Battle heating up between rackers and suppliers

Some of the behind-the-scenes mutterings of major record company executives about the lack of cooperation from major rack jobbers could surface over the next few weeks. One executive, who prefers to remain nameless at this time, told RPM: "The rack jobbers are apathetic to their own industry, particularly in the area of Cancon product, where it's their responsibility to get the product to the public." He continued with "All we're asking for is space and the hook is guaranteed sales. We won't see the racker stuck with product, if it doesn't sell.'

With rackers representing 65% or more of the business, one of the major concerns of a few of the major companies is the head office buying which really doesn't tell the true needs of several regional markets.

One industry observer noted: "The rackers are paying too much attention to Billboard and they're getting burnt, but they're not learning by their mistakes except when we try to talk up our product. They say 'hey look at this one, it has a number 30 with a bullet in Billboard and we can't give it away. How do you expect us to

stock yours?"

Group managers are also becoming more and more frustrated with "no product" available when they play dates where they know there is a demand for product." One manager observed: "I don't know why the hell the rack jobber doesn't pay attention to regional radio stations. Even if our record is just playlisted, that in itself makes a demand for the record, particularly when the group is playing the area. We're losing a lot of promotional push, the record company is losing a lot of record sales and the rack jobber is losing a lot of credibility.

It's obvious there is a story here and RPM will, over the next few weeks, be talking to record company and rack jobber spokesmen as well as managers.

Retailers fear blackball in stereo price-fix fight

The Canadian Press recently reported that because wholesalers are "setting" retail dealers' prices, Canadian consumers are paying millions of excess dollars annually for stereo sound

equipment.

Several retailers have claimed the existence of an "understanding" stressing manufacturer's list prices should remain the same down to the retail level, and if they choose to sell product for less than suggested price, wholesalers will threaten to cut off their supply of goods.

Such a practice is illegal under the federal Combines Investigation Act.

CP stated that many retailers are afraid of being "blackballed" within the industry, impeding investigation

and prosecution.

Sol Mandlsohn, president of Toronto's Bay-Bloor stereo outlet, was quoted as saying, "...its a very interesting pressure. Most of the time they (the distributors) stop calling on you, or they short ship you." Short shipping occurs when wholesalers are either slow in filling orders or send only part, sometimes none of the order for a short time, claiming stock

shortages. Mandlsohn explained that Pioneer's line of equipment had once been taken away from him, because he cut down on the suggested list prices, but "... we came to terms with Pioneer. They discovered they need us as much as we need them."

Stephen Lewar, general manager of S.H. Parker Toronto (Pioneer distributors to over 400 Canadian dealers) denied his firm forced dealers to keep

their prices up.

Retailers, reportedly, avoid wholesalers' price sanctions, by offering "complete" component packages, at a price lower than the total list for each separate item. Another method involves "double invoicing", with one invoice listing suggested price (to be shown to the distributor) and the other to record actual selling price.

A spokesman for the consumers affairs department said there exists a tendency for prices to be kept higher in industries where a consumer's lack of knowledge tends to make him buy the higher-priced goods.

He stated that many consumers mistakenly believe stiffer prices mean superior quality.

Platinum for Diamond's Seagull and Serenade

Columbia's president, Terry Lynd, flew into Vancouver (7) to personally present Neil Diamond with Platinum Awards for his LPs, Jonathon Livingston Seagull and Serenade. The awards were made during Diamond's performance at the Coliseum.

On tap is Diamond's new album. waiting for final approval. The set was co-produced by Diamond and Robbie Robertson of the Band.

Apparently moves are underway to bring Diamond - Pink Floyd (on separate dates) to Toronto for outside concerts this summer. It's been rumoured that CPI's Mike Cohl is negotiating with CNE officials to use the facilities of the expanded home of the Argos which could conceivably pack in an audience of 40,000 plus.

Gold & Goddard cheers for Columbia's LaBelle

Patty LaBelle, Nono Hendryx and Sarah Dash bussed their way into Toronto from the nation's capital, arriving just in time for a Columbia reception where they were presented Gold for their Lady Marmalade single, now past sales of 163,000 units. The presentation was made by Columbia Canada's president, Terry Lynd.

A short rest and it was curtain time again, this time at Massey Hall. An old piano-friend, Reginald Dwight. happened to be in Toronto and having been a fan of Patti LaBelle and the Bluebelles, it was only fitting that Dwight, now known as Elton John, introduce his old blues friend, Patti, which made for an exciting opener.

The Toronto Star's Peter Goddard had obviously taken his "good-night" pill and came on with a LaBelle high. He wrote: "The show, complete with a costume change for the second half, was everything, and it involved the group pushing themselves to extremes: near the point of exhaustion, near the point where everyone watching had to become involved near the point where the music broke down into chaotic

sound and everything was wrapped up on one enormous free-wheeling frenzy."

CPI's Mike Cohl (promoters for the show) wasn't too disappointed in the half house. In fact, he wants Patti and her girls back. What he saw from the stage and the audience reaction convinced him that the second time around would pull a capacity house.

How does CBC-TV music rate? Ask the viewers

Who is the judge of CBC programming?

During the course of a year 16,000 Canadians, about 1,500 each week, record specially prepared diaries of their viewing habits, detailing responses to CBC and other television shows they watch - and how much they've enjoyed them.

Weekly tabulations, circulated among CBC staff, estimate audience size and "enjoyment index" ratings for each program, based on the survey.

English speaking Canadians are surveyed throughout Canada, but, because of costs, French language programming response is limited only to Montreal and Ottawa-Hull.

CBC music shows fare well in these ratings. Among CBC productions, Tommy Hunter (2 million viewers) is outdrawn in the living room only by Hockey Night in Canada (3 million). But Hunter's enjoyment rating, 80, beats both Hockey's 72 and The Law's 66.

For the week of February 13-19, more Canadians watched Mary Tyler Moore (2.4 million) and M*A*S*H* (2.8 million) on Friday night than watched Hunter, but Hunter again had the highest enjoyment rating. M*A*S*H* had a 77 and Moore, 79.

On Sunday, Tommy Common's Musical World and Hymn Sing are beaten in enjoyment index only by Walt Disney, which also reaches an outstanding 4.7 million Canadians.

WEA's Genesis concert bowl over Gardens crowd

WEA's Genesis, featuring front-vocalist, drummer Phil Collins, played London, Kitchener and Hamilton warmup dates before their Toronto Maple Leaf Gardens Concert Bowl appearance, March 31 and April 1. April 1 sold out immediately on announcement with the March date scheduled after.

The band were flanked by a three-screened backdrop of film visuals, including Sixties psychedelia effects and images of pain-face inmates groping for an institution release. Drummer Bill Bruford was immediately recognizable via his "big B" emblazoned chest.

CPI reports approximately 8,000 attendance for March 31 and 9,500 for the April date. The Concert Bowl will seat 9,594.

The current Genesis release is Trick Of The Tail, distributed by WEA.

Sackville discs spin on; Jazz Will Never Delete

Sackville Records' John Norris (also editor of CODA Jazz Magazine and proprietor of Toronto's Jazz Record Centre) reports that Three Is Company (2007), featuring American pianist Dick Wellstood, percussionist Pete Magadini and clarinetist/soprano saxophonist Jim Galloway, was recorded at Toronto s (now defunct) Blues Alley by CJRT-FM's Ted O'Reilly and Ken Cox, September 22, 1973. The LP was produced by Galloway for Hawthorne Productions.

Sackville have also released The Atlantic Suite (2008) by composer/arranger/clarinetist Phil Nimmons and his Nimmons 'N Nine Plus Six. Nimmons' first commercially released LP in a decade, the album was reviewed by the Toronto Globe And Mail's (and Downbeat Magazine's Canadian correspondent) Jack Batten as "... a big band recording that ranks as one of the most important ... most absorbing jazz albums ever conceived and issued in Canada."

There are four movements to the suite (plus one additional composition) featuring Art Ellefson (tenor sax), Keith Jollimore (alto sax), Tony Toth (baritone sax), Stan "Crusher" Perry (percussion), Mike Malone, Herbe Spanier, Daryle Eaton and Bram Smith (trumpets), Dave McMurdo, Rick Stepton and Terry Lukiwski (trombones), Andy Krehm (guitar), and John Capon, Dave Field (bass). All Nimmons 'N Nine bandmembers are Canadian and have played with such bandleaders as Stan Kenton, John Dankworth and Woody Herman.

Nimmons 'N Nine was originally a rehearsal band (1953) but frequent appearances at the Stratford Festival and concerts with the Toronto Sym-

phony Orchestra, led to a regular CBC radio series.

Nimmons, Oscar Peterson and Ray Brown, "all believers in the value of music education." formed the Advanced School of Contemporary Music in 1960. (Nimmons is also Director of jazz programmes at the Banff School of Fine Arts, University Of New Brunswick and he currently directs the University Of Toronto's Faculty Of Music Jazz Ensemble.

"Whereas other product is geared for today and a particular market," said Sackville's Norris, "our records will never delete. Don't call it jazz . . . call it music."

Raitzin joins Beth Tikvah at Israel anniversary fest

To celebrate Israel's 28th anniversary, Toronto's Beth Tikvah Synagogue will present The Magic Of Misha Raitzin, An Evening Of Song,

Sunday May 2 at 8 pm.

Raitzin has been considered "one of the great voices to come out of Russia". He was resident of both Leningrad and Moscow opera companies. Acclaimed as a soloist, Raitzin has also been a member of the Moscow Philharmonic and toured with Russian ensembles in Prague, Bucharest, Warsaw, Berlin, London, Paris and more than twenty other major European cities.

Since his Israeli arrival in 1972, Raitzin performed as lead tenor with the Tel Aviv Opera and soloist with the Israel Philharmonic under Zubin Mehta. In addition, Raitzin toured West Germany, South Africa and Mexico in a show vehicle described as "triumphant." Raitzin performs equally well in Hebrew/Yiddish folksongs, operatic arias and art songs.

The London times on May 18, 1970 wrote: "Russia scores again! The soloist of the ensemble, tenor Misha Raitzin, gave a performance that will long be remembered for its power, lucidity pathos." and emotional

Marsden sticks to Cancon 'No plans' for U.S. deal

"We have done a great deal of research with the production houses in the United States, but currently have no plans to feed an American partner or parent company," David Marsden of Toronto's Lip Service Studio Productions said through a

recent press release.

"It is my belief that Canadian artists, producers, engineers and all else involved with productions of this nature can and should be Canadian. I have never been embarrassed by Canadian talent and find it possible to produce top quality product without leaning on the Americans. I don't believe that the intention of any CRTC regulation to improve Canadian Content is to join with an American company as a Canadian distributor. In fact I find it totally without justice that any group of people would move in that direction."

Lip Service's Marsden is well known for moving into the directions of progressive radio programming.

He added:

"We are not importing all the main ingredients and supplanting American musicians and singers with Canadian ones. We are doing the entire project here. That gives a lot more Canadians work."

CTV's first feature film, shot on Alberta location

"For Canadian filmmakers and screenwriters, CTV's continued participation would represent a new and welcome production resource."

The Canadian Television Network is currently co-producing its first feature film, Why Shoot The Teacher?, starring Samantha Eggar and Bud Cort and based on broadcaster Max Braithwaite's story of a depressionera teacher's first job, in a rural oneroom school. Among the Canadians in the cast are Chris Wiggins, Gary Reineke, John Friesen and Michael Reynolds, under expatriate Canadian director Silvio Narizzano.

The film casts 44 speaking parts, 17 will be children recruited from the Hanna, Alberta area. A sum of \$200,000 has been invested by the Canadian Film Development Corporation, \$150,000 from Famous Players, an undisclosed sum from CTV as well as money from Alberta investors.

Filming should wind up next month and a release to theatres across Canada by Toronto's Ambassador Films is skedded for the Fall.

For the past few years, CTV executives have expressed desire for feature film production. Indications are that the Network will be producing more films if the Braithwaite and a proposed W.O. Mitchell feature

find audience approval.

Larry Herzog, CTV's director of film and drama (also executive producer for such award-winning entries as The Human Journey and Untamed World) explains that the film is "a family picture with a light touch". Herzog is the Braithwaite film's coproducer along with Phil Fraser of Edmonton's Fraser Films.

Rising's Lisa Hartt Band: 'An incredibly good start'

"This is a brand new group," Rising Records' Lisa Hartt told RPM, 'and it's taken at least 15 years to actually start. But this has been an incredibly good start."

After debuting in Montreal during the Fall of 1973, the Lisa Hartt Band made Toronto its permanent

residence in 1974.

A 'virtual mosaic' of vintage Canadian rock, the Lisa Hartt Band are: bassist Denny Gerrard (The Paupers), guitarist Ray Blake (Mashmakhan) keyboarder Richard Yuen (Tranquillity Base), drummer Marty Cordray (Bearfoot) and front woman Hartt, a prolific writer-vocalist who was a most promising female artist Juno nominee this year.

A former member of the Gino Vannelli Band, Hartt has worked with Ken Tobias and chalked up New York sessionwork with Cliff Jones' Rockabye Hamlet, resulting in the single The Last Blues I'll Ever Sing (released fall 1975). The Lisa Hartt Band's current single, Old Time Movie (R1003), was shipped March 18.

The Band appeared at Ottawa's Algonquin College April 2 and the Waterloo Motor Inn, April 12.

U of Manitoba offers \$\$ for official school song

To commemorate its 100th birthday, the University Of Manitoba has announced a competition for two

musical works.

A \$2,000 prize is being offered for a Canadian composition for chamber ensemble in the choral/orchestral medium, or a combination of choir and small orchestra, or soloist and small orchestra. The work can be in one or more movements, and approximately eight to twelve minutes in length.

A prize of \$500 is also being offered for a university song to be the official University Of Manitoba song. Lyrics and music are required.

Bilodeau, Dufour, Hahn have new jobs at London

London Records president Fraser Jamieson appointed two company veterans to new posts, and Gary Chalmers, the label's national promo manager, has a new promo rep.

Adrian Bilodeau, with London since 1964, will fill the label's newly created position of western marketing manager, while maintaining his current position as Calgary branch manager.

John Dufour will become the label's first eastern marketing manager.

Polydor's top-ten disco for Toronto programmers

John Forsythe. formerly Ontario promo for Phonodisc Ltd., will now cover the Toronto disco scene for Polydor Records.

On March 26, Polydor unveiled their Disco Top Ten for the Toronto area including Try To Hold On by Bobby Moore, Inside America by Juggy Murray Jones, I Got Your Love by Stratavarious, Chicano by Black Blood, Nymphomaniac by Patricia Norton and new releases including James Last's In The Mood, Black Blood's La Faranga, Wee Willie and The Winners with Wipe Your Feet And Dance and the South Shore Commission's Train Called Freedom.

The compilation will be issued every two weeks.

Dufour has been with London since 1968.

Dufour, responsible for Quebec, Ontario and Maritime markets, and Bilodeau, responsible for Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and B.C., will work directly with London's recently-appointed national marketing director, Ken Verdoni.

The label's new promo person is Luckie Hahn. She will handle Englishlanguage product in Quebec, the Maritimes and the Ottawa Valley.

New Quebec group scores 15,000 LPs in 5 weeks

Montreal's Les Disques Parapluie Ltd. reports the LP by Quebec's Boule Noire band "is sweeping the province." Sales of the group's disco album have reached 15,000 within 5 weeks of release.


The LP was produced at Montreal's Unison, with "creative" chores owing to Georges Thurston and the Muscle Shoals Sound rythm section.

Does a soft retail market foreshadow dischiz future? OAC opens competition

Most record retailers are not breaking out of their normal mid-winter

sales slump.

Despite a great proliferation of retail stores in recent years, tighter consumer budgets, three general recordprice hikes in the last five years, maturing of the "baby-boom" teenagers who paid the industry's bills in the last 10 years, and other factors, are causing some people in the business to be concerned that the prolonged slump may point to a future

Similar concerns about the U.S. market are reflected in a story in Variety (March 24) titled: Disk Sales In March Tailspin; Longrange Dip In Teen Market. But the March sales activity in the U.S. followed record sales months up to then. This may not be the case in Canada where pre and post-Christmas sales levels were distorted by the mail strike here and subsequent delays.

The only major Canadian retail chain surveyed by RPM reporting no noticable decline in sales was Sam's, the only independently-owned national chain and the pioneer in chain-store retail marketing here. It may be, though, that Sam's is so well established that it would be the last chain to

feel any downward trend.

It can't be just changing consumer demographics softening the record retail market. Though there are fewer teenagers now than five to ten years ago, today's young adults and adults (with habits aquired during teen-age years) are buying more records than adults of previous years. New, highsales record phenomena, like booming crossover hits, the growth of soft rock and MOR styles in rock and country music, can only be attributed to record sales to these people.

At the same time, the youth and child markets are very much alive. All of the major chains report high-level sales on singles (bought almost exclusively by teen and pre-teenagers). Singles growth is especially rapid in suburban shopping mall locations. With tax, singles now sell for about

\$1.25.

Downtown "strip" stores report heavy activity around advertised LP loss leaders (marked down to cost or below to get customers into the store), but a growing reluctance of buyers to pick up a second or third regularlypriced LP while they are there.

A&A's Bruce Wilson points to the new, enforced Sunday closing law as a cause of lost sales in their downtown Toronto store. Many Sunday sales were to U.S. tourists and out of towners, in town for the weekend and vulnerable to impulse buying. "We could tell," he says, "by the volume of U.S. dollars and U.S. credit card purchases on Sunday."

Sherman's Records' Brian Greene reports that their retail sales have not recovered from an expected post-Christmas dip. People at Music World's flagship store at Fairview Mall (Toronto) report a good January and February with a definite drop in mid-March, starting when anticipated sales levels during the March school break in Metro Toronto were not reached.

It's too early to tell whether the alleged "soft market" conditions foreshadow a gloomy future for record retailing or whether it may be part of a marketing lag between major shifts in music tastes and buying habits.

for choreography award

NARM hypes U.S. merchants to hit adult disc markets

The U.S. National Association of Recording Merchandisers released a plan and a detailed study, at their recent annual meet in Florida, to document what every currently successful disc exec has already learned -- real growth in the industry will be based on success in the 25-45 agegroup markets.

This is something radio broadcasters have learned and they are scientifically perfecting broadcast delivery accordingly. Television has learned this from time to time, but

from time to time forgets.

The record industry, spoiled by decades of servicing an unsophisticated, impulse oriented, baby-boom child market, is now facing this fact.

NARM leaders see the effort to sell more vinyl to adults as the key to expanding the U.S. industry from a \$2-billion to a \$3-billion a year busi-

To kick off the discbiz focus on grownups NARM unveiled the results of a six-month study of U.S. adult record-buying habits, prepared by Joseph Cohen, a post-graduate student at New York's Baruch College.

The findings were not startling. Males between 25 and 29 years old buy an average of 11.9 LPs, 4.7 tapes and 2.7 singles a year. Males between 40 and 45 buy an average of 5.4 LPs, 4.8 tapes and 4.0 singles. People with higher incomes, those with college educations and unmarrieds each buy

more than their opposites. But, people without college education and marrieds buy more tapes and singles.

Thirty two per cent of all purchases by the 25-45 age group are made in record stores, 21.8 per cent in department stores, 24.7 per cent in discount stores and 32.5 per cent

through mail order.

As a group, they buy a wide variety of music: 39.9 per cent of their purchases are contemporary and hard rock, 22.6 per cent country, 14 per cent MOR, 9.9 per cent classical, 4.9 per cent jazz, 3.7 per cent soul, 2.2 per cent goldies and 1.2 per cent

Almost two-thirds of them report they find out about records via radio. Nearly one-fifth are informed through TV and about the same proportion via word of mouth. Magazines and newspapers each counted for less than 10

per cent.

Of those in the age group not purchasing records, more than onefifth stated either they hadn't enough money or record prices are too high. About 20 per cent of them were satisfied with radio play and most of the rest of them had no time, equipment or interest in music.

For the purpose of the survey, buyers were defined as people who had purchased one or more records,

tapes etc. in the past year.

Almost half the buyers surveyed said they are buying more product now than five years ago.

Melbourne and BMI project: 12 Canadian classical LP's

Melbourne Records recently released a catalogue of its 12 LPs of classical music composed and performed by Canadians. All 12 were released by Melbourne, in cooperation with BMI Canada, over the past few years. BMI and Melbourne plan to continue the series.

BMI has been acting as artist and repertoire director of this project initiated by Melbourne President George Taylor. Taylor, who also owns Rodeo Records, has been known for country music records.

Some of the records were recorded by Melbourne. Others were released in cooperation with commercial labels and the CBC for re-release of deleted product.

Melbourne is distributed by London Records.

The series, so far, includes two LPs of music by Murray Schafer, Harry Somers opera The Fool, two LPs of electronic music, and Canadian piano, guitar and violin collections.

What's on the RPM charts? Those who know explain-

With new international attention on Canadian acts, it's timely to discuss the importance of F.PM charts abroad as well as within our own domestic markets.

One factor in U.S. interest in Canadian music is the controlled circulation of RPM to 869 major U.S. radio stations. Our feedback from U.S. programmers indicates an awareness there of both new and established Canadian acts.

Canadian record companies also report increased U.S. interest in release of their Canadian product there

RPM has surveyed several national sales managers of major Canadian labels and some independent producers. Their comments will be carried in a discussion of the RPM charts in this column over the next few weeks.

Mel Shaw, manager of the Stampeders and president of Music World Creations, told RPM: "It's important to have a national chart. I think the RPM 100 is definitely a barometer of action, showing the States and foreign markets the success you are having in your own country."

A&M's national sales manager, Joe Summers, expressed his opinion of the chart: "I'm happy with the chart and when there's something reflecting that should be on the chart, you hear from us. I think it's a good chart."


Most companies supply RPM with weekly and cumulative sales figures, which is priviledged information to the chart editor. Some, because of company policy, do not supply these figures, creating a problem in the final tabulation. Unfortunately, because of the lack of support from some record companies, complaints have been levied against the final "humbers" picture.

Are the RPM charts reliable? Are they useful? People to whom those answers make a difference will answer these questions in upcoming issues of RPM.

The \$1,000 first prize was awarded to McCallum for his ode to Pierre Trudeau's price and wage controls announcement.


Schafer sponsored the contest after strong public response to his recording of the Trudeau Sting.

Bachman Turner Overdrive Rock Is My Life, This Is My Song Martin Melhuish Methuen/Two Continents 178 pages; \$4.95

Melhuish's Bachman Turner Overdrive is a straightforward account of the incidentals which made the Canadian 70's hard-metal rock group a hard-driving central pinion gear of North America's rock business.

Melhuish doesn't pretend that their songs are ultimately profound or that



their style is remarkably innovative. Rather he shows what kind of people it takes to make up a hard-working and money-making-for-themselves-and-others group without falling apart (as so many groups and their members do) or even changing their mild-mannered individual lifestyles.

There's no secret about it and Melhuish doesn't pretend to find one. BTO simply puts out a string of predictable hit LPs and 45s and no-nonsense concerts which sound just like their records without ever turning away from the people, principles, or places they've known. They don't tear up hotel lobbies, go to jail for statutory rape or get busted for dope. In short, nothing other than their success, which we all know about, is very spectacular and Melhuish captures that well.

The author apparently spent a lot of time with the group and can easily justify his presentation of their lives and music. That's probably why they gave him the nod for their only authorized biography.

Attic's Tom Williams also reports the new film by Don Shebib, Second Wind, will open in Toronto, Friday April 9. Cross-Canada distribution of the feature will be within two weeks of the Toronto premiere. Second Wind's soundtrack is by Hagood Hardy.

Ken Tobias will play Toronto's Midwich Cuckoo April 12-17 and Ron Nigrini, Bruegel's Tavern, 12-24.

Edmonton's Sundown 24 weeks 21 major artists

Wes Dakus, presently heading up Edmonton's newest 24 track sound complex Sundown Recorders Ltd., reports to RPM brisk local and international business.

The studio's extensive facilities have recently been made available to Royalty's R. Harlan Smith currently producing Danny Hooper, Larry Gustafson, Glory-Anne Carriere and Russ Thornberry, Music Man's Herb Tait producing his Taitums, and Dakus himself producing Fustukian, Mavis MacCauley and Norman Mitchell.

Barry Allen, one of the big rock talents of the Sixties has been engineering commercial spots for Canadian Concepts.

Approximately 11 producers have been working at the 24 tracker handling sound duties for over 20 artists.

Dakus is presently seeking to negotiate label deals.

GRT getting chart fever for new ABC-line singles

GRT (Canada) is rush releasing much of the product from its newly-aquired ABC (U.S.) line of titles. ABC, previously distributed here by RCA, has been unavailable in Canada since the RCA licencing agreement expired January 1.

Topping their list is Sweet Thing, taken from Rufus' current LP. The single is near the top 10 in U.S. trades and only a half a dozen Canadian stations picked it up directly from the U.S. On the country side they're running with Freddie Fender's You Lose A Good Thing, not yet released here.

GRT has already released Mighty Cloud's of Joy's single, Mighty High, David Crosby's Take The Money And Run and Poco's Makin' Love.

Feds seek film fund future, private or public control?

Federal Secretary of State Hugh Faulkner and government film heavies are fighting the calendar to formulate and legislate a restructuring of government role in Canada's film industry.

The Toronto Star's Sid Adilman recently reported that Faulkner is receiving three separate reports on the future of Ottawa film policy, all recommending a film commission in corporating the National Film Board, Canadian Film Development Corporation and other government film-related functions.

Reports from NFB chairman Andre Lamy and former chairman Sydney Newman urge a centralized agency which would allow the public sector to play a larger role in Canada's film

Adilman quotes unnamed inside sources as saying Faulkner will more likely lean to a third report, by a group of management consultants, proposing a government film commission which is more of a coordinating agency, with the reigns of film production firmly in the hands of Canada's infant private industry.

Final decisions, of course, will be made by parliament, but Faulkner's skill on the hill will be taxed to have legislation in the House before the new year. The temporary extension of the CFDC's film-finance funding expires March 31, 1977, and a new commission should be operating by then to keep the cameras rolling.

The CFDC has invested more than \$20,000,000 of public money in Canadian films since 1968. The NFB spends \$23,000,000 of government money each year, with another \$10,000,000 in income from its productions.

Quality nesting with Laurel and Hardy cuckoos

Quality Records reports to RPM that Dance Of The Cuckoos by the Band Of The Black Watch (Q 2180) is the classic Laurel and Hardy theme, released in Canada March 23rd. The single was picked in RPM (April 3/76).

Gary Stevens, a former Los Angeles studio musician has recorded Lottie Day (Q 2164) out of Vancouver's Sweetwater Productions.

Quality (U.S.) have released a new LP by the Stampeders containing the tracks Hit The Road Jack and New Orleans from the album Steamin' (Canadian release). For the Canadian release of the new LP, 2 tracks will replace plus the inclusion of the new single Playin' In The Band.

The Quality distributed Rubber Bullet label recently signed Toronto's Great Rufus Road Machine band. The single What Does It Matter (RB 1006) will be shipped mid-April.

Phonodisc rush releases **Eurovision prize winner**

Phonodisc has just released the British record which recently took top honors at the Eurovision Song Contest, the Brotherhood of Man's Save Your Kisses For Me (on the Pye label,

The song was the British entry into the contest, one of the most prestigious in Europe. Laurence Heseltine, Phonodisc's production and distribu-tion manager, told RPM the company pressed and released the single within a week of the contest's completion.

Quebec Docs tell CRTC: stop quack radio acts

The Professional Corporation of Physicians of Quebec have insisted that the Canadian Radio-Television Commission should put a stop to "charlatans" and "parapsychologists" from speaking on radio talk-shows.

Corporation president Augustin Roy told a commission hearing that there are too many such people presenting views on certain talkshows, therefore discrediting medical science.

The situation is compounded he said, by program hosts who know little about such matters.

Skyhooks bring slapstick rock to North America



Quality's Sweet Blindness

A funky sight for soaring eyes

They were weaned on showbiz before the advent of Cancon, during the nights when loungework was nonexistent to teenagers.

Bobby Dupont (lead vocals), Curtis Lee (lead guitar, lead vocals), Phil Smith (keyboards), Bruce Barow (bass) and Sonny Milne (drums) create the current sound of

Sweet Blindness:

In 1967, Toronto-born Dupont formed a rocksoul troupe known as Statlers. Playing Toronto's Danforth Gogue Inn, the non-union unit featured front-vocals by Dupont and the chime of Phil Smith's

organ. In 1968, the Statlers moved in the direction of the downtown beat, scoring the role of week-night houseband at Yonge Street's notorious Club Bluenote.

In 1969, manager Mike Watson asked the Statlers to jam with the westend band, The Jax. Out of that party came a pact and six-member restructuring called Toronto's Sweet Blindness. By mid-1970, Sweet Blindness toured the Southern Ontario bar-circuit featuring Dupont and vocalist Don Meeker, Ronnie Grant (bass) and Billy Murray (guitar.)

Meanwhile, New York City's Curtis Lee, a Berklee, Boston educated guitarist and keyboardman, was in the midst of gigging along the East Coast with B.B. King, The Temptations and James Brown. In 1972, Lee settled in Toronto as a landed immigrant, successfully nurturing Yonge Street's Curtis Lee and Abraham. By late 1974, Abraham split and Lee melded forces with Dupont. This 1975 version of the Sweet Blindness featured Gabor Szepesi (keyboards) and Al Marnie (bass).

On the suggestion of Bond manager Barry Cobus, Sweet Blindness called on Quality Records and by June began work on their debut LP, with production by Quality A&R Director Bob Morten.

Sweet Blindness studio-sessioned at Toronto's 24-track Phase One, assisted by Milan Kymlicka's "pop" string arrangements and the delicate piano touch of veteran jazz-master Doug Riley. Producer Morten attempted to bounce the bandsound around Al Marnie's "chording bass", ably gearing up the effort for a disco-mood.

In September 1975, Szepesi split, former Statler Phil Smith rejoined on keyboards and the single Cowboys To Girls (2150) received a national distribution to the tune of

In January 1976, former Shawne Jackson bassist Bruce

Barrow accepted an invite to join the band as Sweet Blindness again toured Ontario, to the approval of their dancecrazed legion of fans.

On March 1, the "anthem" single Sweet Blindness (Music You Can Ride On) was released and by March 15, the anticipated LP was marketed across Canada. Morten had hired Toronto's Slic Bros. for the album-cover concept, immediately hooked on the "magnetic cherry eyes" of the gazing sweet young child and her cascading pearldrop tear

Spawned out of the vacuum left by Toronto's 1960s exported music-talent, Sweet Blindness have developed from "playing whatever the bar-owners were buying at the time," to an R&B flashact, imaging the saga of Yonge Street's glitter and the old Club Bluenote.

A throb of soul, progression of jazz . . . international eyes should keep peeled on Sweet Blindness.

Bassist-vocalist Geddy Lee, guitarist Alex Lifeson and drummer-Neil Peart have produced their first concept album, a lyrical interpretation of Ayn Rand and a further excursion into the potentials of "progressive hard rock."

The plot of the story, on side one, "is a voyage into the future, chronocling the experiences of an individual man who tries to revive, after discovering an ancient guitar, the harmonious sound which has been sublimated by a dominant totalitarian system."

Side two is a straightforward collection of five songs. The best are the subtle anthem, A Passage To Bangkok, and Tears, a soft acoustic song (with mellotron by Hugh Syme) featuring Geddy Lee's "normal" and quite pleasant singing voice. Almost any song on either side is reasonable FM fare (Rush is not known as an AM-singles band) but some programmers may like Discovery and Grand Finale on side one.

The album was recorded and mixed at Toronto Sound, co-produced by Rush and engineer Terry Brown.

Mystifying graphics by keyboarder Hugh Syme, the group's reputation as a performing band and the appeal of the album concept almost guarantee Rush another gold record to follow the similar, recent success of Fly By Night.

Capitol Magnetics have designed new packaging for their line of professional tape, disc and film products, manufactured under their Audio label. Capitol's current "integrated graphics" features a white on black theme with the product name in bold face print across the full width of the package.

"Many recording engineers who buy Capitol Magnetics' Audiotape are



unaware that we make cartridges for the broadcast industry, or that we make lube tape for duplicators," said Jack Ricci, manager of marketing services. "The unified image in packaging will make the buyer aware."

Capitol Magnetics' products are grouped into four categories:

Audiotape for lube/cassette tape studio market, Audiodisc for lacquered discs prepared for mastering, Audiofilm for motion picture sound striping, and broadcast cartridges for radio stations and cartridge components for the duplicator industry, marketed under the Audiopack label.

RCA's THP Orch debut LP follows Canadian cover hit

RCA is following up its success on the Canadian cover hit of Theme from S.W.A.T. with a THP Orchestra LP, Early Riser, featuring the single.

The Rhythm Heritage original U.S. hit was unavailable in Canada when ABC Records' licencing agreement with RCA Canada expired at the end of 1975. In mid-February RCA promo man Jerry Murph had the brainstorm to cover the instrumental song with Canadian musicians. Three Hats Production arranged for studio musicians (THP Orchestra) to track the song and within days the two-parts-Canadian recording was on the street.

In two weeks it bumped the previously airplayed U.S. version off the charts and now will probably be the first Canadian gold single of 1976.

The LP includes such standard instrumentals as Sleepwalk and More, plus three THP Orchestra originals.

The LP, which is being simultaneously released in 16 European countries on the Power Exchange label, was produced by THP's Ian Guenther and Willi Morrison, with engineers Haywood Parrott and George Semkiw. Eric Robertson arranged the music.

B.C. censor lost scissors: cuts pix with sharp words

R. W. MacDonald, British Columbia's director of film classification, with two appointed assistants, is designated by B.C. law to act as the province's motion picture censor.

But, last month, Nova Scotia Supreme Court ruled that only the federal and not the provincial governments have the right to censor films.

MacDonald does not "censor" these days. He and his clan issue information on what they judge may cause moviegoers any slight degree of anguish. Their method of instruction (aside from classification) is the use of warning captions. Considered as one of the longest and most "vehement" captions was written for director Tobe Hooper's Texas Chain Saw Massacre.

"An extremely gruesome, disgusting picture," was the caption that under B.C. law had to adorn every print ad, all promotion and even the

Five new Horizons in A&M jazz line

A&M's Horizon series has released five albums to date. Five more jazz discs, due by late April, include: Thad Jones and Mel Lewis' big band sound, New Life; hornman Ira Sullivan's debut, Ira Sullivan; saxman Dave Leibman and Richard Beirach, Forgotten Fantasies; and a Paul Desmond Quartet LP Live, recorded at George's Bourbon Street last fall. The two-record set features Toronto Queen Street greats: bassist Don Thompson, drummer Jerry Fuller and guitarist Ed Bickert.

The sweetsax fare of the Desmond talent will be showcased April 14 in Calgary and Dave Leibman will play Vancouver's Oil Can Harry's April 12-15.

Soundstage - the studio without the bugs

Nimbus 9's Soundstage Studio is more than just a recording facility. What was originally designed as a "family studio" has now blossomed into one that is in much in demand, outside the circle of "family clients" the Nimbus 9 group has acquired over

the years.

Nimbus 9's president Jack Richardson told RPM: "I've worked in about 87 different studios around the world, and what we've tried to do here was eliminate the bad things I didn't like and retain the good things that we found." Regarded as one of the top recording studios in North America, the studio measures 50 by 30 feet with plenty of stretching room for up to 30 musicians. The room was primarily designed as a pop music studio with variable hard/soft panels to change top end and decay response. The instruments can be miked with little or no equalization and the lighting is arranged to bring about different moods with colour complimenting the visual needs of the artist. Says Richardson, "The studio almost works by itself. It's a good clean room with a nice mid-range snap. It doesn't have standing waves or rumbling low ends. There's a certain amount of control in what you do in the room in terms of the wall movements and a lot of goodies to make the artist and musician feel at home.

The centre of attraction in the control room is Soundstage's custom modified Auditronics 20 input console, featuring a highly modified 3M 79 series 16-track and 2-track master tape recorders. The eye and ear catches the room's monitors described as 604E's with extended bass woofers with Mastering Lab crossovers driven by Citation 12 amplifiers." Richardson explained: "The room is tailored to the monitors' response curve and

eliminates the need for any form of equalization or voicing of the monitors. The essentially flat response delivers reliable audio information to the engineer and producer." Regarding the console, Richardson noted:

"Auditronics would hardly recognize it now, - it's been so highly modified. What we've done is eliminated as much iron between the signal and the machine as we possibly can, and when we want to do any signal processing, we can either patch it in outboard-wise or whatever it might be."

In explaining the philosophy behind Soundstage, Richardson recalled: ". . . it started out of Doug Sax of Mastering Lab and a little studio called Producers' Workshop. We liked their natural sound and that's what we worked to achieve here."

A half million dollars and eighteen months later, the Nimbus 9 crew have obviously launched their "baby". There's a great feeling of pride as each member of the Nimbus family explains, in detail, what makes their very long day "an extraordinarily productive and self-rewarding experience."

Soundstage has apparently achieved what they were looking for - the natural sound. Some of the internationally-known artists who will back that claim include: Alice Cooper, Dr. John. the Guess Who (who, before their split, were the studio's greatest billboard of success) and John Denver, who said it was "a studio high"

The man at the top, Jack Richardson, worked it all from the bottom and he can bend your ear for as long as you can hang on, explaining his pet woofers and how he can make your stomach rumble with the bottom he can achieve. He has been described as "a walking, working encyclopedia on sound recording."

The Programmers

This is the school that jocks built

by Louise Lathrop

Barry Sarazin walked through the front door at Fanshawe College hiding a bad case of the jitters. He was taking a flyer at the nation's largest broadcasting school outside Toronto.

Behind him was the security and success as program director of one of Canada's best middle market stations.

Ahead of him? A two-year-old idea - The radio section of the School of Broadcast Arts at Fanshawe College London, Ontario.

Sarazin won the post of radio section co-ordinator over an impressive list of applicants. Once entrenched in the position, he effected subtle changes throughout a program which has begun to catch the attention of broadcasters from coast to coast.

The class of '75 have settled into the industry, but the class of '76, 20 in number, is restless. Several have had offers already, some are troubled. Instructors calm them saying it's still early. To leave now may cost them the diploma they've hustled for the past two years.

Barry sees their nervousness and remembers his own frame of mind in September. He smiles, pointing out the Fanshawe placement record. "After all", he says, "47 station managers can't be wrong."

This is the school that broadcasters built. Everyone on staff has one or both feet firmly planted in the main-

stream of Canada's private broadcasting industry.

1977 scheduling problems split opera/symphony

The Toronto Symphony and Canadian Opera Company will not play together in the fall 1977 season because of scheduling conflicts.

The TSO will play COC's 1976 season as it has for all 45 COC productions since the 1968 season.

TSO president Terence Wardrop and COA president Douglas Sloan, in making the announcement, agreed that

scheduling requirements of the two organizations now conflict, as the COC's season is running later into the fall to attract more of the operagoing public.

The COC is exploring alternative orchestration in consultation with the National Ballet, which employs an ad hoc orchestra for its seasonal performances.

Ray Wilmot is a product of Ryerson and the University of Toronto, with seven years in production and announcing in five markets. Wilmot teaches these areas, in addition to sales and human relations, to the 52 students in the Radio School.

Ric Wellwood comes from Ryerson, Wilfrid Laurier University and Western. Now, a freelance critic and announcer for CFPL, London, he handles the writing areas of the course. Experience in nine markets since 1962 gives Wellwood a broad background in news programming.

The school's key to success, they say is the calibre of its students. Each year, a growing number of high school and university students hear about the program and apply. Four years ago, when the course was combined with television broadcasting, the faculty picked the best 50 per cent of the applicants. Today, only the top 10 to 15 per cent are selected. All candidates are interviewed personally by members of the staff. Overall awareness and personality are important, but the school places a value on self-status and prior experience in communicating. Public speaking, debate and drama give a candidate an edge.

After admission to the two-year program, students are steeped in the commercial aspects of broadcasting with a no-nonsense approach to its responsibilities. In addition to full-time, professional and academic instructors, the apprentice broadcasters are taught by top-rated broadcasters from every station in the London area.

Additional perspective is added by guest lecturers whose experience ranges from the CRTC (Steve Harris) to information programming (J. Paul Huddleston), interviewing and open line (Larry Solway), personality programming in private radio (Gen. Grant, CFRA, Ottawa) and Management (Keith J. Dancy).

Field trips to the best professional operations in Ontario, Michigan and Illinois ensure that the school doesn't become a protective cocoon. Most students get a good idea of what the industry expects of them. Some find their talents are in other fields, and leave the school.

A sifting process that screens hundreds of applicants to 35 students, eventually sees about 20 graduates go knocking on radio station doors each

Ray Materick CHUM FM and a "grand" promotion

What better way to spend a thousand dollars and have a captive CHUM FM audience than with a "live" minute broadcast, which is what the WEA group did for their folk-cumcountry-cum-soft-rock hero, Materick. The thousand dollars is just a guesstimate, but with the cooperation of Bernie Fiedler's Riverboat, the Bell Telephone and CHUM-FM, that's pretty good ballpark figures.

Duff Roman, PD of the Toronto FMer has been striving to keep his station in the running with the progressive crowd and he's been doing it with "live" broadcasts of several top Toronto entertainers, namely, Moe Koffman, Dan Hill and Ray Materick. The feedback has apparently been encouraging and, after all, what better way to be creative on a Sunday evening from 11 to midnight. The audience was respectful and noisy, on cue, and they were a Materick crowd, which put the artist at ease.

Introducing the show to the listening audience was Larry Wilson and then it was up to Materick to avoid the dead air. It was a confident Materick who chatted about disjointed happenings, between numbers, about his trip to Mexico, the fact that Nashville is only 450 miles from Michigan not 2000 as one of his songs indicated. His lyrics were deep, some self-admitted self-analysis, "Ain't it funny how the time fades away - like a postcard on the wall", or the crowd upper, "Come back to my hotel room little girl and I'll show you my double dill", the latter from his Cheeseburger Blues.

One number that was stamped "winner" was his Lonely Hearts Hotel" - "It's kind of a theme song", Materick claimed, and it could be a hit single. The big number of the night, of course, was his Mystic Highway Suite, which he claimed he wrote in the nude - "Hey Ray come away from the mirror", the wrong intro to a beautiful and exceptional piece of creativity.

The throaty Materick was given an "angelic" vocal assist by Dee Higgins and an instrumental duo that deserves more than the usual incredible, fantastic papp that goes with describing back-up groups. Bob Doitch, on bass and recorder and Danny Langlois, doing it with steel, lead and mandolin were gems - to say the least.

Five surprise music shows rolling in CBC studios

"It was sort of like an Andy Hardy thing," Jim McKenna told RPM about an unscheduled CBC music series, "We had a studio and artists and decided 'Let's put on a show'."

CBC variety chief Jack McAndrew found some free time in the studio, flew in McKenna, a Montreal TV producer, lined up talent and they began taping a five-part series of onehour Canadian music specials, Soundsgood.

In early April they taped Soundsgood Jazz and Soundsgood Folk hours. They're lining up artists for May tapings of Soundsgood Disco, Country and Pop shows. McKenna hosts each one.

CBC hasn't yet scheduled the five specials, but they plan to use them during the summer when normal offseason programming will be disrupted by Olympic telecasting.

The jazz hour featured an almost unrehearsed and spontaneously alive performance by Toronto jazzmasters Peter Appleyard (vibes), Moe Koffman (reeds), Rick Homme (bass), Ed Bickert (guitar), Doug Riley (keyboard), Don Thompson (piano), and Jerry Fuller (drums). Vocalist Aura and trumpeter Clark Terry put the icing on the cake, especially in a jam-session tribute to Duke Ellington.

The Soundsgood folk hour features Ellen McIlwaine, David Wiffen, Miles and Lenny, Don McLean and Watson

and Reynolds.

McKenna, producer, writer and host of the shows, produced and hosted CTV shows Like Young (which was syndicated into the U.S. ABC network through Dick Clark Productions) and Musical Friends. His Flipside TVer, produced by his own company, aired on CBC.

Ballet skating and hits in Hardy's CBC-TV special

CBC is taping the last of the sequences for Hagood Hardy's April 23, one-hour television special.

The show features figure skater Toller Cranston skating to Hardy's Balloons, the National Ballet's Frank Augustyn and Veronica Tennant dancing to Hardy's instrumental theme for Don Shebib's just-released film, Second Wind, Shirley Eikhard and of course Hagood Hardy with his group Montage, and a 31 piece orchestra.

CBC newsman Lloyd Robertson will tell viewers the history of the vibraphone, Hardy's main instrument.

Hardy won two Juno awards last month for his instrumental hit, The Homecoming, and promised 3.5 million Juno viewers "I'll never sing again." One of the show's segments features Hardy singing "Watching Through The Night.



Penny Farthing Records president Larry Page was quoted recently in Variety attributing the success of freak hits in England to the much wider range of radio fare broadcast

Scots Gallagher and Lyle feeling good about Canada

A&M's Gallagher and Lyle told RPM they were impressed by the state of the Canadian record and broadcasting industries considering its proximity to the U.S. business. They compared it to the industry in their native Scotland, where there are no recording studios to speak of, and, only recently, the beginnings of creative, local broadcasting.

Scottish bands, they said, have generally been obliged to stay with more traditional Scottish sounds to be popular at home, or, as with the Bay City Rollers, adopt the sounds and hype of the British market.

The duo, who tour with a fivepiece backup, have tried to maintain some Scottish flavour to their mostlyrock (but soft) presentations - notably, the accordian they use in many of their songs.

Though a number of Scottish bands have broken big lately, for example, Nazareth, The Average White Band, The Rollers and the emerging Slick, the contemporary Scottish identity is quite blurred in the industry, especially in North America.

One new Scottish radio station, Radio Clyde, which Billboard recently awarded the best on the British Isles,

there. "Basically, what happens in the U.S. is that people don't get a choice. If they did, the same sort of thing might happen."

But Canadian songs trying to break into the British market are really competing for a spot on a top 100 which lists only 75 current songs. Twenty-three of the top 100 singles in Britain are by the now-defunct Beatles, all recorded before 1971.

was singled out by the pair for inventive and imaginative work. "They know their market." Radio Clyde is a commercial outlet.

Gallagher and Lyle got a good foothold in North America when Art Garfunkel had a hit off their song, Breakaway. Their success touring with Supertramp overseas made them the logical candidate to open for the British group's North American tour, and Gallagher and Lyle used the opportunity well.

Their current LP, Breakaway, and their new single, I Want To Stay With You, both have hit the RPM charts.






