Curtola Breaks House Records At Town & Country

Toronto: The Bobby Curtola package has been held over at the Town & Country after a record breaking week. (17-22)

In a town that has been extremely cool towards Curtola, as a recording artist, it was surprising to sit in on the excitement generated by this young super star from the Lakehead. Curtola has certainly moved successfully into the world of the supper clubber. His fans, from his heyday as Canada's top recording star, have increased over the past few years and grown into maturity as he has. It was obvious that those who were lining up to get into the Town & Country weren't just the usual weekend fun seekers. Some had travelled several hundred miles to sit in with their idol.



In spite of a very uncomfortable throat problem, Curtola was in top form. Some of his old hits like "Fortune Teller" and borrowed greats including "Delilah" created an exciting atmosphere, and kept the dance area packed throughout the evening.

Curtola's manager Basil Hurdon flew in from the Lakehead for the last two days of the Town & Country celebration of their first anniversary and was obviously impressed with the Curtola power. This was by no means

a coincidence however. Capacity crowds have been the order of the day wherever the new Curtola has made club dates. Kitchener, London and Winnipeg welcomed him with

capacity houses.

Marie Martel, who heads up the Martel Booking Agency, and is responsible for the acquiring of dates for the Curtola package, has been responsible for the smooth running of his engagements. From setting up spot dances to making sure that radio, television and press VIPs are extended a welcome along with key dealers, and most important, the time and effort she puts into keeping the Bobby Curtola Fan Club up to date on their star's activities. It was through this fan club, numbering over 75,000 from coast to coast, that Bobby Curtola has retained such a high degree of popularity in Canada.

Curtola's latest Tartan album release "Bobby Curtola's Greatest Hits" (60-108) is chalking up excellent sales, particularly where he appears. The Curtola mail order business must be one of the most unique on the North American

continent.

Sharing the stage with Curtola is Columbia recording artist Michael Tarry, who recently experienced some success with his single release of "All That I Love" which was cut at Toronto's Chelsea Sound Studios. Tarry is obviously gaining much experience with the Curtola package and his excellent stage presentation is gathering him a large following which should create much interest in his next release.

Poppy Family /Association At Agradome By Allan Burkett

Vancouver: Concerts West Productions and CKLG Radio brought together two great groups at the PNE's Agrodome, Sunday Feb 9. They were London re-cording group, The Poppy Family, who have just released "What Can The Matter be", a very strong follow-up to their last hit of "Beyond The Clouds", and The Association, who record for Warner Bros.

Preceding the Association was the fascinating Poppy Family, a trio with a powerful grasp on the "now" sound of today. One of the most sought after and popular groups on the west coast, the Family kept the audience keenly aware of their sound for the

duration of their act.

Commencing with "Somebody To Have" and following through many great songs, this small but forceful young group was extremely successful in putting out truly great versions

of traditional material. The voice of Susan Jacks, lead singer; her brother Terry, vocalist and rhythm guitar and Craig McCam, lead guitar and Sitar, contributed equally and beautifully in enabling the group to reach successful heights on such selections as "White Rabbit", "Give A Damn'', and "House Of The Rising

At home in any field of music, whether it be country, folk, rock or classical, they pull the plugs and perform equally well in each.

The Poppy Family are setting up plans for a cross Canada tour to coincide with their new release.

The Association, one of the top draws in the music business, followed the Poppy Family, and were every bit the exciting group we expected. Many reasons can be found for the Association's continual top ratings on the music charts, and a number of these were evident Sunday night. This group is instrumentally, very sound and effective, and their voice range and tone contribute along with style and timing in their act, achieving excellent results on their many great hits.

They began their set with "Along Came Mary" and continued with several of their top hits including "Love",
"A Time For Livin", "Never My
Love", "Cherish", and "Windy",
each done in their unique and easygoing professional style that makes

them such a big name.

To appreciate the Association best, all one has to do is sit back and enjoy the beautiful moods this group conveys with each song. One of the assets of this group, is their stage presentation. Although not dynamic or explosive as many top acts, indeed, they are the opposite. They put the "sound" across in a carefree easygoing, but earnest way. They need not entrance their audience with overzealous actions, because the quality of their sound and the presentation accomplishes this.

Arc Goes Public

Toronto: Mr. Phil G. Anderson, president of Arc Sound Ltd., announced Feb 21st., 1969 that Arc Sound with a group of associated companies have filed a preliminary prospectus with the Ontario Securities Commission to go public under a holding company called Arc Home Entertainment Diversified Ltd.

If approved, shares, amounting to 175,000 would be offered at \$2.75 per share. 25,000 additional shares are being subscribed by employees at \$2.47 per share. Net proceeds will amount to approximately half a million dollars.

The issue is being underwritten by David Fry, Fraser and Company Limited, Toronto.

Arc, who have figured significantly in the development of Canadian talent over the last ten years, are planning to increase their program of establishing Canadian talent for the international market from Canada. This will include musicians, arrangers, record producers, vocalists and songwriters. RPM reported last week (Vol 10 No. 26) of the completion of Phase 2 of a four part series involving their publishing firm CANINT. Tony DiMaria, responsible for many of the successful productions on both Arc and Goodgroove, will become even more involved with production under the new Arc Home Entertainment firm. One of his prize finds, Brian Russell, a Canadian songwriter, who has enjoyed national recognition as both a writer and performer will also figure prominently in the new setup.

It should also be noted that Arc is well established in the musical instrument business and the distribution of impulse-priced LPs and through their well conceived marketing approach have created an excellent market for their Canadian country

and pop artists.

One might sense an insecureness which presented a stumbling, seemingly immature Joplin but one with a helluva big voice, and after all, that's what we went to hear. Joplin's a picture of excessive freedom which, more times than enough, revolts those of us used to the norm.

Joplin, with "Piece Of My Heart" and "Summertime", and her new group was an exciting mess, but one on which Columbia should keep a tight grip. She is still the biggest name in blue-eyed soul, and the only feminine one.



New York City -- (PWS) -- An absolutely amazing group has come out of the British pop scene. Called The Nice, they were formed as a backup group for soul singer P.P. Arnold and then went out on their own. For awhile they did standard pop-rock material. Then the members of the group, Brian Davison, Lee Jackson, and Keith Emerson, decided to start performing more serious music. Although they are

still playing their bass, organ and drums, they now perform such works as Leonard Bernstein's "America", which they turned into a pop hit in London. Their new album features Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 3.

Remaining faithful to Bach, the group has simply added the impact that a rock rhythm section makes when it plays, The combination is such that classical fans and rock fans alike will be amazed at how much they enjoy the group. And after Bach and Bernstein can you guess what the Nice do for an encore? "War and Peace", believe it or not!

Is pop music the place for social criticism or even commentary? Bobby Darin, who has been a hit singer/ songwriter for many years now although he's never really ventured out of the 'gosh, I love you' lyrical realm, found out that lyrics with meaning get you into hot water. Bobby, who's had such classic hits as "Splish Splash", wrote a song called "Long Line Rider". He was scheduled to sing it on television on the Jackie Gleason Show. That was as far as he got. CBS decided they didn't like some of the things Bobby said in the song, so they sent him a telegram telling him to cut out the objectionable material'. Bobby decided he'd rather not do the show than cut up the song.

He issued a statement asking CBS to define what they meant by objectionable and saying that they would hear from his lawyers. Bobby, who has already sung the song three times on NBC and once on ABC, said that CBS ordered the deletion of four lines. The lyrics are about the murder of convicts in Arkansas and their subsequent burial. The entire song is based upon the prison farm scandals that made national headlines in the U.S. a while back. What CBS objected to were lines which referred to the warden 'counting his empty shells' as he denys any knowledge of what has taken place and lines which sarcastically say

that this kind of thing couldn't happen in an 'election year'.

Following the lead of Curtis
Mayfield of The Impressions, the
Isley Brothers announced this week
that they were going into the record
business. Like Mayfield's Curtom
Records, they will have their own
label, T-Neck Records. The first
artists to record for the label will
be the brothers themselves. They
also plan to record what they call a
'psychedelic' soul group.

Spencer Davis considering moving to the U.S. permanently.....Cynthia Lennon revealed last week that she is planning to re-marry.....Beatles considering buying a house on the West Coast as a sort of home away from home.....Lonnie Mack's second album, "Glad I'm In The Band", due to be released soon.....A&M Records recording sound track of "Boys In The Band" play in New York. London production opens soon and it's beginning to look like the play is going to spread across the world the way Hair did.....Cartoone and Pentangle, two British groups new to the American scene, introduced themselves to the New York press last

Dion's rise back to fame is an interesting one. After he left his sound of the Belmonts era he says that he got deeply involved in music. He went back to the black roots of American music and discovered

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figures like Robert Johnson, Big Joe Williams, the Lightning Hopkins. "I was deeply affected by their sincerity and the simple style in which they used music and lyrics to tell what life was really about." he says. Dion did run into a slight problem. When he decided on getting into the music and doing a whole new thing, he couldn't find a record company to record with. When he finally did record "Abraham, Martin & John", which was certified this week as a million seller, he found himself back with the record company that he and the Belmonts first started with, Laurie.

Sam and Dave made their second appearance at The Fillmore East in New York last week. With their

double drummers and fine horn section, they are one of the most exciting acts in black city soul and their act and music seems to be the right combination to bridge the gap and communicate with white audiences.

While artists like Aretha Franklin and the Motown gangs have been appealing to both blacks and whites here for some time, Sam and Dave are the first really black act to make it big on a hip level with young people. Perhaps Otis Redding would have been the ideal man to do this, but his loss hasn't stopped it from happening. Sam and Dave have the right combination: Iasac Hayes and David Porter as songwriters, Booker T. and The M.G.'s as

studio band, and their own stage personalities. All they have to do to tear the house down is be allowed onstage.

Many black artists have scored heavy successes with their music on the pop charts, but few of them have any success performing for white audiences here. Sam and Dave are re-doing all that. They are opening the door for black acts and white audience appreciation. There is no way to describe the flash and colour of their live act. Suffice it to say that they are probably the best live performers in pop music today.

Showband Bring New Crowd To Horseshoe

Toronto: RCA's Carlton Showband jigged and reeled and folked its way into the hearts of the big brash country buffs at their Horseshoe opening (24). The first night was a successful RCA bash with leader



Ed Preston, and with an able assist from John Pozer, pulling in a good crowd of invitees. Pozer, it should be noted was responsible for the successful showing of CTV's "Pig & Whistle" on their recent Western and Eastern Canadian tours. The showband are an important part of this

Just in time for their Toronto opening, RCA rush released the Showband's newest single "Glorious Green", written by Liam Daly, and recorded in stereo at RCA's Toronto studios. Jack Feeney produced.

The Showband, an exceedingly tight eight man group, offer a rollicking and fun filled evening of entertainment. Their enthusiasm is exceptional, from their opener to "Gentlemen, Please". Fortunately, for the Showband, they are getting out from behind the restrictions of the television tube. One might find the "Pig & Whistle" show much more entertaining if the Carlton Showband were allowed the freedom they obviously enjoy in a non-restricted performance. What other bar group have you heard receive a standing ovation, in a country showplace, and at one, in the morning?

If the reaction from the first nighters is any indication, Jack Starr needn't worry about the rest of the week. It's obvious the Carlton Showband are capable of drawing just as rowdy a crowd as the country picker, which could make for an interesting week.

The "Villain" Is Unmasked

Early in my career in the record business, I heard tales of the horrible "villain" who tied up artists, cheated them and actually, I was prepared to believe, probably tortured them on a rack in the evening in his basement. As time went on I finally had to be confronted by the "villain" in the course of my business and I was prepared for anything. Actually he was a very nice person (at first meeting,) but I knew that "villains" had the knack of impressing people with their honesty and sincerity. As my dealings increased with him, I

found that actually he was a very well meaning but confused person who had entered the business with a great talent, some money, but wasn't familiar with the pitfalls and the intricacies of the industry. In his great attempt to build stars (which he actually did), he created misunderstandings in his contractual dealings.

I decided that when I launched my production career, I would assure myself the sanctity of knowing that any artists that I contracted understood their contracts fully. I also decided that if they were going to make the music business their career, they should immediately share the knowledge of what a wonderful thing a good mutually agreed upon contract could be.

I began to throw "contract readings". I would rise before the potential group and read aloud their contract to them explaining the whole thing as I went along. Most of the artists either yawned or indeed fell asleep during the reading and

explaination. At the end of my disertation, I asked if there were any questions. They usually asked either where the washroom was or where the pen was and subsequently the dotted line. That was the end of my attempt to upstage the "villain". Often I think I may have joined his ranks.

Suddenly I became aware of the fact that if one read fast enough and skimmed over the complicated and unholy parts of a contract one could enter into practically any unethical agreement in the world with an artist. I realized thatit was very easy to hide clauses that only a lawyer who was versed in the business could really interpret. The whole aspect of knowing what these clauses were and how to find them fascinated me. I decided to make it my thing to study and analyse contracts.

I then became aware that more than a producer, manager or booker, most artists needed an advisor to act on their behalf when it comes to contracts. Even with the honorable contracts, they needed someone to turn to and find confidence that they were getting the fair and acceptable deal.

My friend the "villain" is now a very close business associate who I admire greatly for his creative talent and his sincerity and devotion to the business. He still has trouble making his honorable intentions known. He is still a "villain" to many in the industry, but to a few insiders, he is the real star. The people he created are only talents that fought their way ahead burning every bridge behind them.

The "villain's" bad reputation made him a legend, and he still has a great deal of fun going to the bank to draw more money to create more "little stars". He is the BIG star and maybe his thing in life is to be a creator and making money just makes that possible.

The moral of this whole story is, "Take a "villain" to lunch...TODAY".

Mercey Brothers Show Pop Side

Toronto: The Edison appearance (17-22) of Columbia recording trio, The Mercey Brothers, revealed an exciting pop side of the folksy/country group that brought a newer crowd into Jimmy Clemens' main stemmer.

Stations across Canada declaring special CANADIAN TALENT DAYS is a good idea I suppose, but is it necessary? It shouldn't be. Here at CKDM everyday is CANADIAN TALENT DAY. We spin Canadian talent discs on all formats and talk up the artists. We even have pep talks from the boss to keep up the Canadian talent just in case we slip once in a while. Our afternoon country show features a fifteen minute live show with six different local country bands Monday through Saturday, I, personally, compile our regional CKDM CANADIAN TALENT TOP TEN each week, and choose our CKDM CANADIAN TALENT PICK HIT each week. (These are both printed in our weekly TEEN SCENE page along with our CKDM SUPER

73 SURVEY Top Ten) we are starting our 1969 CKDM SEARCH FOR CANADIAN TALENT, which is a series of local amateur talent nights throughout Manitoba, which are broadcast in their entirety, usually a four hour show

Our CKDM CANADIAN CONTENT doesn't stop with our music, we also have local school presentations of plays; approximately one hour twice or three times a year, depending on the drama club; a weekly feature of a LOOK AT BOOKS; a book review from the Dauphin library, local 4-H club reports every Saturday; a weekly school half hour called YOUR CHILDREN SING; and our newsroom does it's bit also. CKDM news features MANITOBA TODAY everyday at noon, a five minute broadcast of strictly Manitoba news; and at 2:50 PM and 5:50 PM a ten minute round-up of western province news only, called GOLDEN WEST NEWS.

These are not once a year special days, these are everyday programming features that have kept CKDM the number one rated station in rural Manitoba and Saskatchewan".

CHUM Librarian Escapes Shooting

Toronto: Police are investigating the apparent attempt on the life of Mike Rutledge, 24 year old librarian of radio station CHUM. Rutledge had apparently received several threatening telephone calls during the past few weeks after an alleged argument with a record salesman over the favouring of other radio stations with advance releases of records.

Sunday Mar 23 at approximately 6 AM, Rutledge is reported to have received a telephone call at his home from someone purporting to be calling from CHUM, advising that he (Rutledge) was required to

replace the regular operator, who

had supposedly booked off sick. Shortly after, while starting his car, which was parked in his driveway, Rutledge suddenly found himself looking up the end of the barrel of a rifle. He ducked and a bullet shattered the window just above his head. He escaped uninjured. His attacker has not, at press time, been apprehended.

Police are reportedly checking the weekend activities of the record salesman mentioned above as well as looking into the methods used in the promotion and distribution

of records.

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Book Review

(Ed: The Canadian publisher of the authorized biography of the Beatles has kindly sent a copy of the book to RPM for review. Although the book was published in November of last year, RPM has commissioned RPM's Beatle authority Stan Klees to review this very important publication, which follows)

The Beatles Hunter Davies Publisher-L Heinemann Price: \$5.95

To review this book, one is reading, possibly, as accurate an account of a phenomena as could possibly be written. Anyone in the music business is actually in the business of phenomenon, and therefore they would be interested in the most legendary series of events in popular music history.

Davies sacrifices some of the literary style of the book by creating authenticity with voluminous quotes. Often you have to check back to find out who he is quoting as he moves back and forth from the interviewee to the Beatles' comments of the incident.

The constant verbatum quotes add to the authenticity of a book that reads often like a fairy tale. The fact is that the truth would look like fantasy. I would like to believe that after all four of the Beatles had approved the book (which I am sure they did) any of the fantasy was removed. I believe that within the limits of human honesty and memory the facts are all here. I think that only the personal events that would not be palatable have been omitted and the rest - because of the Beatles' apparent honesty and lack of patience with personal fantasy, the book tells it pretty well as it was.

Although you feel you know every important detail of their career, the book adds some real shockers that will astonish many in the trade. One is George Martin's financial rewards throughout the success of the Beatles. Another is Stu Sutcliffe, who was one of the original Silver Beatles.

The book includes many of their early photos and the text follows the Beatles from birth to today and carefully analysis their earnings and profits.

The book may have been written for the public, but serves a much better purpose in the hands of a disc jockey or record man. Few books are as authoritative on the pop music business. To the young artists, the book sheds new light on the years prior to the Beatles' success. I get the feeling that the many trips to Germany and the appearances before a foreign audience had much to do with their later success. How many groups have had the challenge to entertain vocally against the barrier of language? The Beatles had that advantage early in their careers. They had to communicate with only what they did and obviously were successful.


The book often re-emphasizes the lack of attention from the media their success drew in the early stages. It then indicates the complete reversal of the press and radio to the phenomena.

Surprisingly enough the Beatles at some point all wish it hadn't happened. As you read about their experiences with fans, press and police, you might realize that their personal appearances were a threat to their lives. Their lack of privacy is a strong objection registered by the book. Their inability to generate new friends is indicated and explained. Their philosophy

regarding their own talent is interesting and will be revealing to many other creative people.

While the world reads into their music and songwriting the Beatles explain how simply they came up with their "deeper" works. The book lets you get to know the Beatles - if a book can actually achieve this. It does more in that it gives us an insight into a business that is so based on fantasy that many in it don't know where they're at. To artists, disc jockeys, producers, songwriters and anyone else in the music or entertainment business, it might be good therapy. Read it. RPM forced me to read it and I'm very glad I did.





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"OLIVER" - A Lovable, Laffable Experience

If the dreary winter is beginning to drag your spirits down and you desperately need a super pepperupper I suggest that you go immediately to the Odeon Carlton Theatre and buy a ticket for Oliver.

Oliver, the musical adaptation of Charles Dickens' Oliver Twist is built around the criminal subculture in 19th century London. The stage version successfully crossed the Atlantic and enjoyed a long run on Broadway.

Those of you who disapprove of what has been done with other stage musicals in their transition to the screen (cf. Camelot) will be relieved to hear that the improvement in Oliver outweigh its newly created flaws.

The movie is well paced and flows smoothly from scene to scene. Sir Carol Reed, the director, has followed "the art is to conceal the art" principle and exercised a light but firm governing hand in integrating the components into a viable whole.

The colour is gorgeous and Oswald Morris' fine photography has made most scenes visual delights. This is especially apparent when Oliver, after running away and stealing a ride, opens his eyes on the colour and exuberance of 19th century London Town in all its glory and in his fantastic "adventure" with the Artful Dodger in London's enormous produce market. Unfortunately one of the most beautiful songs in the original show (Who Will Buy, based on London street vendor's calls) is spoiled by an over-elaborate and gimmicky production.

Lionel Bart's music is, of course, pleasantly familiar and its artistic punctuation of the story keeps the pace flowing smoothly. However, in its sound, the film version is remiss. The flaws start with casting a Mr. Bumble (Harry Secombe) with a glorious operatic voice but then giving him far too little (one and a half numbers) to sing and in the process cutting out the delightful I Shall Scream sequence. The next noticeable error was replacing the gutty and electrifying voice of Georgia Brown's Nancy with the very sweet and pretty one of Shani Wallis (who was very good is you had never experienced Georgia and were unaware of the character of Nancy). Not so serious was the slightly imperfect dubbing of Oliver's voice (sung by a girl who received no credit). Finally, the theatre's side speakers came on jarringly, making the volume louder than it had been from time to time, and reminding me all too suddenly that I was in the theatre and not in (not so merry) old Victorian England.

On the other hand, I liked Fagan (Ron Moody) better here in a more loveable, almost father-like incarnation which because of this actor's excellent command of his face

and body did not derogate from his very funny interpretation of the role. This was expecially difficult since he had to compete with Jack Wild's Artful Dodger for many of his laughs. The two made a comedy team of a type that has been all too seldom seen since Charlie Chaplin and Jackie Coogan days.

Oliver Reed made the cold blooded Bill Sykes into the only frightening element still left in the story. With so much singing and dancing going on he had to be really convincing to send a chill through his audience. Little nine year old Mark Lester's Oliver was sweet and appealing. This child has one of the most beautiful and expressive faces I have ever seen. He can be wistful and childish or determined and adultlike and both moods are believeable.

Nice as this all is I have not even touched on the best part of the production, Onna White's choreography. It's tremendously exciting and imaginative and is guaranteed to send you tripping off into the snowy night doing a little two-step as you whistle your way home.
