Jarvis Street Revue...a blast of fresh air

Jarvis Revue up to their hits in ecology

If you can make it as a performer from Thunder Bay Ontario you deserve more than just a hit album. This top of the lake "burg" is known for its boorish audiences particularly with the head crowd. However, the Jarvis Street Revue were able to overcome the stigma of being a hometown group and have contributed greatly to the Canadian recording industry.

They're not a new group, by the pop standards, They've been around for over two years. Most of this time was spent putting their gig thing together. They put it together so well they've been playing the local Flamingo Club for almost sixteen months which hasn't given them much time to spread their talents across the country.

They did however, take time out to tape a session out of which came their first single, "Mr. Oilman" and "Twenty Years". Unfortunately the market wasn't ready for this type of ecology conscience from Canadians and the single went by the boards.

The Jarvis Street Revue have persisted and they've followed their single with a powerful message album that should be in the libraries of every radio station in Canada.

In RPM's New Albums of May 8/71 their album was tagged as being: "Very much in the vein of the Moody Blues' 'Question Of Balance', this first album by the popular Thunder Bay group is a powerful condemnation of the way the world is going."

The album is a product of Thunder Bay's sound team, Don Grashey and Chuck Williams and points up the importance and sound quality of their DMG Studios. Columbia is expected to launch a nationwide promotion to bring the Jarvis Street Revue to the attention of Canadians and eventually the international market.

The Jarvis Street Revue is comprised of George Stevenson, Tommy Cruikshank, Wayne Falconer and Tom Horricks.

Gene MacLellan grabs top BMI award in NYC

Gene MacLellan, voted 1970's top Canadian composer at the Juno Awards ceremony last February, has been similarly honoured in the United States with a Special Award for having written the most performed BMI song of 1970, "Snowbird". John Lennon and Paul McCartney won top writer awards.

MacLellan's publisher, Beechwood Music Corporation, also carted away an award at the BMI ceremony held in New York City on May 25th.

Montreal's Kim to tape Rogers television show

Warner Brothers' Kenny Rogers and the First Edition have chosen Toronto as the origination point for their network TVer with the result that a number of Canadian artists are receiving top exposure. The latest to benefit is Andy Kim from Montreal. The singer/composer taped the Rogers show at CFTO in Toronto last week and performed two numbers, "I Been Moved" and "I Wish I Were", his recent chart item.

The Steed artist will hit the air in September over the CTV network in Canada and via syndicated stations in the United States.

Festival Singers acclaimed in Austria

Toronto's Festival Singers have met with critical acclaim on their European tour. Latest stop on the continent-wide jaunt is Austria where the choir performed in Graz, Salzburg and Vienna. All drew packed houses. The Canadian ambassador in Austria, Norman Berlis, called all three concerts "artistic masterpieces". The choir uses Canadian compositions, including works by Willan, Shafer and Morawetz.

From Austria, the Singers left for Germany for concerts in Mainz and Cologne. While in Cologne, the thirty-seven Canadians will do a special broadcast for the West German Radio Network.

Following the German appearances, the Singers fly to London and Paris for concerts before winding up their five-week tour. The choir returns to Canada on June 11th.

Arrangements have recently been completed for the Festival Singers of Canada to appear at Lincoln Centre in New York City, on January 26, 1972.

Jean Fortier dies at 24

Jean Fortier, brilliant young French Canadian performer/composer, passed away at the age of 24 in Montreal after a lengthy illness. Death was attributed to a brain tumor.

Mr. Fortier was awarded a BMI Certificate of Honour for his composi-

tion, "Si Tu Veux Me Garder" at the May 13 Annual Awards dinner which were held in Toronto. But, because of illness was unable to attend. Mr. John Williams, A&R Director for Columbia, accepted for the ailing young writer. It was five days later (May 18) that Mr. Fortier succumbed to his illness.

The winning of a Silver Key in the Quebec Key Contest of 1970 was another accomplishment for the young songwriting genius. This Award was for his penning of "Emmanuelle". He had written the song for his daughter and it was later adapted as the fifth movement of "La Symphonie du Bonheur", his second album for Columbia.


Mr. Fortier was considered a bright hopeful as a recording artist. His initial release for Columbia, "La Reine Araignee" and "Prends Ton Temps" indicated that he had successfully moved from his association with Les Cailloux into a disc world of his own. Unfortunately, Mr. Fortier suffered a bad drug experience but fortunately, for young French Canadians still experimenting with drugs, he used his experience to communicate a cautious message with his "Symphonie de l'Herbe".

Fortier pennings have long been an important part of the French Canadian music scene. He had written for Monique Leyrac, Renee Claude, Mariette Levesque, Celine Lomez, Ginette Ravel and many others.

Although a victim of today's pop culture, the name Fortier will remain as a challenge to its environs, and hopefully, a powerful factor in reversing a frightening trend.

At the same time, our advertising rates have increased substantially, but so has every cost factor in producing the physical article. Over the period that we kept our prices frozen, we were most concerned with the smaller businesses allied to the music trade. This is still foremost in our minds. The many independent producers, publishers, studios and yet-to-be-established artists cannot afford the larger ads. The only salvation is that smaller ad areas are still available at a modest price and with a little imagination, the advertiser can utilize a smaller ad space to relate his message and still derive the benefit of national exposure.

Above all, we would like to grow with the industry and as the industry continues to expand, RPM will improve its many services to the record stores, broadcasters and music industry as a whole. When I look back at an issue of two years ago, I am also looking back at the industry of two years ago, and the essential ingredient is still progress. The question is finally brought down to — can we afford to progress? We are going to have to.

The general acceptance of the RPM MAPL logo is extremely gratifying. Today, practically all the record companies in Canada have adopted this identification for Canadian content product. In that the logo was designed initially for use in RPM only, we are pleased that the system has been so readily accepted by the industry. We made no attempt to sell our system to the trade. Letters are on file from all the record companies using the MAPL logo which expressly request permission to use it. Letters are also on file from broadcasters expressing their delight with the

system. Many stations have requested permission to utilize our MAPL logo throughout their libraries to identify Canadian content. We are pleased to have been helpful in establishing a viable system to help in the implementation of the 30% Cancon ruling.

A number of record companies have complained about their albums not being used in our weekly New Albums feature. We, in turn, would like to complain that we often don't receive the albums in question. It might be gratifying to some programmers to know they aren't the only ones not being efficiently serviced by the record companies.

One of the most essential tools we have for last minute news and reports is RPM's telex. We would like to acknowledge the companies who have taken advantage of this instant form of transferring press releases. This is a business where speed is of the essence. We are now working on the Post Office to see if we can receive the same privileges as those trades from the U.S. Regarding the telex, the last minute information sent via telex is just another factor in keeping the industry informed. We aren't hearing from radio stations and we're sure there is a great deal happening out there that would be of interest to the nation - or is the SRL thing still a hangup with some of the radio people?

To the many of you who have commented on "Comment", we are grateful that we have such a devoted following. It surprises and pleases us to know that you would take the time to let us know. We appreciate your comments and many of your suggestions have lead to articles featured on these pages.

Senator Keith Davey investigates new medium

In summing up the success of the recent Yorkville release of "Put Your Hand In The Hand" by Ocean, Bill Gilliland of Arc Records, a division of AHED Music Corporation, submitted a copy of the following remarks made by Senator Keith Davey, who recently concluded a Senate investigation of the Mass media.

The document was headed "Debates of the Senate" and was dated April 28, 1971 and read as follows:

Hon. Mr. Davey: A record entitled "Put Your Hand in the Hand of a man" — a Canadian record performed by Canadians, written by Canadians, recorded by Canadians and produced by Canadians — reached the number one spot in most Canadian markets during March, and even as we sit in

this chamber it is presently number one in most American cities. The United States sales figures for this Canadian record are well over \$1 million, and it is believed to be the first record produced exclusively in Canada which has attained this type of sales figure in the United States. As a matter of fact I have made a copy of this record available to all honourable senators who will find it with their morning mail. It is by a group called Ocean.

June 1st. 1971, it was reported that Senator Keith Davey was elected to the board of directors of AHED Music Corporation Ltd.

CHAM's program supervisor, R. Paul Godfrey, is working closely with Ampex on the "Motown Story" which will take up a complete weekend on the Hamilton station. The radio and television broadcasting industry (private) earned an operating profit of \$30.8 million for the year just passed. This is a drop of \$5.8 million from 1969.

Campus radio has become an important sales vehicle for record companies but they have been somewhat hesitant in making moves to reveal themselves. Record promotion pluggers like RCA's Johnny Murphy, A&M's Joe Woodhouse and Jutta Ney of GRT have been trying to get a Campus happening going and with some success. On his own hook, Bill Akerley, director of Radio CHSR, a closed-circuit campus radio serving the students of three New Brunswick Colleges, has supplied information on this very important outlet. The cable system was devised by New Brunswick Telephone and serves over 3000 students in residence 10 months of the year -18 hours each day.

Their program format is MOT and up-tempo MOR with news every hour. The emphasis is on public affairs. CHSR receives wire service from Broadcast News as well as B.N. Voice and Earth News from San Francisco.

CHYM's Don Bird has been busy hosting many guests on his show, "The Bird's Nest".

The latest guest was Larry Mercey, who was in to talk about the new Mercey Brothers album, "Have Mercey".

Bird has also been visited by such celebrities as Merle Haggard, Anne Murray, Carl Perkins and Ronnie Hawkins.

Honey Wells, who has been with Curtola for several years, has smoothed out into a highly valuable addition to the show. Her costuming and stage presentation is superb and exquisitely feminine - an excellent contrast from the all man Curtola delivery.

The Curtola package has moved into the Queens Hotel in Peterborough for two weeks after which they'll play the popular Grand Hotel in Bridgeport near Kitchener, Ont.

"Here Come the Seventies" will be seen again this year on the CTV network as well as in the U.S.





Poppy Family fantastic as usual

The Poppy Family put on their usual fantastic display of musical and vocal abilities before an enthusiastic crowd of fifteen hundred in Lethbridge on May 27 and showed, once again, why they are the most popular softrock group in Canada today.

Making their first public appearance in almost five months, the Poppy Family ran through all of their hits which are now a respectable six in number, and eight or nine other songs besides.

Terry, Susan, Satwant and Norm showed few if any signs of their long layoff (their last date was New Year's
Eve in Disneyland) and had the
crowd completely on their side,
laughing, clapping and generally participating, by the end of the third
song.

The group displayed their versatility en masse, trying everything from the Buddy Holly classic "Everyday" to a Merle Haggard tune, "Today I Started Loving You Again". Called back for an encore at the end, the Family finished their set with the blues standard, "House of the Rising Sun".

In an interview later, Terry said the group had just flown in from New

York where, the previous night, he had received four BMI awards for having written and published two of the top fifty songs in the United States last year, "That's Where I Went Wrong" and "Which Way You Goin' Billy".

He said the group's second album, titled "Poppy Seeds", will be released about the middle of July while a single will be culled from the album and released a few weeks earlier.

Terry also said that another single, a follow-up finally to "I'm Gonna Capture You", may also soon be released under his own name. Entitled "Someone Must Have Jumped", the song would seem to be in the CCR vein of rock 'n' roll.

The group was to travel to Toronto during the first week of June to tape three television shows; one a Kenny Rogers and the First Edition special, and two "Nashville North" segments, all for viewing this September.

Also appearing on the bill in Lethbridge were Calgary's newest act, the Stratus Singers, who were just about as well received as the Poppy Family. A special pleaser was the group's first single, "Lord Bless Me, Lord Bless You". Stratus Faction also made an appearance.

The sun's going down on the fool on the hill

Once upon a changing time, an old man lived on a hill. He ruled quite an impressive perch; indeed, he had more perches than anyone else in this farflung land.

The man was in the communications business. He was a shrewd operator. He saved cents and made many dollars and he didn't suffer from any pangs of conscience about how he did it.

This man had town criers in several different parts of the empire, and inevitably his town crier always seemed to be more popular than the other town criers which you find in every major city.

You see, there is a formula involved in being a town crier, and despite the apparent air of mediocrity in the format. It has worked in other places and there's no damn reason why it won't work here....or there....or all over. So our man imposed his "borrowed" format on his town criers and pretty soon he'd built himself quite a network of successful operators (doing the same thing in different places).

He was able to do this because his competitors were either ignorant of the areas in which they did business, or because they tried to imitate our man's imitations. Everyone knows that imitation rarely stretches itself into a third strain, and so by default our man reaped the heavy harvest of monopoly.

One thing our man especially hated was patriotism. A few oddballs criticized him for not recognizing the land of his wealth and health; for not allowing his countrymen to become town criers or to entertain the listeners with assorted amusements betwixt and between the crying sessions. Our man,

riding an inflated ego with zeppelin confidence, completely ignored the growing critical clamor. "This is my town crier business," he told an underling. "I run my ship the way I want because I'm the captain. We made 12-

zillion dollars last year. We must be doing something right."

Such reticence bewildered his artistic assailants. In fact, it completely pissed them off. But they kept on slugging and eventually the elders of the land ruled that enough is enough. Other town criers in other cities had bowed down to mounting pressure and had allowed the locals to make use of their services. But our man stood firm on his hill until the end.

And the end did come. The elders passed a law that made all town criers cry out in the name of patriotic freedom, and they said that anyone who withheld that freedom would be subjected to the most merciless punishment. It wasn't the sort of a law they wanted to enact, but because of the stubborn and stupid scorn of our man on the hill, there was nothing else they could do. They'd given him a hundred hints but he'd ignored them all.

And so the law came into being. Our man was one of the handful of town

crier operators who immediately ignored the law. He used every trick in his holey book to mock the new law.

Not only that.....deciding that attack was the finest form of defence, he went out and found his own talent. He gave them special opportunities to succeed. He ignored far superior talent in favour of his own. "If I've got to use this crap," he figured, "I might as well have a hefty chunk of the action."

The people of the land who had thought they had been freed by the new law soon woke up to what was going down. The rejoicing turned to anger and anguish.

Our man sat back on the top of his hill and belly laughed. "I've won again against the most impossible odds," he duly informed his underling. "They thought they'd take away my freedom to liberate those no-talented morons at the bottom of the hill. Communists and dope fiends, that's what they all are."

And so peace wearing the disguise of all manners of corruption returned to the top of the hill. The critics had found other things to criticize.

Then one day—looking out across the valleys and peninsulas—our man spotted a town crier franchise in another town. It was a town in which our man had long been anxious to mingle and mangle. He decided that this time he would definitely move in on the neighboring mountain. His ambition was as hot as a dragon's breath.

His network of town criers would then have been almost complete. He would be able to corrupt and coerce one half of the land. What a joyful thought for the man on the hill.

There was only one small obstacle still sitting in his way. The elders — who had passed a law because of our man on the hill — also had control of who bought and sold town criers' franchises. They had decided that town crier franchises could be highly dangerous in the wrong hands.

Our man came down off his hill and went away to meet with the elders. He told them what a charming fellow he was and how much he had done to aid the people of the land. He had even sent a town crier into the farout frozen wastes to beat on a tin drum. The drum beat out a torrid tale of life at the top of the hill, thus forcing the Northerners to long for life in the "civilized" South.

Our man said he was prepared to rest his case on his "many laurels". He deserved another town crier franchise, he said, because he had done so much for the good of the community with his other franchises. He was experienced.

Cliff Edwards . . household name in his own home ?

The curious fact about Cliff Edwards is that he is almost anonymous. For he is, after all, one fifth of the total number of Canadian producers who have turned out a million-selling record. Richardson and Ahern are almost household names, but it is questionable whether Edwards enjoys that status, even in his own home.

The Producers

Cliff Edwards is the lead singer/guitarist/producer of Montreal's Bells. His credentials in the producing game are two Moffatt Awards for his first effort, "Moody Manitoba Morning" and Gold Leaf and RIAA Gold Record awards for the recent "Stay Awhile". Of the three singles he has produced for Polydor, only "Fly, Little White Dove, Fly", considered in this corner to be the best of the lot, did not pick up some kind of award.

In the beginning, producing was only a diversion for Edwards. When he took his three-year-old tavern-circuit group into the studios, he decided it would be nice to make the whole show his own. By Edwards' own description, however, the first album "was a disaster. I over-produced the album and the only thing that came out of it was 'Moody Manitoba Morning'.

"So I said 'That's it. I won't do it again' But about eighteen months ago, I produced another group and everyone was happy with the result. But the group broke up before we could release anything. It did encourage me to try again, though."

By this point, the Bells were prominent on the New York bar circuit, described by Cliff as "not much different from the Ontario circuit except the money is better." Being outside Canada, however, the American circuit held a little glamour for the folks back home who encouraged Edwards to try producing his own group again.

This time Cliff was determined not to repeat his earlier error. He would not over-produce the new album—instead, he used only the Bells, all alone without so much as an outside kazoo player. The session became the Bells' second album, from which both "White Dove" and "Stay Awhile" were pulled.

The sound throughout the "Stay

Awhile" album is universally clean and precise. Edwards' work is first class on the package. Which makes his lack of respect for studios seem rather amazing.

"I don't think it makes any difference where you record," Cliff maintains, "we rehearse the songs in the basement of my house before we go into the studio. If the sound isn't there before we go into the studio, it won't be there when we come out."

The quality likely involves more than just the studio. Quality, no matter what the studio may be, costs money. The money comes from Polydor, who, Cliff insists, have backed him trom the label's Canadian opening. "I have never been told that there's a roof on what I've been doing. Perhaps if none of the earlier efforts had turned out, the situation would have changed. But the important point is that they gave us the chance—like they gave Joey Gregorash and Bobby Griffith chances."

And just as important as money, Polydor has provided guidance. Since "Moody Manitoba Morning", Polydor has decided which recordings by the Bells will be released as singles. Cliff notes, "I don't have any control over the choice of the singles and I don't want any. It is too easy to become involved in your own work and not see the flaws. Only an outsider can really tell what sounds like a hit."

He's right, at least in his case. Rather than either "White Dove" or "Stay Awhile", Edwards wanted to release "Yesterday Will Never Come Again". And the Bells might still be pushing drinks in New York bars.

Enter Fred Forensic from stage left

In an early article I pointed out that one element of contract was "a definite meeting of the minds". I see I've ignored that aspect and I think that it's time to consider it.

The two parties to a contract must be contracting about the same thing. Otherwise there has not been what lawyers call a meeting of the minds. (It's interesting to note how misleading that phrase is; it is when there has not been a meeting of the minds that there may be a head-on clash.)

What does this legalistic phrase mean? Let's try an example: Poor old Amodeus, still struggling to put together his concert at the Stone Heap, has decided to forego the expensive services of his friend, Swingin' Jo Bach, and to feature instead Canada's newest and most sensational rock group, Radar Pineapple Manhole

They're getting \$7,500 because they're not only good but they come from large families (an extra hundred and seventy-three sales in Canada can really boost a group on the charts); however, Amodeus used to play with them, and as a favour, they're agreed to play at his price of \$3,000

But the RPM are a full-scale light act — strobes, rotating mirror balls, dif-

ferent coloured spots for each man, blackout effects, ultra-violet—the works. Amodeus recalls that Swingin' Jo, before he became a performer, was a light man, and one of the best in the trade. He approaches Jo, and after telling him that there's going to be a concert at the Stone Heap, has the following conversation:

AA: I'm using Radar Pineapple Manhole; do you know their act?

SJB: Sure, they're the group that's big on lights, aren't they?

AA: That's right. That's what I want to talk to you about. I hired them because I couldn't afford you as an act. Now that you know about them could you work with them?

SJB: For you, my old and true friend? Of course I will because of our deep and sincere friendship. You're on, and at your price.

Of course, what Amo' meant was that Jo should work the concert as light man; unfortunately, what Jo meant was that, rather than see his friend in

trouble, he would lower his fee and play the concert.

And so Amodeus drew a contract which simply called for Jo's "services" at the concert for a thousand dollars, and mailed it to him. Jo, reading it from his own viewpoint, signed it.

Comes the night of the concert, and Jo shows up in all his sequins and says, "Who plays first, me or RPM?" RPM's leader says, "Who's Mr. Glitter and what does he mean 'play first'? Does he think he's playing with us?"

Let us draw a curtain over the next few minutes, and fade in again with a close-up of Amo' talking to his lawyer, a confirmed pessimist, who attends every concert.

After a brief but intense burst of sobbing, our hysterical promoter says to his forensic friend:

"I'll sue that SOB, SJB, for every cent he's got. I hired him as a light man, and by refusing to do what he agreed to, he's cost me a bundle. Uh, I can sue him, can't I, Fred?"

To which his forensic friend, Fred Forensic, said, "Of course you can, Amodeus, provided that Jo knows what you hired him for. Are you sure that he was sure that he was working the lights?"



Deer Patch Music has published the Canadian single, "Goin' to the Country" by Young.


GROSSMAN'S TAVERN MOVES TO ART CENTRE

group EVER? What proof is there that the contract was filed at all? ARE some agents taking as much as one third of the contracted price as a commission? Are some agents holding



It isn't my job to cure the ills of the musicians...but it is my

The rest of this dialogue is painful. Since none of us cares to watch a grown man snivel, whine, and cry, let's just tip-toe off, realizing that, since Amo' and Jo were not contracting about the same thing, there was no contract, and therefore no breach of contract suit.

Why doesn't this kind of lawsuit turn up more frequently? It's not because parties are always in agreement; if they were, then there would be fewer lawsuits altogether. No, the problem isn't one of law, but of evidence. How do you prove what you meant when you signed a contract; most of the real facts lie inside the heads of the parties. Unless some kind of external evidence can be brought in, or unless one of the parties makes such an impression as a witness, that the Judge chooses to believe him (or unless both parties tell the truth and both are believed) it's pretty difficult to win a lawsuit based on such a claim.

But not impossible!




