd., in Toronto directing operations. His special interest was closed-circuit television and kine recording.

In 1961 CTV Television network was formed and Keeble became executive V-P.

One of the original members of ACTRA, President of the CCBA, his interest in classical music came naturally, he spent four years studying piano at the Royal Conservatory of Music under Boris Berlin.

GMP

Ed Preston of CHML Hamilton reports his station has got the "Fair Lady" bug with the Columbia release, but also finds very interesting the Capitol release of "Rock Swing and Dance To My Fair Lady" by The Gallants (recommended for rock stations who would like to program good music but are afraid of losing listeners). Ed also recommends the Harry Simeone Choral "Accent On Youth" particularly the "Dum" cut.

Dave Amer from CHFI recommends as very good listening the new Phyllis Marshall LP "That Girl" on Columbia and the Capitol release of Gordon McRae and Dorothy Kirsten "Kismet". Dave is also impressed with the Smothers Bros. release of "It Must Have Been Something I Said".

George Wilson of CKFH finds easy listening with "Love Goddesses" by Percy Faith on Columbia and "By Special Request" by Trios Los Panchos also on Columbia. Great for programming is the new "Buddy Greco On Stage" on Epic and "Kismet" with Gordon McRae, Dorothy Kirsten and Roger Wagner Choral.

Art Collins, CFRB highly recommends the Capitol release of "Deep Velvet" with George Shearing and the Woodwin Choir, particularly the cuts "Passing By" and "Sentimental Journey". Art is also impressed with the "50 Fabulous Years" on UA. by the Leroy Holmes Ork. This LP takes in 5 decades of great music from the 20's to the 60's, beginning with the "Charleston" and ending with "Blowing In The Wind". Single-wise Art recommends the new Andy Williams "On The Street" (Columbia) and the Roger Williams "Whistl'n" on Kapp. This tune was composed by Williams and is just great for GMP programming time 1:40. Another pleasant single is "I See You" by Cathy and Joe (Merc) and "See-saw" by Jerry Murad's Harmonicats on Columbia and still with Columbia the new Barbara Striesand "Absent Minded Me" which was written by Julie Styne and Bob Merrill. Getting close to the rock field Art finds easy listening with the new Cliff Richard single "Fall In Love With You" on Capitol.

For exceptionally good listening we recommend the new Liberty release of "This is The Girl That Is" by Nancy Ames. Several of these cuts are great morning rousers all sung in Spanish and with all the excitement that goes with latin music. There is a new Canadian LP release that certainly merits a little extra attention "That Girl" by Phyllis Marshall on Columbia. Although it leans towards jazz it has a comfortable sound and should be a top item for programming. A great great release on London is "Arias From Julius Caesar" with Joan Sutherland and Marilyn Horne.

Helen Hatton of CHUM-FM is excited over the Epic release of "The Complete Mozart Flute Sonata" by one of the world's greatest flautist's Jean-Pierre Rampal. Victor has re-issued two Violin Concerto's written for Heifitz and performed by Heifitz. The first was written by Sir Wm. Walton. The orchestra is conducted by Sir Wm. The second was written by Castelnuovo-Tedesco. Of interest to FM stations programming Spoken Word, Helen brought up the fact that the Caedmon Records and a few others are charging \$10.00 performance rights for such spoken word releases as "The Glass Menagerie" and \$150.00 for the complete Shakespeare Recording Society catalogue.

Phyllis Marshall, born in Barrie was a first-rate amateur singer at the age of six and became a professional at the age of 13. When television started in Canada, Phyllis was there, having gained a great deal of popularity through Bing Whittaker's radio show "Starlight Moods" in which she was featured. The late Don Hudson was on the verge of producing a TV show "The Big Revue" and after watching Phyllis at work, tagged her for the show. Phyllis then became a TV

personality.

Phyllis has tried her hand at retiring (feeling she should give more time to her family) but showbiz was in her blood and after a couple of years absence came back with a bang that could be heard from Halifax to Vancouver. Her club dates were record dates. Always playing to capacity audiences in Canada her fame reached the UK and after cutting her first LP "That Girl Phyllis Marshall" on Columbia she enplaned for England and again packed houses. This LP isn't by any means her first attempt at recording. Phyllis has cut many records before but these are stored in her basement. She didn't feel they were good enough to be released.

Gord Symons of CFGM reports good reaction on the new Canadian single by The Winmen "Nickle Piece of Candy" Gary Buck's new pop country single "Welcome To The Club" on Sparton is pick hit of the Week at CFGM and looks like a good start for this long overdue artist to make it in his own country. CFGM tied in with the showing of a new automobile and produced a country show featuring Tommy Hunter and the very talented Foster Sisters from Nashville . . . Ontario. The introduction of a new product can always be greatly assisted by the use of a well produced musical show. Attendance figures of this particular show have it at well over 3000 Another feather in the cap of this progressive radio station who continually come up with advertising ideas that show they are the leader in the field of very clever and lasting promotional ideas.

Ronnie Ryder of the Ottawa Journal likes the new Porter Wagoner release 'I'll Go Down Swinging', also Hank Snow's 'My Memories of You'. Also showing merit is Connie Smith with a Bill Anderson tune "Once A Day" and "Tia

Lisa Lynn'' by Rose Maddox.

A great country LP is "A King and Two Queens" with Melba Montgomery, Judy Lynn and George Jones. You might' give a listen to "Country Singin" & Pickin" with Ruthie and Bernie MacLean and the Canadian Nighthawks on London.
