RCA Records and Tapes

Record execs tribute to RCA's departing Cook

Members of the Canadian Recording Industry Association (CRIA) and invited guests gathered at the Canadiana Room of the Prince Hotel (16) to pay tribute to Bob Cook. The former vice president and general manager of RCA Canada's Record Division has been appointed managing director RCA (Australia).

Speaking on behalf of the CRIA, Terry Lynd, vice president of the Association and president of Columbia Records (Canada) referred to Mr. Cook as being "An Ambassador of the Canadian recording industry" and paid tribute to his efforts in contribu-

ting to the domestic recording scene. A genuine Canadian Eskimo carving was presented to Cook as a memento of his five year stay in Canada.

In accepting the gift and tribute, Cook touched on several highlights that occurred over the five years - and in particular the satisfaction in watching new Canadian talent emerge as professionals in their field and accepted on a national scale.

Mr. Cook and his wife will spend Christmas in the U.S. and celebrate the New Year in Australia.

Quality strengthens Cancon promotion

In a move "designed to focus more attention on its Canadian acts", Quality Records have announced the appointment of Nick Panaseiko to the post of Promotion Manager (Canadian Content).

In making the announcement, Quality director of National Promotion, Gene Lew talked about his company's ever-increasing roster of Quality Canadian acts.

"We've been leaders in the Cancon field for quite some time now", said Lew, "and we have some excellent product scheduled for release in the near future. As a result, we saw this as an opportune time to take on someone to promote our National releases."

Since his intro to the music industry in '63, Nick Panaseiko has been involved with promotion, publicity, sales and talent management.

During the sixties, Panaseiko worked as a sales rep for Decca Records and then went on to hold a similar position with Polydor.

Nick was also owner and operator of the London disco, "Thee Image."

Panaseiko joined Quality's national promo staff on November 17th.

Dan Hill does it "live" with CHUM FM broadcast

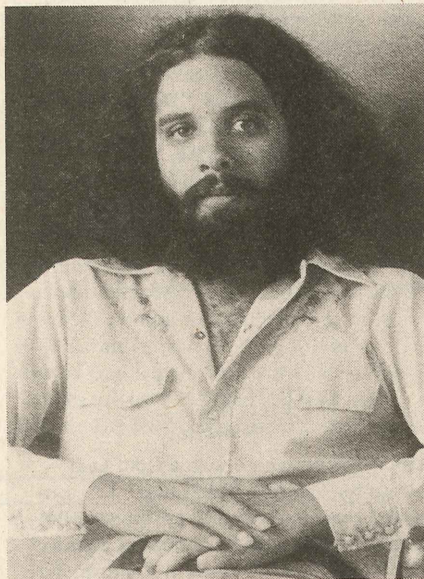
Canada's gentle folk giant, Dan Hill, is about to emerge as an international music force. He has now established himself in Canada's major markets and is showing early indications of breaking in the U.S.. His single, "Growing Up", in which he uses the classic line "Growing up in the shade of the U.S.A.", registers a No. 54 with a bullet this week on the RPM 100 Singles chart (2nd week on chart).

A befitting tribute to Hill's efforts was CHUM FM's return to "progressive" radio and a "live" broadcast of Hill's concert at the Riverboat. This was the first time in four years that the one-time "progressive" giant had experimented with creative radio. The last time was a Gold Leaf presentation and concert of Lighthouse from Toronto's Science Centre emceed by Larry Green.

Hill is a natural and his professionalism was evident as he breezed through sixty minutes of his own original music and a steady patter of humour and down-to-earth personal happenings that kept his audience hanging on every word. While Hill remained relaxed, his audience was tense - concerned whether he was going to make it. When they realized he was doing it their energy began to flow and eventually matched that coming from Hill.

It was a sixty minute trip through the pages of Hill's life "Love transcends all

colours" as he sang of a very personal experience that made him the product of the minority and majority races. He also put into beautiful words some of the episodes of love that touched his life.

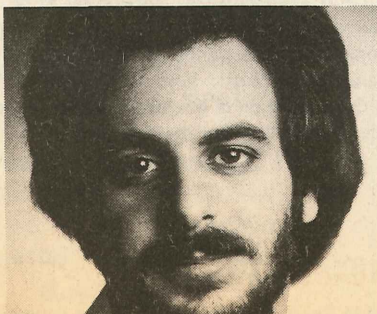

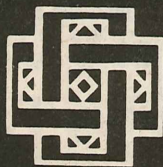
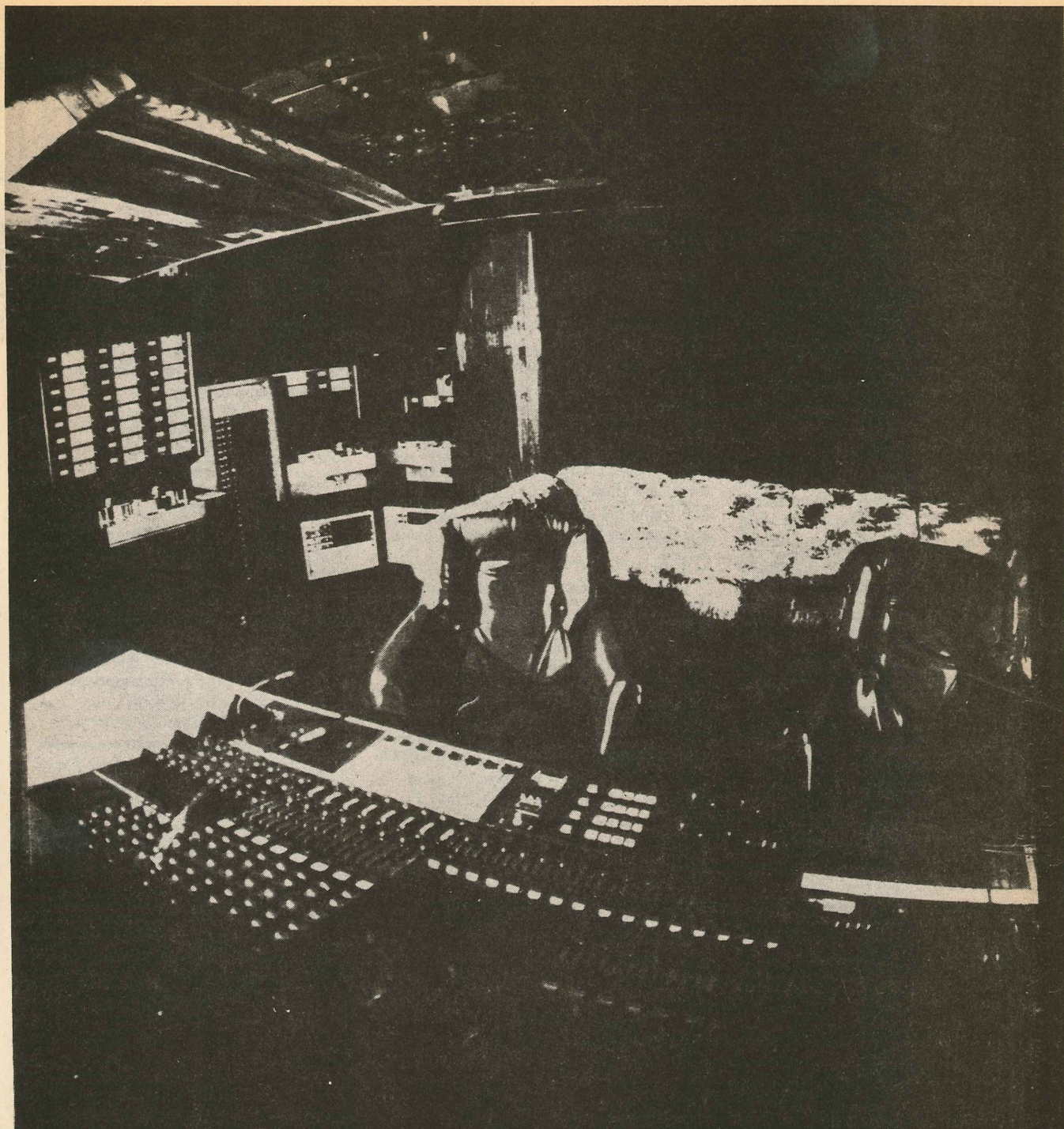

WRAP UP

Record industry flourishing while world markets flounder

With most industries reporting losses over the past twelve month period, the record industry is living up to its claim of being recession-proof. Album and single prices are higher, yet the demand at the retail level has been "staggering" in some cases with record companies reporting increases of up to 40%.

Ken Middleton, president of WEA Music of Canada, told RPM: "The past year has been excellent for us. We are far ahead of the prior year. I look forward to a good year.

This latter three months of 1975 indicated to the total industry that there is no recession in the record business and everybody can look forward to a very healthy 1976."

Stan Kulin, president of United Artists Records (Canada), was also impressed with the progress the industry had made over the past year. He noted: "We were delighted to see that our sales were up 20% over the

previous year - thanks mainly to a very good second half of the year." Canadian product also figured in the increase at U.A. "We were rather surprised at the acceptance of Canadian product", said Kulin, adding "our

experience with Canadian MOR product was very good, particularly with the Keith Barrie and Craig Ruhnke type of material." For 1976 Kulin says: "We're looking forward to a very good 1976 because I think the record industry has come out of the so-called recession and the acceptance of product at the retail level seems to be much wider than it was in previous years. I feel '76 will be very prosperous for all of us."

Arnold Gosewich, president of Capitol Records/EMI Canada was encouraged by the industry's progress, generally last year. He told RPM: "The year 1975 began like the proverbial hesitant, unsure lamb but is finishing like the roar of the confident lion. Consumer acceptance of recorded product has been very high in the last half and this has been mirrored by what appears to be un-

precedented demand for product by retailers and rack jobbers. The year also saw the emergence of a number of fine new talents whose career growth opportunity in 1976 looks extremely good.

"Despite the uncertainties that still exist in our economy, I anticipate that 1976 will continue to show a reasonable upward curve of results in the Canadian record industry. The growth opportunity will, however, necessitate more sophisticated marketing practices and higher standards of performance than presently exists at almost all levels. I also believe that in 1976 we will see stronger evidence of position by the industry, through its Associations, with levels of Government, on how best to create an environment of profit potential within the domestic record producing sector."

RCA's new vice president and general manager (Record Division) Ed Preston summed up his company's past year with: "75 can best be summarized as 'That Wonderful Year' - the year it really came together for us and Bob Cook.

Hits hits and more hits. Gold & Platinum records all over the place - Carol Douglas, Hues Corporation, George McCrae and Gwen McCrae, K.C. & Sunshine Band hit

with 2 gold singles and a gold album. Roger Whittaker with 2 gold albums and John Denver went bananas with 2 gold and 3 platinum. David Bowie popped through for his first Canadian gold (single and LP) and the Jefferson Starship returned with "Miracles" and gold record LP sales. Joe Dassin repeated in Quebec with another Golden year and the tremendous Disco success of the Quebec market finally spread to Toronto and the rest of Canada.

"The factory production reached an all time

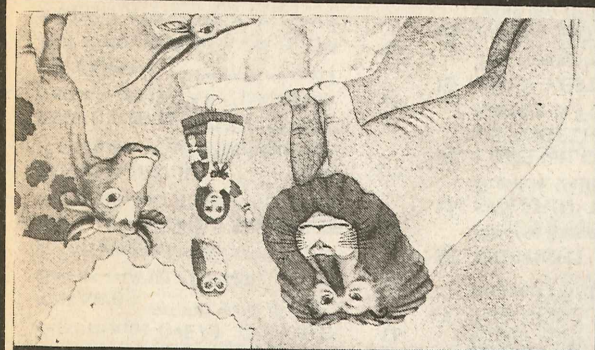

"Much credit is due to Bob Cook who did a remarkable job in his years in Canada and can leave for his new position in Australia proud of his many accomplishments." What's Preston looking for in 1976? "As for '76 we're running in hard. It's the year of the Olympics and we'll be fighting for No. 1."

Fraser Jamieson, president of London Records (Canada) closed off the year finally winning the battle of the presses. "We've finally got the kinks ironed out of the pressing plant and it looks as if it's finally settled down." He continued with "We've had the

best year ever and I think the next year will be even better. If you look at the way the people are selling stereo components - the advertising and hard sell that goes along with it - if people are buying this equipment it stands to reason they're going to need records and tapes. So, if the equipment pic-

ture is true and I don't have any reason to doubt it, obviously the record business will do well." Jamieson was also encouraged by the upward trend in the cassette market. "There has been an obvious upswing in the acceptance of cassettes", he noted, adding: "The latter part of this year has indicated to us that there is a definite move toward this type of entertainment and again, I think the sale of cassette hardware has increased which has helped the cassette market."

Terry Lynd, president of Columbia Records (Canada), summed up this past year with: "I'm truly gratified to see the improvement in the total industry situation in the latter months of 1975 and I feel very confident about the year 1976 in total. I sincerely believe that the quality of product that has been brought to the market and the total expansion of the retail trade was a definite plus in 1975. I can foresee the continuation of this trend in 1976."

Shawne worked a while with Toronto's Sweet Blindness, but Blindness manager Barry Cobus hitched her with her present musicians. The result is strong performances and together studio work.

They opened the Guess Who concerts at the CNE, Ottawa and Hamilton last summer with no trouble at all. She loves performing but now is excited by the challenge of recording. "It's more like acting - you've got to get yourself in the mood for the material."

While she was not singing she was learning fashion and modelling. Her stage presence shows she could teach either one.

Her health rules out constant stage work and she's breaking after December. She looks forward to the time, not to rest, but to work on her material. She writes her

own songs now "I've got about 18 of them to finish as soon as I get some spare time." She's also resuming her vocal training.

RCA will keep her busy. They're culling a new single release from her album. RCA's Tom Berry wants her to present some displays of her fashion work to go along with their promo campaign.

Shawne is personally excited about her songwriting. Her lyrics mix well with Troiano's danceable soul-sound and ballad compositions.

"I used to want to be a star but now I don't care if they know who I am. Just so they listen to my records, cover my songs and let me sing once in a while."

"Santa Jaws" is wrapping up its seasonal run with mixed reviews across Canada and record-counter success.

"It's the biggest thing since 'The Streak'" reports CJC Woodstock, New Brunswick. The record was banned in North Bay after a listener phone-in survey. "It's about 50-50" A&M's Kate Elliot reports, "people either love it or they're disgusted."

"Santa Jaws" by Toronto's Homemade Theatre, features a great white shark Santa who eats his reindeer and is well on its way to becoming the first underground novelty number. With very little airplay, A&M has already moved 83,000 copies.

Pet Fair stores in Ontario are giving away copies of the Christmas killer cut with their aquarium starter kits. The blood-and-guts Santa number has been programmed in fun-loving U.S. cities Buffalo and Dallas.

Columbia's disco product top priority for action

10 of 14 titles on the priority list for pressing at Columbia are of the disco variety. Topping the list is the Silver Convention's "Fly Robin Fly", a European lease deal secured by Gary Salter and distributed by Columbia. Also from the Silver Convention fold is lead singer Penny McLean with her entry of "Lady Bump" which has sold more than 20,000 copies (Dec 15) in the Montreal area and strictly through its popularity at the discos. The single is beginning to emerge in Toronto where it has been given an added boost from CFTR. Released in the U.S. on the Atco label, the single shipped 90,000 to the New York area in the first week of release.

Other titles now established as disco giants are: "You Set My Heart On Fire"/Tina Charles, "Do It Any Way You Wanna"/People's Choice, "Sing A Song"/Earth, Wind & Fire, "I Love Music"/The O'Jays "Wake Up Everybody"/Harold Melvin & The Bluenotes, "Nursery Rhymes"/People's Choice and Labelle's "Far As We Felt Like Goin".

Columbia makes changes in western region promo

Wes Franchek moves from the Capitol sales camp to take over promotion for Columbia. He will be responsible for the Alberta and Saskatchewan region.

Franchek was one of the top salesmen for Capitol but was apparently very much interested in the promotion field, hence his move to Columbia. Ironically, he was recently honoured by Capitol as Best Salesman of the Year.

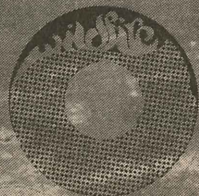

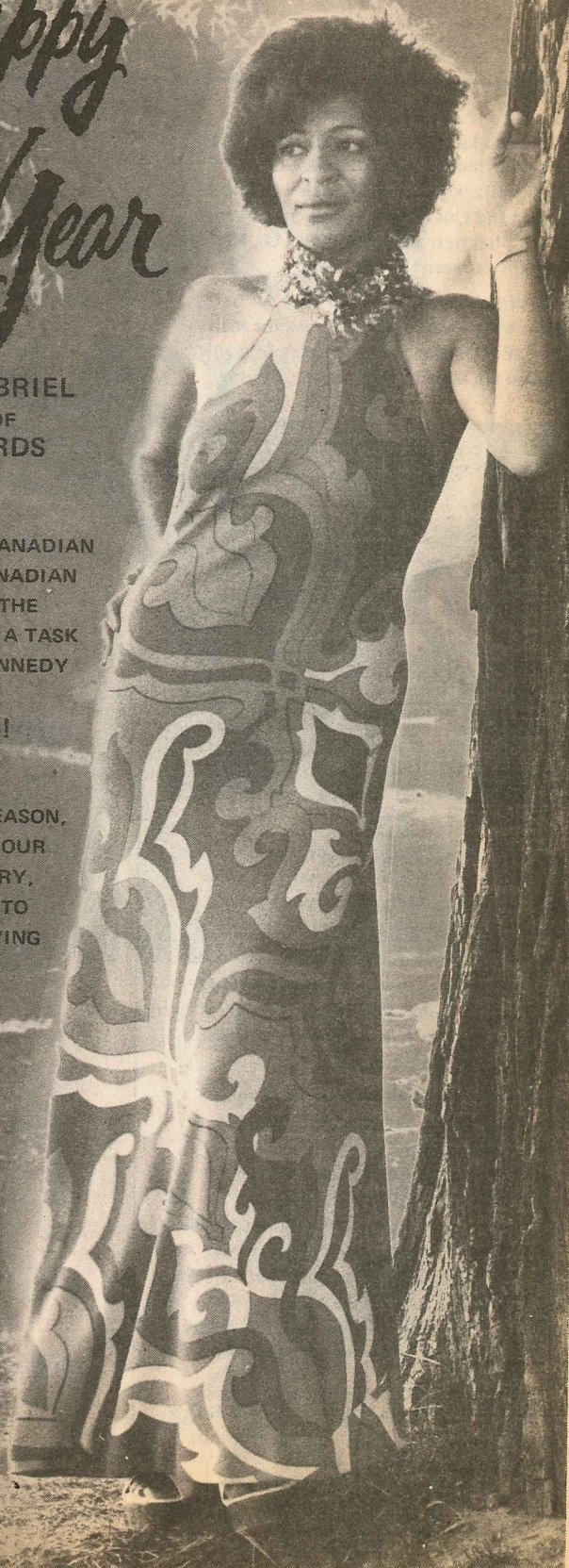

INDUSTRY continued from page 13 tury. It's encouraging that November turned out to be the best month in our history.

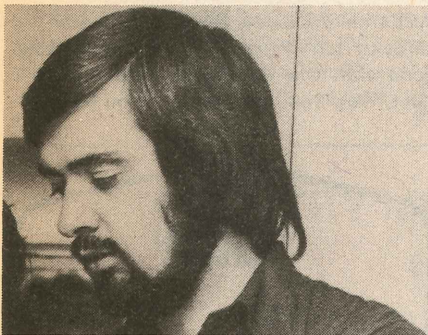
"GRT's involvement in Canadian production increased significantly in 1975. So far the results are encouraging with the emergence of new artists such as Dan Hill, Shooter and Brutus in addition to strong sales of albums by Moe Koffman, Lighthouse, Downchild and Ian Thomas. Also GRT acquired the rights to Foot In Coldwater, Klaatu, Dillinger and Tom Cochrane via our license with Daffodil.

"The impact of Disco product, particularly in Montreal, has boosted sales of Barry White and Leon Haywood on 20th and Kool and the Gang and Crown Heights Affair on Delite.

"Over the past year GRT has further strengthened its marketing staff, particularly in Alberta where we opened our own branch operation. In turn, we have attracted and can support the distribution of Axe, Smile, and recently Island.

In summary, during the past year we have strengthened our base of operations in many areas and are looking forward to a record year in 1976".

Richard Bibby, vice president of MCA's Canadian operation, had experienced an internal problem which, fortunately, didn't affect company progress. He reported to RPM that: "1975 was our biggest year yet. Our sales will probably end up about 30% higher than 1974, which is quite an ac-

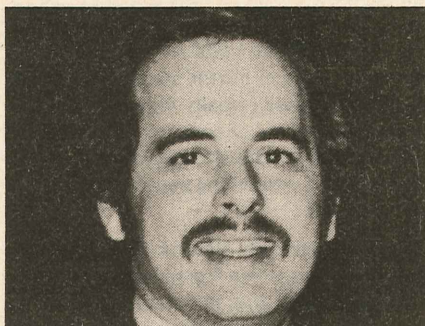

complishment in view of the fact that our pressing plant has been on strike since August 1st of this year." Bibby, like Jamieson, was also impressed with the increase in cassette sales as he explained: "One of the things that surprised me in '75 was the fact that cassette sales took off. Our cassette sales are up about 40% over last year. On the other hand our single sales are down this year - about 20%." About the prospects of the new year, Bibby noted: "I think that 1976 will be an even bigger year than 1975 for us. I'm looking forward to an increase next year."

Although the record industry has shown amazing across-the-board increases, costs

have also spiralled. A&M's Canadian director Gerry Lacoursiere, summed up his year as: "The year end for A&M was September 25th and we ended up with an increase of 30%. For the first three months of this year we're looking at an increase of 50% which is like unbelievable. The only thing I'm concerned about is that last year the cost of operation went up very high and I believe we'll be tightening our belts in particular areas - especially in the numbers game".

Lacoursiere explained that much time and effort went into 13 individual promotions (numbers game) i.e. Nazareth, Supertramp, Strawbs, Paul Williams, Herb Alpert, The Tubes, and others. "We're going to sit down and analyze where they were effective - where they paid off and where they didn't pay off. We'll continue to do numbers in the coming year but we'll be more selective." He added: "In general we'll tighten up regarding needless expenses. We'll be tightening up in the promotion department but not as far as promotion people are concerned. We'll maintain the same type of promotional staff but as far as advertising and helping promoters to promote shows, we'll really tighten up in that area."

Don McKim, president of Phonodisc Limited, one of the leading distributors of record and tape accessories as well as several important U.K. and U.S. labels, reported that: "The year 1975, although not a strong for us in singles, following the huge success of 'Kung

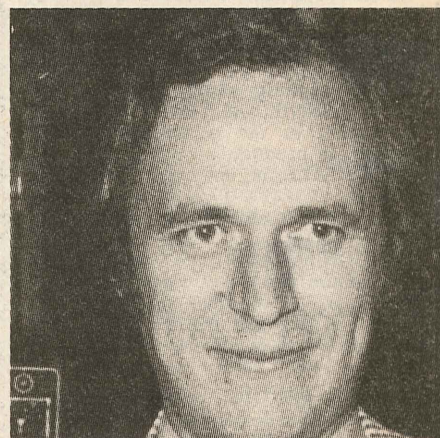

Fu Fighting' and 'After The Goldrush' in 1974, has produced a total sales increase with our reorganized western distribution

and our new eastern division operating under Gary Kouri. The difference has been more intense catalogue marketing and the constantly expanding market for our LeBo accessories. This fourth quarter of '75 has been, by far, our biggest quarter since entering the accessory business. So, we have no complaints really. Our total sales volume in 1975 is running 36% above '74 which was our biggest year."

Tim Harrold, president of Polydor's Canadian operation expresses optimism for the coming year, having enjoyed much success during his short year of 1975. "As far as Polydor is concerned", he noted, "we had an extremely good 1975 and we are moving into 1976 at perhaps the fastest momentum ever, in terms of sales. This is due to extremely strong album product and in particular Jean Pierre Ferland albums and the new Bachman-Turner Overdrive album which we are releasing just prior to Christmas. My view of 1976 is that I am extremely optimistic about next year. I think we're going to see an enormous number of visitors into Quebec for the Olympic Games. We

have a lot of new product coming through in that we have just signed a contract with Jonathan King of U.K. Records and we feel very positive indeed about our product plans. The points I feel most concerned about are the cut-throat competition at the retail level and the uncertainty about governmental action in the record industry's sphere. The third point is I feel that the singles seem not to be selling as well as they did and I think this is a worrying development for the industry."

Ron Newman, managing director of Motown (Canada) has seen an upward swing in singles sales, much of it due the disco action. He commented: "We had a pretty good year. It could have been better. I think, as far as Canada is concerned, the changes that were made in the States with Barney Ales coming back, has helped us considerably. We're now getting records on the charts that we weren't getting before. Things are now

Condor's Smiley Bates becoming country legend

To many within the music industry, Smiley Bates is a name that is perhaps at best, vaguely familiar. But to record distributors and the people 'out there' the man is almost a legend. Bates has an 'underground following' going for him that have, through the sales of his albums, (10 at present) made Mr. Bates a very financially secure man. Bates music is 'Basic Country'.

Aside from his instrumental albums (fiddle, banjo, flat-top), his vocal releases deal primarily in sad or hurtin' songs. Songs that many a DJ would casually dismiss as not being 'today's kind of country'. Yet it is this very same material that album sales have warranted his being awarded with 5 gold albums!

His latest single, 'My Daddy's Eye's', penned by Jim Weir, is culled from his 'History Of Sadness' album. Due to the postal strike, the single, originally scheduled for a fall re-

lease, is now set for a Dec./Jan. mail-out.

Now signed with the Condor Music Corporation, that company has booked Bates into Eastern Sound Studios for another album session this coming January. Also in the works is a 'Smiley Bates Guitar Book.' The 12 page book, comprised of illustrated chord charts and the sheet music to six songs as arranged by Neil Pooley, will also include a Smiley Bates EP instrumental recording. The package deal put together by Condor, will be given the promo and distribution push through a link-up between Condor and Tee Vee Records.

Originally from Kirkland Lake but now based in the Collingwood area, Smiley will primarily be playing one nighters and jamborees until late spring. In May of the coming year Bates will be heading down east for a three month tour of the Atlantic provinces.



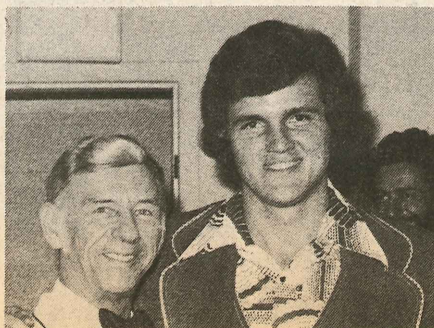
OUT IN THE COUNTRY

BBM unveils a more factual radio survey

In the past, the Bureau of Broadcast Measurement ratings service had always clumped its national cross-sectioning audience surveys into one tidy report.

100,000 random viewers and listeners had previously been instructed to fill out a report sheet similar to a daily diary for the period ending to one week.

While this procedure had always maintained a fairly accurate and consistent measurement, findings have now indicated that the tallying of radio-listener response alongside that of television-viewing response has suffered due to what Peter Jones, president of the BBM insists was a confusion having to report on two separate entities within one body.

"Radio and television are obviously very distinct, separate industries," he told RPM, "and people quite simply perform a better service when they only have on thing to worry about at each time."

"As a result of this new method, we can better serve each group at the appropriate time."

Because of the new method of filing separate reports, CFRB the Toronto MOR giant, now registers with 1,738,700 people tuning in on an average weekly basis as opposed to their figures released a year earlier which showed an audience of 1,407,400.

Normally this would indicate CFRB's one-year upward swing, but practically every national AM and FM outlet showed with the same considerable gains.

CFRB leads the Toronto ratings race with CHUM-AM following with 1,448,700 listeners tuning in for an average 8,274,000 hours per week. Third place CFTR now seems to

be on what has been termed as "a popularity skyrocket."

The AM station, basically a rock top-40 outlet, has more than doubled its total weekly listener hours within the past year.

Aside from CFTR's listenership advance, the other local Toronto outlets remain in relatively the same competitive relationship as had been in late '74.

"I don't think the audience pattern has changed", said Jones.

"I just think we're getting a more accurate picture of it." Toronto's only "progressive rock" FM-outlet, CHUM-FM registers in eighth place with 379,800 listeners per week.

Because of the shortage for any "progressive" attempts being made within Toronto's radio-medium, the CRTC have been given five applications for a new FM-outlet.

CBL-FM is in the last place with 156,200 listeners each week.

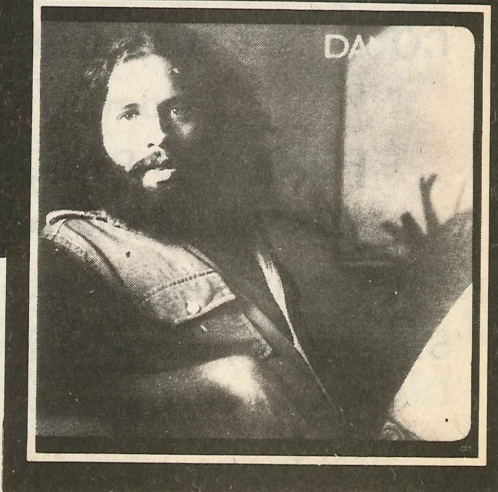
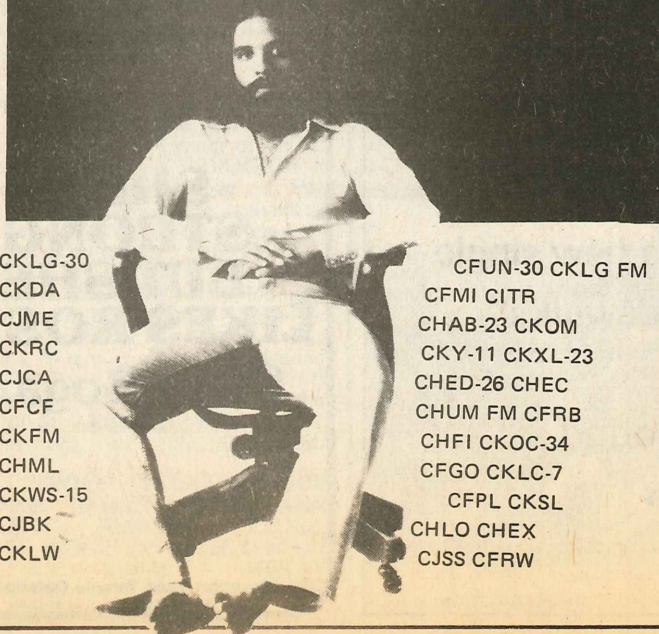

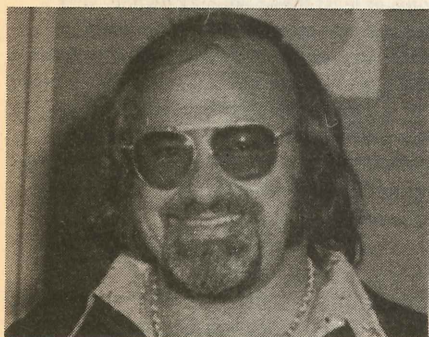
Maybe not.

Russell and the Who had decided that the entire rock-movement was burgeoning entirely out of proportion and was becoming necessary to be labelled, targeted and spoon-fed to fans that only had a scant awareness of something that they were very much caught up into.

An exceptionally-colourful film that showed how easily music-fans can elevate musicians to the role of rock-god . . . how the public squanders bread on posters, t-shirts, anything deemed marketable so as to walk away with a piece of the action.

Many believed Russell's image-rendering, "destroyed" the music of the Who, but check out the cinema-soundtrack credits and you'll notice the "cream" of the English rock-scene were very much involved.

Reports have it, that they all had a good time . . . musicians involved and aware of what's going down.

Were you aware?

What is a "Tommy"?

It could simply be Townshend's expression for what's under his nose, and between his legs.

Then along came Brian di Palma's "Phantom Of The Paradise" . . . a sometimes amateurish-film but one that gave the world "Beef", the eighth wonder of the rock-world.

A costumed Frankenstein-stitched performer who becomes electrocuted on stage due to an amp short-circuiting.

The singer is fried on stage with an audience loving it, feeling it to be part of the show.

Is there a statement there?

Mick Jagger comes to town . . . a self-proclaimed dope-man who's taught a generation of kids how "tough" it is to be strung-out.

Keith Richard's guitar-work insured the message to be felt.

Pink Floyd at Hamilton's Ivor Wynn Stadium . . . hundreds of thousands looking for a liquor/smoke party. Fun indeed except for those fans that were squashed against the chicken-wire fencing separating them from the performers.

The Alice Cooper Show '75 . . . a very creative attempt at utilizing the facilities available in the media of stage, film and lighting.

Alice is still reading "Famous Monsters Of Filmland" . . . fantasy is imaginative but horror is part of Viet Nam.

Ken Russell's "Lisztomania" . . . a film that viewers thought was THE WORST FILM EVER!

An expression by the director who had shown the rock-scene for what it was worth in "Tommy" and who now fantasized what a power-tripping homage to those in the forefront might eventually evolve into.

A very absurd film but one that was effective . . . at least one came away with some very thought-provoking images.

And then the Tubes . . . the rock-awareness trip of the year, using the means of the rock-medium to tear apart what it stands for.

A statement by members of the music-culture hammering home the apparent obviousness of rock-fandom's "white punks on dope."

The year ended with the ultimate rock-gods . . . the four gentlemen known as "Who."

The biggest turn-out for the Maple Leaf Gardens arena in the history of its conception.

A concert proving once and for all that the rock-god is still responsive to the masses and that the crowds are getting bigger every day.

Are rock-audiences receptive to a subtle expression, or will the sounds of '76 be hammered-in even harder?

K-Tel reports big profits of \$3.2 million for 1975

Mass merchandising giant K-Tel International made a profit of 3.2 million in the year ending June 30th 1975 the Globe and Mail business section reports.

K-Tel president Phillip Kives reported that the company is moving new products to overcome paper losses of almost \$600,000 in 1974.

The 12-year-old company rack-sells household goods and repackaged "goldie" records through 40,000 stores in 14 countries.

Kives who, with members of his family, owns 89% of K-Tel's shares, plan to repurchase an additional 400,000 shares at \$5 each before January 15th but denies he intends to make K-Tel a private company.

Five years with the CRTC

30% Cancon radio ruling

It has been 5 years this month since Canadian broadcasters have been required that "at least 30% of the musical compositions broadcast by a station or network operator between the hours of 6:00 AM and 12 midnight shall be by a Canadian and shall be scheduled in a reasonable manner throughout."

The ruling by the Canadian Radio and Television Commission (CRTC) was the result of years of discussion in the recording and broadcast industries and its effects will be felt for years to come. This month RPM will take a close look at the role the "30% ruling" in the growth of the recording industry here in the first half of the 70's.

Below is a brief introduction to the CRTC's controversial ruling. Next week we will report the opinions and reflections of industry figures on the Cancon ruling and the past 5 years.

In October 1967, after 3 years of parliamentary study, Ottawa's Liberal government introduced the Canadian Broadcasting Act, dissolving the old Board of Broadcast Governors and forming what became known as the CRTC - Canadian Radio and Television Commission. The commission was "above politics" - its decisions protected from cabinet reversal.

Most important, the act introduced new principles to broadcast regulations giving the CRTC the teeth its predecessor did not have.

- broadcast frequencies are public property licenced to private broadcasters
- broadcasters are responsible for the public effects of their broadcasts
- Canadian broadcasting facilities must be effectively Canadian owned
- the public broadcasting network (CBC) is

responsible to provide a greater portion of Canadian programming and in return its interests receive priority when conflicting with those of private broadcasters - Canadian programming must be allowed to develop.

The act backed the CRTC with fines of up to \$100,000 for violators of its rulings (BBG-ruling violators faced a maximum fine of \$500 provided for in the criminal code).

The CRTC, allowing for public hearings and discussion, was free to implement policies to realize the principles set forward in the act.

Reaction was immediate. The following day the Toronto Globe and Mail said in an editorial headlined "A Perverse Document": "How free will free expression be if it must meet the whimsical requirements of 5 indi-

viduals in the fields of Canadianism and quality?"

The Tory opposition called the new commission "a broadcasting junta . . . a system of thought police."

Nonetheless, under the leadership of Pierre Juneau the CRTC went to work and quickly earned the reputation for being Ottawa's hardest-working body, mostly while handling a great backlog of decisions left over from its lame-duck predecessor.

The CRTC tackled new issues as well. Most of the controversy of the commission's first years were centred around TV, especially issues of cable licencing. But the commission did tend to radio questions.

All broadcast outlets were required to become at least 80% Canadian owned. FM stations with AM sibling-stations were no longer to piggy-back programming from the AM revenue-raiser and were required to provide supplementary programming. It was clear early in 1968 that the commission would bring in strict, new Canadian content quotas for both radio and TV. The controversy grew.

CKLW-Windsor's R.J. Buss told the commission that Canadian stations must play American records "to remain financially strong enough to protect our Canadian identity."

CKLW, then 100% U.S.-owned, (by RKO in turn owned by General Tire and Rubber), was ordered to divest its interests to Canadians as were other U.S.-owned stations across Canada.

On February 12, 1970 Juneau announced that effective the following October, prime-time (6:30 - 11:30 PM) TV programming would have to be 60% Canadian content and 30% of the radio music broadcasted would have to be Canadian.

That spring the CRTC held hearings on the forthcoming regulations.

The Institute of Canadian Advertising and The Association of Canadian Advertisers (together representing about 85% of national broadcast advertising) and the Canadian Association of Broadcasters (representing 95% of private broadcasters) opposed the regulations.

CAB spokesman, W.D. McGregor told the CRTC "essentially the association believes that free market forces should determine the content of broadcasting."

Major broadcasters John Basset of Baton Broadcasting (CTV) and Stewart Griffith of Bushnell resigned from CAB claiming the association was offering no constructive alternatives to the content regulations.

CTV claimed it would lose \$13,000,000 a year in advertising income if the regulations took effect (that's \$75,000,000 to date) but did not open its books to the commissioners.

Some broadcasters said it would be impossible to meet the 30% quota while others said they already were doing it quite successfully.

Music industry spokesmen argued they could produce the material if they were assured of broadcast opportunities. Some argued for stricter regulations than the proposed, Cancon criteria - if 1 of music, lyrics, performer or production was in Canada, in the first year, the record would count as Canadian, two parts were required thereafter - was too weak. The Canadian Music Publishers Association suggested a 3 out of 5 criteria, the fifth point being published by a bona fide Canadian music publisher.

The debate went back to the House of Commons' question period where even Liberal MP Harold Stafford told Juneau "your proposed regulations cannot work - no matter how willing the stations are . . . people will just turn off their sets."

He then ridiculed some Canadian songs by name, but as he spoke the Guess Who's "American Woman" was number 1 on U.S. and Canadian charts.

On May 22, 1970 Juneau held a CBC-CTV, "live" press conference to announce the final decision of the commission - the 30% content ruling was to be implemented.

He coupled the announcement with the statement now inscribed as RPM's motto:

" . . . the profits of doom, the messengers of mediocrity will be overwhelmed by the new generation of competent, creative, confident artisans and by all those preceding generations who have already demonstrated their freshness of mind, their talent and their capacity for inspired leadership."

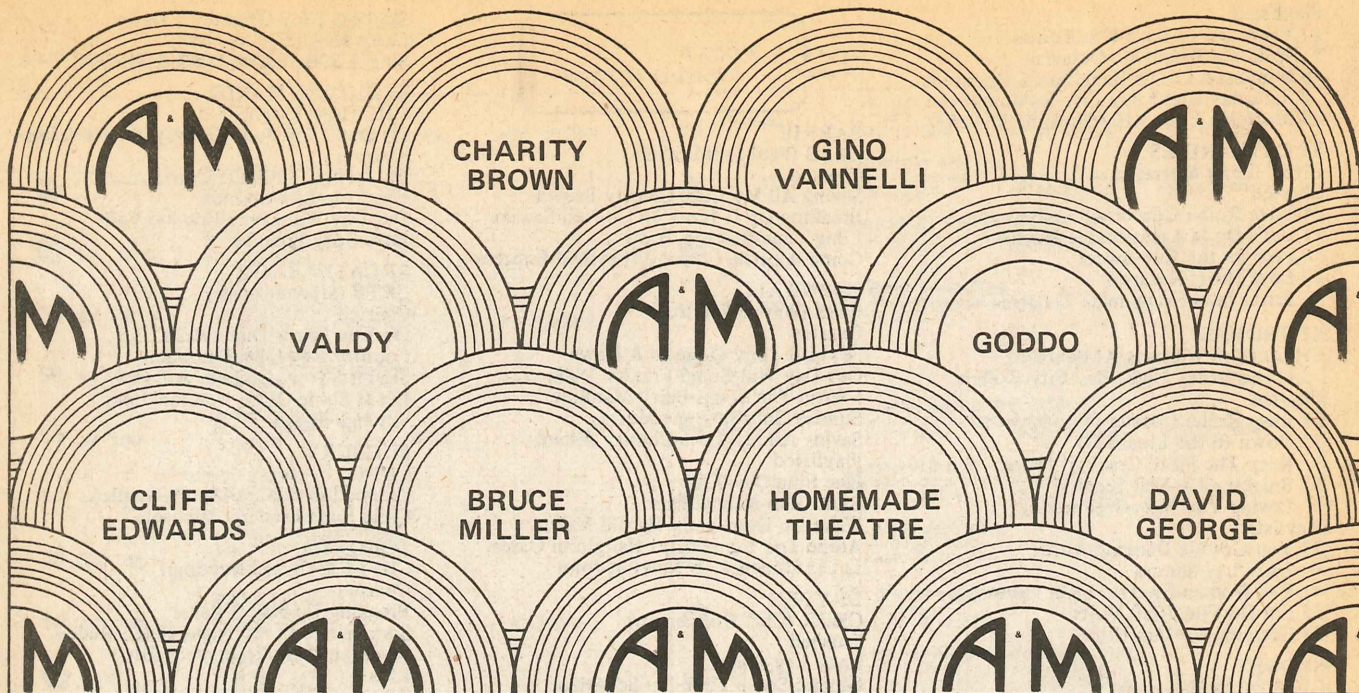
