

## Capitol to boost acts via free concerts

Capitol (Canada), through its president Arnold Gosewich, has announced completion of plans to showcase their recording acts in free concerts.

Artists pencilled in so far include: Pepper Tree, Edward Bear, Tommy Graham and Capitol's most recent disc success, Aarons and Ackley.

The Toronto Fair will be the site of the first series of shows to be presented on a giant stage just outside the Youth Canada Building. Schedule for these shows is as follows: Edward Bear —Aug 19/20/21 Aarons & Ackley —Aug 26/27 Tommy Graham —Aug 28/29 Pepper Tree —Sep 3/4/5

Capitol will also sponsor a giant one niter at the Forum in Ontario Place Tuesday August 31st. The same acts above will appear at the Forum show which will commence at 8:30 PM with each act doing a 35 minute set.

Mailer cards will be made available to local retail stores as well as a hefty advertising campaign in the Toronto dailies.

## A&M blankets Toronto with Carpenters signs

The Carpenters are set for Toronto and A&M's Gerry Lacoursiere is rolling out the red carpet to honour this talented pair who have been one of the big money makers for the label.

The E.L. Ruddy Co. has prepared a 24-sheet poster outdoor advertising campaign which A&M kicked off August 8th — the first time a billboard campaign of this magnitude has been attemped by a record company.

The Carpenters are skedded to appear at the Toronto Fair August 22nd and Lacoursiere is taking advantage of this engagement to push home their available disc and tape product. Featured releases on the posters are "Ticket To Ride", "Close To You", and their most recent album release "Carpenters" (SP 3502).

Lacoursiere is also arranging for effective tie-ins with in-store and window displays.

The E.L. Ruddy Co. is a division of Claude Neon Advertising and has been Toronto's most effective method of outdoor advertising for several years. Ruddy claims that this A&M campaign will deliver over 2,250,000 advertising messages to the Toronto public.

## Mercey's go hunting with "Word" discing

Fresh from a long chart seige with their initial RCA release, "Hello Mom", The Mercey Brothers bounce back with what label touter Johnny Murphy tags "a lyrical masterpiece". "Who Wrote The Words" was actually written by the now famous Ottawa songwriting duo, Bruce Rawlins and Terry Carisse. Early indications have this one as being as large as their previous number oner.

The flip, "Blind Man", also penned by Rawlins/Carisse, is considered a very strong chart item as well. Both sides were culled from the Mercey's album release "Have Mercey" which was produced at RCA's Toronto studios by Gary Buck.

The Mercey's were on location (July 25-26) at the Canadian Forces Greenwood Base to tape a couple of shows for Cy True's CBC-TVer, "Country-time" which will be televised in the fall. While on the base they did a few numbers for George Hamilton IV, who was playing a date, and he was apparently so impressed with their performance that rumours are running high on the possible appearance of the brother act on Hamilton's UK country television show.

## Trans World releases M&K Kissoon deck

The Youngblood single, "Chirpy Chirpy Cheep Cheep" by Mac and Katie Kissoon, has been acquired for Canadian distribution by Trans World Records. The single has been rush released to meet the sales demand generated by radio play by those stations who have received advance copies of the UK release.

The British duo have now firmly established themselves as a hot chart item having attained solid berths on the U.S. trades. The single is released in the U.S. on the ABC label but is

released under the Youngblood banner in Canada.

Trans World's promotion manager, Ray Johnston, has canvassed most of the major stations in Ontario Province and it would appear that Mac and Katie Kissoon are assured of top play and chart action from this quarter. Results of the national mailing will be known within the next few days.

Trans World at 1230 Mont De Liesse Blvd. Montreal will be handling distribution throughout Quebec and the Atlantic Provinces as well as dealer requests from areas where distribution is not available. Caravan Records (Scarborough) will distribute for Ontario while Emerson Sales (Vancouver) will look after British Columbia.

### Record Club of Can. ties with U.S. firm

L.D. Graner, president of the Record Club of Canada, reports the firming of negotiations with the Record Club of America for the two firms to be associated in the mail order record and tape business. The U.S. firm is headquartered in York, Pennslyvania.

Graner retains his association with the company both as a shareholder and as an active member of the management. S. Iseman is no longer with the company.

It is Graner's opinion that as a result of the new association: "Record Club of Canada will provide even better service to Canadians than it has in the past and will continue to grow as a substantial retailer of records and tapes and related items in Canada at a greatly accelerated pace."

### CKOC/GRT showcase Canadian disc acts

Friday Aug 13th has been set aside as the date for a combined effort by Hamilton's CKOC and GRT to showcase recording units from the GRT roster. Hamilton's Wentworth Arena has been picked as the setting for the big show.

Acts included on the bill are: Doctor Music, currently making strong chart moves with their "Try A Little Harder" deck; Flower Travelling Band, who had a good run up the charts with their "Satori" lid and will soon have an album off; and GRT's latest signing from Harry Hinde Productions, Joshua, who should have a single off in time for the Hamilton show.

GRT has arranged for two buses to transport Toronto radio, press and retail people to the show which will be followed by a reception expected to be attended by industry people from the Niagara Peninsula and the Hamilton area.

# Paramount US release for Dr. Music prods

Shelley Siegel, who heads up Vancouver's SOS Productions, reports completion of negotiations between Doctor Music Productions of Toronto and Paramount Records for U.S. release of product from the Canadian firm. Initial release will be an album by Everyday People to be followed by a single. Release has been tentatively scheduled for mid-September.

Everyday People are just completing a successful promotion and personal appearance tour through the Canadian west which has given new life to their GRT single, "I Get That Feeling".

## Daffodil's Crowbar reaches for top

It's difficult to believe that less than 18 months ago, nobody had even heard of Crowbar, Daffodil recording artists who occupy this week's RPM front cover.

Considering some of their major achievements, the story of the rapid rise of this Southern Ontario group hasn't been far short of spectacular.

Last summer, there were days when the group did not have enough money to buy a round of hamburgers. This summer was culminated by Crowbar's recent concert for the Prime Minister, Pierre Trudeau and his wife, and the discussions which took place before and after the concert in Perth, Ontario.

The PM told Crowbar: "Man, I really like your music". He said that he particularly liked the song about power to the people (the stage version of "Oh What A Feeling").

Crowbar's lead singer, Kelly Jay, presented Trudeau with a plaque pointing out the PM's contributions to Canadian pop music. A brass plaque mounted on a piece of Bad Manors barn wood, the inscription read: "To Pierre Elliot Trudeau, for making it possible through the CRTC for Canadians to be heard in their own country".

Crowbar's debut album, "Bad Manors", is the first Canadian-produced album

to receive both sides of the border acclaim from some of the hyper-critical rock critics. Rolling Stone noted: "This LP is one of the happiest, raunchiest, freshest emanations of a piacere life-energy to pin the grid in many moons. It's one big up."

Fusion's critic, Lester Bangs, said "I like this album as much as anything I've heard in the last year".

Creem dug Crowbar and said "Listen, if you're planning to go deaf pretty soon, pick up on Bad Manors before you do".

U.S. personal appearances including a week at the Whisky A Go Go in Los Angeles, introduced Crowbar to U.S. disc buyers and a healthy nod from the Los Angeles Times.

It has been estimated that more than 100,000 Canadians have sat in on the Crowbar in concert during the last two months. This included a standing ovation during their gig at Man and His World before 37,000 of an audience.

"Bad Manors" has shown early indications of making solid sales gains in the U.S. where it is released on the Paramount label. It's expected the label will re-issue "Oh What A Feeling" in view of the excitement now being generated throughout the U.S. September and October will be

spent further softening U.S. audiences with personal appearances across that country. Their second album should be on the market by that time. They leave for dates in Europe after their U.S. concert tour.

"Happy People" is their current single happener and it would appear to be picking up national action.

Daffodil prexy, Frank Davies, swears that all that has changed about Crowbar is their bank accounts, claiming "They have maintained that same sense of humour which pervades their music."

When Trudeau asked them how they had come upon their name — wording it as: "Do you pry open peoples' minds or something?", Roly Greenway, bass guitar for Crowbar answered with "We used to play with Ronnie Hawkins, and when we left him, he said we were a good group but that we could mess up a crowbar in about 15 seconds".

Drummer Sonny Bernardi took advantage of the situation and cracked: "No he didn't say exactly that. He said that we could fuddle duddle a crowbar in about 15 seconds.". Both the Trudeaus seemed to prefer the latter.

RPM maintains a Canadian approach to one of the fastest growing music nations in the world.

So, this week we say goodbye to a "real trouper" and a column many of you will miss — and I number among "that many".

### PRESSURES AND INTERFERENCE

International pressures are something we have discussed in this column for many weeks now. Some of you have pooh-poohed the idea. I think the current rash of "interference" is just the beginning.

Meanwhile, we should look at the value of exerting international pressures. In a country where nationalism is at a high point, it is somewhat foolish for "outsiders" to pressure Canada — and Canadians.

But what can you say about a country where SOME stations are programmed OUTSIDE Canada — licensed in Canada, but programmed OUTSIDE? What can you say when it has been proven that some stations broadcast MORE than 70% foreign content on AM radio? Radio stations have broken the law while they have been given the privilege of using the Canadian airwaves for commercial purposes. What can you say when industry, resources; culture and our thinking is slowly leaving our control?

You would probably say that this is a country suffering from "international pressures" — and perhaps it is time to think about making North America ONE LARGE NATION with a constitution that would guarantee "liberty and freedom for all...."

THAT's "International pressure". If you like it, let us know.



### INTERNATIONAL PRESSURES ???

After reading Ritchie's article on the problems Canadian performers have getting work permits for the U.S., I feel strongly that the suggestion of retaliation is premature. I know the H-1 and H-2 permit problems are very restrictive, but, to date, I don't feel there has been enough political involvement on the part of the Canadian Government, or by the A.F. of M. Perhaps continual pressure by each

and every professional musician on their union will finally force action. This is up to the musicians themselves They must organize, both locally and nationally, and let their union know the commitment of their members to this ussue.

Making it harder for U.S. performers to work in Canada might end up causing the U.S. Government to retaliate by excluding Canadians completely. or on the one for one exchange basis as applies to England, which would be even worse.

Perhaps militancy is the answer, but let's not create greater problems by being premature.

## Kristofferson closes ten day Riverboat gig

Kris Kristofferson, Monument recording artist and one of the most rapidly rising country/pop songwriters, played to packed houses for ten days at Toronto's Riverboat. Among those who dropped in to see Kristofferson and his back-up group were Gordon Lightfoot, Ramblin' Jack Elliot and Ronnie Hawkins.

While in Toronto Kristofferson participated in a heavy schedule of interviews with radio, press and television types. Among them were the CBC's Elwood Glover, Mike Byford (CKFH), CBC Radio, Pop and Beetle magazines and the Toronto dailies.

Kristofferson will appear in Toronto again in the fall, prior to which he will fly in for a stint on the CFTO-produced "Rollin" Down The River" series. Mike Doyle of London Records, distributors of the Monument line, re-

ports that Kristofferson's latest album, "The Silver Tongued Devil and I", in racking up heavy sales throughout the country.

# GRT signs Woodstock's Joshua to contract

GRT's vice-president and general manager, Ross ¬ ynolds, has completed negotiations with Harry Hinde Productions for the distribution of single and album product by Joshua, a Woodstock-based group.

Initial release will be "Throw A Rope" which was produced by Hinde at Toronto's Eastern Sound Studios. The single will be released to coincide with GRT's national convention to take place in Toronto August 12 and 13.

Highlight of the convention will be the CKOC-GRT presentation of GRT recording acts at Hamilton's Wentworth Arena, the evening of the 13th.

## Healthy fall plan from Capitol Canada

Arnold Gosewich, president Capitol Records (Canada), reports encouraging sales increases for the first quarter. The firm's fiscal year ended June 30th with net sales for the full year levelling out to what the firm had established as their sales goal.

# Sweeping changes for CMA booking assault

Capricorn Music Associates (CMA) of Toronto has announced sweeping new changes, including personnel to prepare for the Fall booking season.

Mr. Jim McBain has been appointed business administrator and staff coordinator with Mr. Jack T. Morrow taking on duties as consultant for the ever-expanding and highly competitive hotel and lounge activity.

CMA now has an outstanding line-up of Canadian rock and folk artists, several of whom have released record product. It's reported that CMA are in a most favourable position to capitalize on the greatly expanding hotel and lounge requirements.

Sammy-Jo, who handles public relations for CMA, has left for an extended talent and public relations tour. He is being accompanied by Jack T. Morrow. Their itinerary includes stops in Montreal, New York, several centres on the U.S. Atlantic Seaboard as well as major centres in Canada's Atlantic Provinces. It's expected the tour will increase their facilities for the booking of artists on both sides of the border.

# Legere's Town & Country in third year

Toronto's Town & Country agency, headed up by Bill Legere, celebrates its third anniversary and chalks up its biggest year since its inception. The agency, which is quite diversified, has moved into larger quarters at 245 Lakeshore Drive.

T&C, originally formed to look after country acts only, branched out into the more commercial field and found the returns more than encouraging. Rick Adams has been handling much of this action and supplying employment for groups such as Christopher Edward Campaign, Rubberband and fifteen other commercial groups. The Legere firm is booking on the average of 55 acts each week and supplies entertainment for 135 rooms throughout Ontario province.


Some of the country names handled by T&C include: Con Archer/Boot; Dotty Randall and the Davidson County Line/Cascade; Graeme Harris Duo/Dominion; Bobby Rowan/Vintage; Arlene Gordon/Hilite; Honey West/ Paragon; Gleasonnaires/Boot The month of July has ended up showing 17% over their quota for the month.

Capitol have just launched their Stocking Plan for the month of August and Gosewich reports the response from retailers and rackers as being "exceptionally good". The plan offers healthy incentives to the dealers for the purchase of catalogue product.

On the Cancon front the label has chalked up a fair to good year with most of the sales action going to Anne Murray product. Her latest single, "Talk It Over In The Morning" was written by Paul Williams who penned "Close To You" and "Rainy Days and Monday" for the

Carpenters. Miss Murray's session was produced by Brian Aherne, in Los Angeles. Brass and strings for the session were arranged by Rick Wilkins. The first week of release for this new Murray deck has shown such a high degree of programmer and dealer interest that Capitol has ordered an additional 20,000 as a second pressing.

Capitol has budgeted extra promotion dollars for the coming year in an attempt to keep their Cancon ball rolling. Although Miss Murray would appear to be the only one in their Canadian roster to have struck gold, the overall acceptance by the programmers and public to other Capitol artists would indicate a general warming toward Canadian disc talent.



## There is competition on the way

Many moons ago when I began this series of articles I started off by concentrating on contracts. I intend to finish up my set of lectures on the exoteric art of contracting yourself into and out of trouble but, before I do, I would like to bring to your attention a piece of legislation presently in the works that is going to hit entertainment from a brand-new direction.

The Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs is out to get you.

Now that is not as heavy as it sounds. What I mean is that he is going to get you into an area controlled by legislation coming out of his department.

In the past this has been impossible because the only Federal Act that might have been applied, the Combines Investigation Act (which regulates price-fixing, monopolies, and certain advertising practices) could not be used because it was specifically restricted to any trade or profession dealing in "articles of commerce". That means things you can reach out and touch.

So, while it covered the possibility of price-fixing for phonograph records, (how come records all sell for only 3 or 4 given prices — perhaps Mr. Basford should look into this) the Depart-

ment had nothing to do with the cost of the material that went on the disc. If every record company should decide that the standard royalty was going to be 1¢ a record and they all signed firm and binding contracts to this effect, there might be all kinds of hell to pay in the United States (which has a much broader anti-trust law than we do) but nothing could be done about it in Canada until now.

The new Act (which as yet is only a Bill that has been tabled in the House of Commons and probably won't be passed in any final form for over a year) covers goods and services.

It's going to be fun fitting this one into the entertainment business. For example, it does not include union activities, so the A.F. of M. and AGVA are exempt, as far as their own fee schedules go. And it may very well be that the unions are authorized to set manager's and agent's commissions under section 89 of the Bill ("Nothing in this Act applies in respect of....activities of persons who

are authorized to engage in collective bargaining.....to the extent that such activities are.....reasonably necessary for the protection of such persons acting in the capacities in which they are so authorized to engage in collective bargaining".) Or, on the other hand, this might not cover it and, if so, the Canadian unions, at any rate, may have to delete from their contracts the provisions setting such fees.

I trust the unions are studying the Bill.

## Smith looks at the hole thing

### (Viewpoint) Jim Smith

This is a column about holes. Not the usual holes of which my reasoning is frequently accused of being full. No, these holes are the ones you find, if you are lucky, in the centre of your records.

You know the type. They're round, sometimes — and they come in a variety of sizes — the basic off-the-rack holes and an exotic variety of custom-made sizes.

(A historical note; no one really knows who invented the first hole. However, it must have taken no small measure of genius to realize that something useful could be made out of nothing. Even more important is the fact that something must actually be taken away to form the nothing which is a hole.)

The standard model holes are found in the 45 RPM disc and the 78, 33 1/3 (hereafter known as the 33), and 16 RPM discs. 45s are the small records with the big holes. 78s and 33s are the big discs with the small holes. Lord knows what a 16 RPM disc looks like — perhaps it is only a myth perpetuated by the gremlins who mark the speeds on record changers.

The 45 is a wonder in itself. It comes off the press, all new and glossy, with a small hole like the 33 version. Then modern technology comes into play. The 45 with the small centre hole (discretely covered to conceal its abnormal characteristic) is taken to another machine which replaces the little hole in the little record with a big hole. That way you can tell this is a 45.

Then the record goes to the store and,

Happy customer looks first at his new 45 with its aesthetically graceful large hole, then at his turntable with its puny centre spindle. So he inserts a plastic centre-piece into the big centre hole, which makes it a small centre hole not unlike the original hole that came off the press. Or he puts a big spindle over the little spindle, which is an aberration utterly divorced from the original concept of aesthetic centre holes.

Science has triumphed once again. Instead of merely taking the 45 as it comes off the press, society now benefits from two additional operations that lesser minds would overlook. First removing the centre, later replacing it. In an age when social scientists are concerned with how man will fill his rapidly increasing leisure time, the technology of the 45 centre hole must be heartily empraced

And remember the economic advantages In the midst of a recession, resources lie unused, contributing to social waste. These otherwise idle resources are channeled into the production of the centre hole. Metal is used to manufacture the large-hole stampers. Plastic builds replacement centres. Manpower goes into the production of both stampers and centres, not to mention the operation of the stampers and insertion of the centres.

(Second historical note: archeologists recently discovered the ruins of a highly cultured ancient civilization in Mesopotamia which existed entirely for the stamping and re-insertion of centre holes. All of northern Africa and the Middle East was dependent on this nation for supplying large holes and fillers.)

Certain underdeveloped regions, such as Britain, have failed to appreciate the intrinsic merit in the multi-fold operation. This is clearly a resurgence of incipient barbarism in the race, being a throwback to the days of the Celts and other uncivilized beings. Only a barbarian could fail to appreciate the aesthetics of organized waste.

Even if one fails to accept the social and economic importance of the 45 centre, the equity case is overwhelming. RCA first introduced the large centre as a form of product differentiation, little realizing how future generations would remain eternally indebted to this apparently modest step. Accompanying the little record with the large hole was a little record player with a large hole. The machine was a 45 rpm record player. The large centre spindle was eminently unsuitable for the traditional 78s or the new Columbia 33s. Moreover there was no

# Maple Music Junket - a departure

The following is a detailed proposal of what the Maple Music Junket should be. It is now a case of raising the money to make it possible. Read on

and judge for yourself, just how much a high key promotion this would be for the Canadian music business.

### THE MAPLE MUSIC JUNKET

A PROPOSAL TO FLY IN A LARGE NUMBER OF EUROPEAN PRESS PEOPLE TO WITNESS THE CANA-DIAN MUSIC SCENE AT FIRST HAND AND TO SPEND THREE DAYS IN THIS COUNTRY.

#### PURPOSE

Although Canadian music has of late been making a great deal of noise and money in both Canada and the United States, these contributions would appear to have fallen on deaf ears in Europe and the United Kingdom.

For example, the Bells' hit of Stay Awhile (recorded in Montreal) sold well in excess of 1,000,000 copies in North America (which brought a minimum of \$50,000 into Canada in royalties), it did not sell 1000 copies in England.

The Guess Who from Winnipeg have had 12 hit singles and six hit albums in the United States, and expect to earn more than \$5-million this year. Yet only one of their records, American Woman, realized a position on the English Top 30 best selling records, and it was not a high position.

In 1970, 16 Canadian records made the U.S. best selling charts, while only two of these (Anne Murray's Snow Bird and American Woman by the Guess Who) managed to attain any chart success in England or continental Europe.

In short, Canadian music has been getting the short end of the stick in Europe. A number of reasons could be brought forward to account for this, but the principal reason would seem to be the lack of promotion and publicity for Canadian artists in Europe and England.

Ritchie Yorke, Canada's most widely syndicated music journalist and a frequent European visitor, claims that Canadian music and musicians are virtually unknown in that part of the world. Mr. Yorke further notes that although Canada generally

follows the American charts (in terms of local airplay and record sales) this is not the case in England. Barely one in ten American hits become a hit in Europe and the U.K., according to Mr. Yorke.

Mr. Yorke has discussed this situation at length with many prominent people in the European music industry. Mr. Andy Gray, the editor of New Musical Express (published in England and the largest selling weekly music paper in the world) believes that the only way to focus attention on Canadian music is by bringing the European opinion-makers (music critics, disc jockeys, radio station programmers, paper editors etc.) to Canada for a close look at just what is happening here.

Mr. Gray says that such "junkets" are standard practice in European music press circles, and Mr. Gray himself makes annual visits to South America, Greece, Brussels, Rome and Paris covering such events as music festivals and appearances by English groups.

Mr. Gray also notes the long-term benefits of such a Junket. Although each writer may only actually print two or three stories on Canadian music immediately after the Junket, his impressions remain with him considerably longer and inevitably turn up in later stories.

### THE GROWTH IN CANADIAN MUSIC

Two years ago, Canadian music was virtually a non-existent species. Canadian radio stations did not play records by Canadians, and this country's contributions to the world of music were pitifully small.

Now however, there has been a vast improvement. In his forthcoming book on Canadian music (Axes Chops and Hot Licks, which is being published in October by M.G. Hurtig Ltd.) Ritchie Yorke says that Canadian music is probably the fastest growing industry in the country. Two years ago, there was next to nothing. In 1971, it has been estimated that Canadian music will bring some \$10-million into Canada from diverse international sources. The potential for growth is also enormous.

But such growth will only be realized by an investment in the future by the Canadian music industry and the Canadian Government (whose stake in any cultural growth, and for that matter, economic growth, is enormous). That is the reason for this proposed venture.

#### **SPECIFICS**

The Maple Music Junket was first brought to the attention of the Canadian music industry through an article in RPM Magazine (the weekly trade publication of the Canadian music industry).

The response to the idea was extremely good. The sum of \$2000 was immediately pledged by two Canadian personal managers. The services of five top Canadian artists (Guess Who, Ocean, Crowbar, King Biscuit Boy and Bruce Cockburn) were offered to entertain the visiting press.

It is felt by the editors of RPM and Gravevine (the Canadian music consumer publication) that half of the estimated cost of the venture could be raised privately within the domestic music industry. This would be in the form of personal pledges to a fund to be set up for the Junket. However, it is highly unlikely that the total cost could be absorbed by the people involved in the industry. It is hoped that the Canadian Government (through the auspices of the Secretary of State, the Canadian Travel Bureau, Canada Council and the Department of Industry Trade and Commerce) would subsidize the event in the interests of balance of payments, recognition of Canadian musicians internationally, and greater acceptance of these talents in the domestic marketplace. What is good for the Canadian music industry would seem to also be beneficial to Canada as a whole.

The Maple Music Junket would be supported by RPM and Grapevine magazine jointly, with an executive committee to be appointed. Several prominent Canadian music industry executives have already indicated their willingness to aid in the organization of the Junket.


The Junket would take place in Toronto over a three-day period and would concentrate on English Canadian music since this primarily is the language of the international record buyer. English music (be it from Canada, the U.S. or England) has, through the years, shown an ability to transcend language barriers. However, since some of the people to be invited would have an interest in French music, it is planned to present at least two French Canadian artists in concert during the Junket, and also to feature at least one prominent French Canadian authority on domestic music on a speaker's forum.

A minimum of 100 European and English press people would be invited to join the Junket. This would cover writers, radio and TV people, editors and columnists from the following countries: England, France, Spain, Italy, Austria, Switzerland, Germany, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Greece, Holland, Portugal, and perhaps even Iron Curtain countries. The actual list is now being com-

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



way of adapting that large spindle to the smaller centre holes.

Of course everyone has seen one of these 45 players in use recently. It has only been fifteen years since they were discontinued. Later models, a degenerate concession to public bad taste, had adaptable spindles. But somewhere, someone may still be using a 45 player (which came with a permanent stylus) and the industry has a moral commitment to keep him serviced. You'll recall that only this devotion to the consumer has prompted the industry to continue servicing 4 track tape player owners.

So clearly the case for the large 45 centre hole is unimpeachable. Let's fight to keep the little record with the big hole.

While we're considering holes, let's also thank the little man who comes around and fills in part of the standard 33 hole, thereby making the hole a custom job. Although the little man's official title is Executive Vice-President In Charge Of Hole Filling, he is usually referred to as the hole filler.

# Ampex equipment for new Columbia flick

Ampex equipment received a large sized boost from the movie industry with the opening of Columbia Pictures' "The Anderson Tapes" In fact, Ampex equipment shares the billing with stars Sean Connery and Dyan Cannon.

The title alone is a pretty good indication of how important Ampex must be in the film. An Ampex videotape recorder is seen in the opening shot, behind the titles and in closing, giving instructions to erase a tape. The Ampex logo on audio and video equipment is flashed on the screen more than 20 times during the 90 minute film.

Recording equipment for the film was loaned by the Los Angeles Ampex sales office with technical assistance in setting up the operating of the audio and video recorders being supplied by Ampex technicians.

At the Hollywood premiere (June 23) Ampex set up a lobby display of the equipment used in the film, which added to its importance when seen on the screen.

Ampex has become increasingly important in the supplying of props for television and Hollywood-type productions. Another incident of use was during the filming of "The New Leaf" which stars Walter Matthau and Elaine May. An Ampex recorder is seen on a bookshelf in one of the living room scenes. This recorder was supplied by the Ampex Public Relations office in New York.

(Fortunately he does not stand on formality.)

Recent samplings of new pressings reveals that the hole filler has become more efficient. Undoubtedly he improves with practice.

Anyway, an increasing number of releases have proven to be incompatible with an automatic changer. Which is fortunate because reaming the custom centres with a letter opener, knife, or pair of scissors is a good exercise in occupational therapy. Moreover in a time of stultifying lack of challenge, the risk of too much reaming, making the once too-small hole too-large is a welcome experience. One slip and the record will change automatically or manually — on its own time.

Without the friendly hole filler, more and more records would be finding their way onto the turntables of the nation. And everyone knows that all the damage to grooves takes place on the turntable.

All along you thought that the hole filler was merely sloppy production. Guess he fooled you.






As the MacManus lid was descending the Eastern Canadian charts, MacManus and A&M's Liam Mullan were hustling the single in the all important Vancouver market — with good results.

The overall sales picture for the "Sunshower" single shows it as having sold in excess of 4000 copies and receiving important plays on both MOT and MOR stations in British Columbia and Alberta. Gerry Lacoursiere, director of A&M (Canada) is now confident that the MacManus Western junket could establish him as a major seller for the label.

### Bells' album Gold Leaf Award winner

The Bells' Polydor album, "Stay Awhile" has been certified Gold, in Canada. In applying for the RPM Gold Leaf Award certification, Polydor's Lori Bruner pointed up the fact that the group's single under the same title also received Canadian Gold as well as hitting the magic million mark in the U.S.

Edgar Winter's White Trash is the latest band to really hit. Everyone is talking about them and their Southern funkiness, good old rock and roll music. Crowbar went over very well all week too.....

The day before I arrived there was a huge party for Alice Cooper and the San Francisco Cockettes, with all of the Hollywood freaks in attendance, outrageously costumed. Everyone here is still talking about it — Miss Mercy of the GTOs even jumped out

of a cake....it sounded just like another night at Max's Kansas City to me.....

Then I went to Dallas for one night to see Three Dog Night perform in front of 30,000 people at the Cotton Bowl stadium. Although one cannot walk around in a beautiful countryside atmosphere in a stadium, it is a far better compromise than an abortive festival. At least it's outdoors. Three Dog Night were tremendously professional.....they really are a polished act. ## Angus Walker prepped for Prime Minister

Ben Kerr,innovator of many "off-beat" but effective country promotions, has laid a king-sized basher on Rodeo recording artist, Angus Walker. Kerr has set Walker up to run for Prime Minister.

Kerr, who was behind the successful promotion of "Chaser For The Blues" for Columbia's Bernie Early and just recently for Russ Wheeler who released the single on the Rodeo label, also penned Al Hooper's "Washington D.C." deck. It was with the release of the latter single that Kerr came up with the idea of running Hooper for President of the United Stations. This one worked so well, Hooper's manager.

## Much set to release new Pagliaro single

Brian Chater, of the Montreal-based Much Productions, reports the label ready to bow a new single by Montreal's popular Pagliaro. Titled "Loving You Ain't So Easy" f/s "She Walks Light", Chater intends to push the deck heavily in Canada. He expects to announce release dates for the U.S. and Europe, shortly.

Canadian release date is set at August 20th. Much is distributed in Canada by London Records. Jack Hosier, received a letter from the White House acknowledging the disc.

Walker was taken up with the President deal and asked Kerr to pen a Canadian version and run him for Prime Minister of Canada. No challenge is too great for Kerr, and a matter of a couple of hours later, Walker had his song — "Parliament Hill", rushed into the studios and was on the market within a couple of days.

"Parliament Hill" wasn't that strong an item on its own but the combined efforts of Kerr and Walker prompted solid airplay among their old time country radio personalities. This has since spilled over into several other effective markets, resulting in "Parliament Hill" becoming an important addition to the RPM Country Fifty.

Walker is no novice to this game. In 1965 he had the No.2 country hit with "Cadillacin" Around — and because of this Rodeo disc, he was voted Most Promising Male Country Singer (RPM Gold Leaf Awards) for the same year. He made another stab at the country charts with "Crazy Tricks" but then unfortunately disappeared from the scene.

This fine Nova Scotian talent bounced back, briefly, with his "My Wife's Liberation Front", which was almost immediately banned although it did become the prize possession of many country radio personalities. The flip of this disc, "Canadian Country Music Man" made a good showing and resulted in the "Canada's Country Music Man" tag for him. Walker has just completed a tour with Don Messer and will be seen frequently on the CBC-TV Network this coming fall.

piled from a standpoint of size of market (i.e. England and Germany will be strongly represented since they are the two largest record markets in Europe). Preliminary discussions indicate much interest in the Junket in Europe.

The invitation list would include the cream of the European youth press, and would provide a unique opportunity for the promotion of Canada as a tourist location. There has never been such a concentrated gathering of the European youth press on Canadian soil.

We feel that the Junket would have to be scheduled outside of the winter months. Spring or Fall would seem ideal, with our preference being this October since the purpose of the Junket pre-supposes a sense of immediacy and need for action.

The Maple Music Junket, we firmly believe, represents a unique opportunity for the Canadian Government to further demonstrate its belief in the growth and widening acceptance of Canadian music throughout the world

The Canadian Radio-Television Commission decision to impose a domestic content ruling on AM broadcasters made a Canadian music industry possible. The time has now come to capitalize on the very real and very large potential of Canadian music on a global basis.


### "INTERNATIONAL PRESSURE"


While I will continue to work with RPM as a supporter of this magazine and the music industry in Canada, this will be the last time this column will appear in RPM.

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
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# THIS ALBUM'S THE REAL THING

What all this is leading to is that John Denver has just released his new LP and it is the real thing, the genuine article. He's been around and paid his dues and this album is filled with the same kind of music he's been doing for years. Except maybe a little better this time.

The album is just the finest thing to listen to that I've run across in a long time. It's so mellow it just kind of lays you back naturally and leaves you feeling good for the rest of the day. Seven of the 12 titles are tunes John either wrote or collaborated on, and four of these are in the "great" category. Both sides of his new single are really fine and "My Sweet Lady" and "Sunshine On My Shoulders" are a couple of the prettiest songs I have ever heard anywhere. His version of McCartney's "Junk" and "Let It Be" and JT's "Fire and Rain" are the only ones I've heard that could rival the originals. He sings them like they were his own, rather than someone else's.

Try this one on for size and see if you don't agree with me. If this album doesn't make it big there are going to be a lot of people that have missed out on some mighty fine music.
