John Murphy has been named sales representative in the Ontario market. He will operate out of the company's Progress Avenue office and will report to the sales

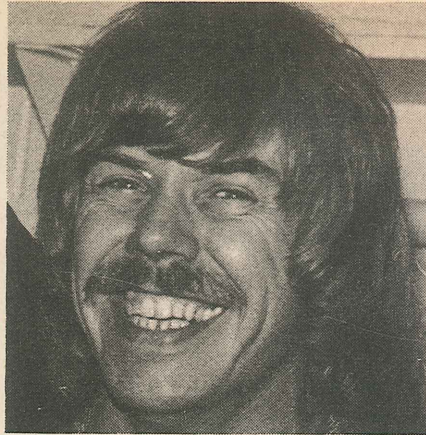

Her music industry background spans seven years, and includes positions with MCA Records, CBS Records and Beetle Magazine.

Barrie draws raves on CBC Canada Day special

U.A. recording artist Keath Barrie received a standing ovation for his rendition of On Being Canada, a poem on Canadian unity, on the CBC nationally televised Canada Day special, which was broadcast July 1st. Barrie, whose concert took place at the Ontario Place Forum in Toronto, saw the 14,000 people in attendance interrupt his concert several times with cheers and bursts of applause.

Barrie's management firm, Balmur, reports the Ontario Place management was so pleased with the response to his performance, they began discussions for a future Ontario Place engagement immediately after the concert.

Barrie has just completed two successful shows at the National Arts Centre in St. John's Newfoundland. He returns to the Maritimes at the end of the month for a concert at the Confederation Centre in Charlottetown, P.E.I.

United Artists, Capitol terminate distribution deal

After five years of Capitol distribution, United Artists is terminating their association with the company. The above announcement was made by both Arnold Gosewich, President, Capitol Records-EMI of Canada and Stan Kulin, President United Artists Records, Limited.

As of July 31, the companies will no longer be responsible to one another.

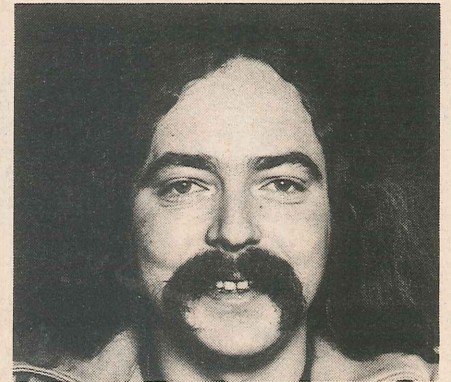
Kulin stated that "the announcement regarding the future distribution would be made public in the very near future".

The world is watching Canada's music industry

Never in the history of the Canadian recording industry has the future looked so bright. The world is now beginning to look at Canada's domestic record scene because, by today's standards, Canada has much to offer the world music market.

Canadian publishers are now a fraternity unto themselves. They have built catalogues of internationally accepted compositions and, in some cases, artists to convey their musical message.

Recording studios in Canada, stretching from coast to coast, are now considered by international producers, as among the most modern in the world. These studios were built on the untiring efforts of Canada's independent record producers who are now acquiring a worldwide reputation as hit-makers.

The Canadian music industry actually began showing signs of life about a dozen years ago but it was in 1971 when a unique Canadian regulation came into effect making it mandatory that Canadian radio stations would have to program 30 percent Canadian content during their broadcast

day from 6 am to 12 midnight (18 hours each day). It was because of this government legislation that Canada's music and record industry has grown to be known throughout the world and a reversal in performance rights payments that has contributed significantly to the welfare of Canadian writers and publishers.

This year, the 1977 Midem International Record and Music Publishing Market in Cannes, France, attracted forty-six Canadian music firms. The Canadian contingent was

actively involved in selling rights to Canadian publishing catalogues and Canadian recordings to representatives of music industries from around the world.

An added moral and economic boost to the Canadian recording studio industry has been an increase in world famous artists utilizing the facilities of Canada's new recording studios. The success of these studios and the number that are being opened are a direct result of the Canadian content ruling. Internationally-known names such as Olivia Newton-John, Elton John, The Bay City Rollers, Alice Cooper, Rod Stewart and many more have discovered that Canadian studios are among the finest in the world. To some, recording in Canada has been a new experience. The experience of a fresh and innovative approach from Canadian musicians, arrangers and engineers.

Hockey player scores with new Puck label

Mark Napier, captain of the WHA Birmingham Bulls, along with Robert Leth, designer and chief engineer of Springfield Studios, a 24-track studio in Aylmer, Ontario, have released the first product on their new label, Puck.

Puck has released a Kelly Jay single, *Cherry Pie*, in advance of the new Kelly Jay album, entitled *Ain't No Doubt About It*. Kelly Jay, once lead singer with *Crowbar*, has spent two years on the album and Puck expects big things from the man. At the same time comes word that Kelly Jay got together with the old members of *Crowbar* and cut the first Christmas song of 1977, called *Run Run Rudolph*. It is scheduled for a December 1st release.

Also signed and to be released by Puck is *Gloria Davis*, whose album *Enchanted* is being prepared for shipping.

Puck's Robert Leth has signed a contract with Colin Cross of Treble Clef Distributors giving T.C.D. national distribution rights for Puck product.

The Canadian recording industry has not restricted itself to the rock and roll brand of music. They have been equally successful perhaps even more with the adult-oriented type of music such as Juno Award winner Hagood Hardy, Keith Barrie and others. The Canadian country music scene has also become established as producing nationally-known artists. Classical music hasn't been over looked. Another Juno Award winner is Anton Kuerti who, along with the Canadian Brass and the Hart House Orchestra, indicate a growing market for this type of domestic recorded product. The combination of all these music formats and the gradual acceptance by the Canadian public has evolved a new thinking by record buyers and the establishment of a unique Canadian star system.

Compared to the population of other world record producing nations, Canada is considered among the leaders in exporting compositions and recorded product. Gordon Lightfoot's compositions and recordings are known throughout the world. Artists like Paul Anka, Anne Murray, Bachman-Turner Overdrive, Burton Cummings and the Canadian Brass have released records that have been accepted by practically every nation in the world.

As well, Canada's doors are wide open to music and records from other countries. Many firms have now located in Canada to make their products more readily available to this market. This includes a wide range of product from phonograph needles to studio equipment.

It has been estimated that \$250 million is spent, at street level, on records in Canada each year and that these records represent every market in the world. The Canadian music/record industry certainly contributes significantly to the economy of Canada.

Stony Plain's Hann firm for Winnipeg, Ont., dates

Stony Plain recording artist Paul Hann, awaiting release of his third album on the Edmonton-based label, is firmed for a number of dates in Winnipeg and throughout Ontario. Hann's trip east began with a four-day stint (June 16-19) at *Smale's Pace* in London, followed by a booking at *Ottawa's Saucy Noodle* (21-25). Following the first set of Ontario dates, he moved west to Winnipeg for a series of dates, to include the *Winnipeg Folk Festival* (July 7-9).

After the festival, he returns to Ontario for a number of dates, which include the *Groaning Board* in Toronto (12-16), the *Norfolk Hotel* in Port Dover (21-23), and the *University of Waterloo* (24).

The new album, titled after his name, is due for release late in the summer. Produced by *Stony Plain's Holger Peterson* at *Edmonton's Sundown Recorders*, it features session work from such notables as guitarists *Mason Williams* and *James Burton*, *The Dillards* and members of the *Ozark Mountain Daredevils*.

Vic Franklyn taping 26 new television segments

Vic Franklyn, who has recorded four albums with the Canadian Talent Library, is currently taping a new group of 26 segments of the Vic Franklyn Show, for television syndication across Canada beginning in the fall. The show reaches markets in Sydney, Halifax N.S., and Charlottetown, P.E.I., Moncton and Saint John, N.B., Hamilton and Sudbury, Ontario, Calgary and Edmonton, Alberta, and Vancouver, B.C. The program's flagship station is CHCH Hamilton, which also serves the Toronto market.

Appearing regularly on the program will be Franklyn's band for the series, consisting of musical co-ordinator Bobby Edwards on guitar, musical director George McFerdige on piano, bassist Dave Young and

drummer Claude Roger. Guests will include such names as Billy Eckstein, O.C. Smith, Rosemary Clooney, Barbara McNair, Clark Terry, Salome Bey, Patsy Gallant, B.B. King, Patricia Dahlquist, Charity Brown and Vanda King. An instrumentalist will also be featured as a special guest on each show, and the O'Neal Sisters will be making several appearances.

The show began taping in June and will continue through to July 29 at the Ramada Inn in Don Mills, Ontario, with two segments being taped on each date. Tickets are available at the Ramada Inn and at several branches of Harry Rosen's men's stores, who are supplying Franklyn's wardrobe for the show. Doors open at 2:30 p.m.

CTL reports Franklyn's current album *Friends*, released on the U.A. label, is receiving good airplay, with stations playing virtually all of the 12 selections.

Great Rufus scoring with two singles

Pizzazz reports that Axe recording artists The Great Rufus Road Machine are in the midst of scoring on a national level with two singles as a result of a successful western promotion tour.

I Believe In Sunshine, the group's latest single is receiving extended airplay in various markets as a result of the tour, while London Records has just re-serviced their last single, Say What's On Your Mind, due to a renewed demand for the song.

Motown, RCA fight MD in Richmond Hill

Motown Records and RCA Canada, two record companies which are opening up to community and human interest promotions, offered aid to a Dance-a-thon at Richmond Hill's Hillcrest Mall to fight Muscular Dystrophy. The dance was held at Hillcrest Mall's Sam The Record Man franchise June 12 and was put together by Nancy Franchetto, the store manager.

In attendance were Motown's Jerry Hochberg and RCA's John Murphy, who supplied play copies and giveaway records which went to participants who danced longest. Several other companies also supplied product. Party disc jockies were also in attendance, spinning the records and keeping the dancers moving. The dance-athon was taped for Richmond Hill CATV Classcom, and may be used in part on the international television of the Jerry Lewis Muscular Dystrophy Telethon. Hochberg reports a good turnout of people dancing, pledging money and contributing to the cause. Also well-attended was a haircut-athon, sponsored by Glemby International at Sears Hillcrest.

WEA to release first Canada single by Baldry

WEA Music of Canada is releasing its first single by new WEA Canada signee Long John Baldry. The single is a remake of his late 60's hit Don't Try To Lay No Boogie Woogie On The King Of Rock & Roll, from his new album *It Ain't Easy*. Baldry, who is spending most of his time in Vancouver, recently signed directly with WEA Canada. His new product has been assigned by WEA to the Atlantic label.

Baldry recently wrapped up a major cross-Canada concert and club tour with a series of dates in British Columbia, including Williams Lake July 1, Chilliwack (2), and Maple Ridge (3).

Abramson firmed for CIRA Pavilion

CBS artist Ronnie Abramson has been firmed to appear at the CIRA pavilion theatre August 25th. The CIRA pavilion is being staged during the Canadian National Exhibition.

Abramson's current single, *Your Love Gets Me Around*, is receiving favourable airplay on AM stations across Canada. It is still picking up additions after eight weeks of release. Her first CBS album, *Stowaway*, is also receiving attention from FM programmers across the country.

Kiss improve stage show to prep for Canada tour

Quality Records reports Casablanca recording group Kiss, preparing for a major 14-stop cross-Canada concert tour, have made a number of additions and improvements to their stage show. The tour moves from Halifax to Vancouver, from July 8 to August 3, with options for additional dates in many of the stops.

In addition to the group's normal fare of fire breathing, blood spitting and more explosions than ever, the show will be high-lighted by 90 minutes of music, featuring old favourites as well as new material from the group's eighth album, titled *Love Gun*. Of the previous seven albums, three are gold in Canada, two platinum and one double platinum.

Kiss will be using a double-tiered stage on the tour, with an elevator lift to carry the band members from one tier to the other. Stainless steel will be prominent in the design of the stage, including 11-foot high speaker cabinets. One of the tiers will also feature eight feet of plexiglass, to be used for lighting effects.

Notably absent on the group's itinerary is Toronto, where the group performed a much headlined Varsity Stadium concert last year.

April Wine, Lisa Hartt to tour Ont., Maritimes

Rising recording group the Lisa Hartt Band have been firming as opening act on an upcoming tour of the Maritimes and Ontario by Aquarius recording group April Wine. For Hartt, the tour will mark her band's debut in the Maritimes. The tour begins July 14 at the Bathurst, N.B. Arena, and is followed by dates in Newcastle, N.B. (15), Charlottetown, P.E.I. (16), New Glasgow, N.S. (18), Port Hawkesbury, N.S. (19), the Sydney, N.S. Forum (20), Truro, N.S. (21), Halifax Forum (22), Bridgewater, N.S. (23), Moncton, N.B. (25), Saint John, N.B. (26), and Fredericton, N.B. (27). Stops are also slated for the Ottawa Civic Centre (29) and Montreal's Place des Nations (30).

Following the Maritime dates, the tour moves into Ontario in August. Ontario dates include the London Gardens August 10, North Bay (12), Sudbury Arena (13), Sault Ste. Marie (14), and Peterborough (15). The tour is being booked by Montreal-based Donald K. Donald Productions.

For the tour, April Wine have added as a fifth member guitarist/vocalist Brian Greenway. Greenway's credits include Mashmakhan and The Dudes. Group leader Myles Goodwyn feels he is a solid addition to the group and adds dimension to their hard rock sound. April Wine are currently experiencing major success with their single You Won't Dance With Me, which is climbing RPM's Top 100 singles chart at No. 6. Action on the single is further encouraging action on their already active album Forever For Now, which has moved

back up RPM's album chart to No. 6.

Distributor London Records is rushing releasing the group's new single She's No Angel, a track from the upcoming Live At The El Mocambo album, produced at the Toronto club by Eddie Kramer during the band's much publicized week there which included a two-day appearance by the Rolling Stones. The album is due for release shortly on the Aquarius label, which is based in Montreal.

London, who also distribute the Rising label, are releasing a new Rising single by the Lisa Hartt Band in time for the tour. The single, Dream Me Away, is from the group's debut album Starwatcher. The group, which is establishing itself as a concert and club act in Ontario, consists of Hartt on guitar and vocals, guitarist Rayburn Blake, keyboard player Richard Yuen of Tranquility Base fame, drummer Marty Cordrey and bassist Gord Ray Hands. Hands, a new addition to the group, replaces Denny Gerrard.

In preparation for the tour, the Lisa Hartt Band completed dates at the Ontario Place Forum June 30 and on Toronto's Centre Island at the CHIN International Picnic July 2. They are currently completing a weeks engagement at Toronto club Larry's Hideaway (4-9). Following the tour, they are slated in at the CRIA pavilion theatre at the CNE, September 5. They are booked exclusively in Canada by Music Shoppe International, who booked them in for their portion of the tour. Their directive agent at Music Shoppe is Doug Brown.

Cap's Little River Band to Toronto's El Mocambo

Capitol recording group Little River Band, an Australian group which has been touring North America since late May, played Toronto's El Mocambo July 8-9. The date was the band's eastern Canada debut.

The band's first Canadian appearance was their opener for ABC artist Jimmy Buffett at Vancouver's Queen Elizabeth Theatre (May 30). The response to their concert was exceptional, with standing ovations, encores and good press response in the local dailies.

Capitol has recently released their second album on the Harvest label, titled Diamantina Cocktail, which is now reporting extensive airplay across the country, particularly in the west, where the band had already established itself with its debut album and appearance.

The six-piece band features three guitarists, David Briggs, Beeb Birtles and Graham Goble (the latter two also contribute harmonies), lead vocalist Glenn Shorrock, bassist George McArdle and drummer Derek Pellicci.

Quality releases single by Skyline's Wenzday

Quality Records has released a single by Toronto-based group Wenzday on the Skyline label. The single, titled Ride Me, is from the group's current Skyline album Nearly Made It. It was penned by group member Paul Andrew Smith, one of several Smith tunes on the album.

Wenzday recently appeared at The

GRT plans September for 5th Ian Thomas release

GRT Records is planning a September release for a new album by GRT artist Ian Thomas. The album, titled Roads To Euthanasia, will be Thomas' fifth release on the label. It is already completed, with Thomas handling the production chores himself at Toronto's Phase One Studios.

Thomas' current single, titled Right Before Your Eyes, is currently charted on RPM's Top 100 at No. 67 after 14 weeks on the chart.

Thomas is slated for a number of club and concert dates throughout the summer, including keynote appearances at Ontario Place June 30 and at the CRIA Pavilion Theatre August 20. He is managed by SRO Productions and booked by Music Shoppe International.

A&M concludes promo contest

A&M Records recently conducted a retailer contest in which points were awarded to stores that were playing A&M product when a rep visited the store. Between the dates of May 27 and June 10 all of the stores' full-time staff in the Toronto area had the chance for a dinner at the CN Tower.

Says Joe Summers, VP of Marketing and Distribution for A&M, "We have utilized this contest idea in the past and have found it to be highly effective in promoting retail store staff involvement in product promotion. When you take into account the amount of product moved in all participating stores during the course of the contest, there were no losers. The enthusiasm from the retailers was running high."

A&M publishes company newsletter

A&M has created a new newsletter to be called General Info. The first edition of this Jim Monaco creation features short information bits on such A&M artists as Peter Frampton, Supertramp, Styx, and The Tubes. Also included is a short piece publicizing international head Dave Hubert's citing of A&M Canada as the fastest growing company licensee and company-owned operation in the world.

A&M Canada has been expanding at a rate of 30% per annum for the last three years.

Quality's Lynx undergoes personnel changes

Quality recording group Lynx, is in the process of making major changes in its membership. Three of the members have left and have been replaced by two musicians, leaving the group a four-piece unit specializing in heavy metal sounds.

The new members are veterans on the North American music scene. Drummer Ian McKorkal comes from Fludd and Norm Paulin was with U.S. band Luger, a group which has toured with Kiss and other major groups. Both contribute vocals.

The band are currently in rehearsal with their new members. Scheduled dates included Toronto concert appearances July 3 at Nathan Phillips Square outside City Hall and July 7 at the Ontario Place Forum. Lynx will continue to do material from their current debut album on Quality, titled Missing Lynx, and are also working new material into their repertoire written by the new band.

In Canada, the song is from Mangione's Mercury album by the same title. Mangione is currently with A&M.

The first night succeeded in spite of competition from a concert featuring Ella Fitzgerald, Oscar Peterson and Joe Pass.

Following the dates, drummer Clarke returned to Toronto to wed Sue Piltch, daughter of noted session woodwind player

Bernie Piltch.

More recently, the trio appeared at a June 26 all-jazz evening at the Ontario Place Forum, as well as an afternoon concert the same day at Toronto club Yellowfingers, where they are booked for the week of July 11. All three members of the trio hail from British Columbia, with Bickert from Vernon, Thompson from Powell River and Clarke from Vancouver.

Bickert's current CTL album *I Like To Recognize The Tune*, released on the U.A. label through a lease deal, is currently receiving heavy airplay across Canada, and was recently featured on the CBC radio network program *Jazz Radio Canada* June 25. CTL reports a U.S. record company is also interested.

Square Sun Prods moves to Toronto

Mushroom releases Pyramid by Horn

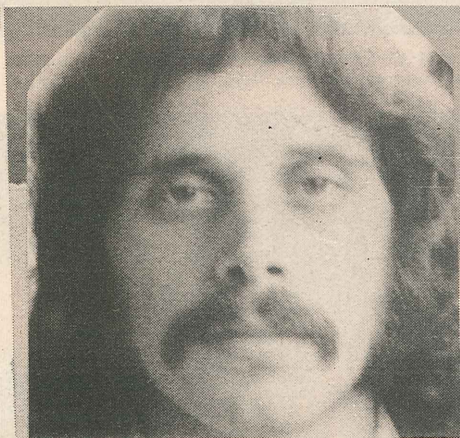

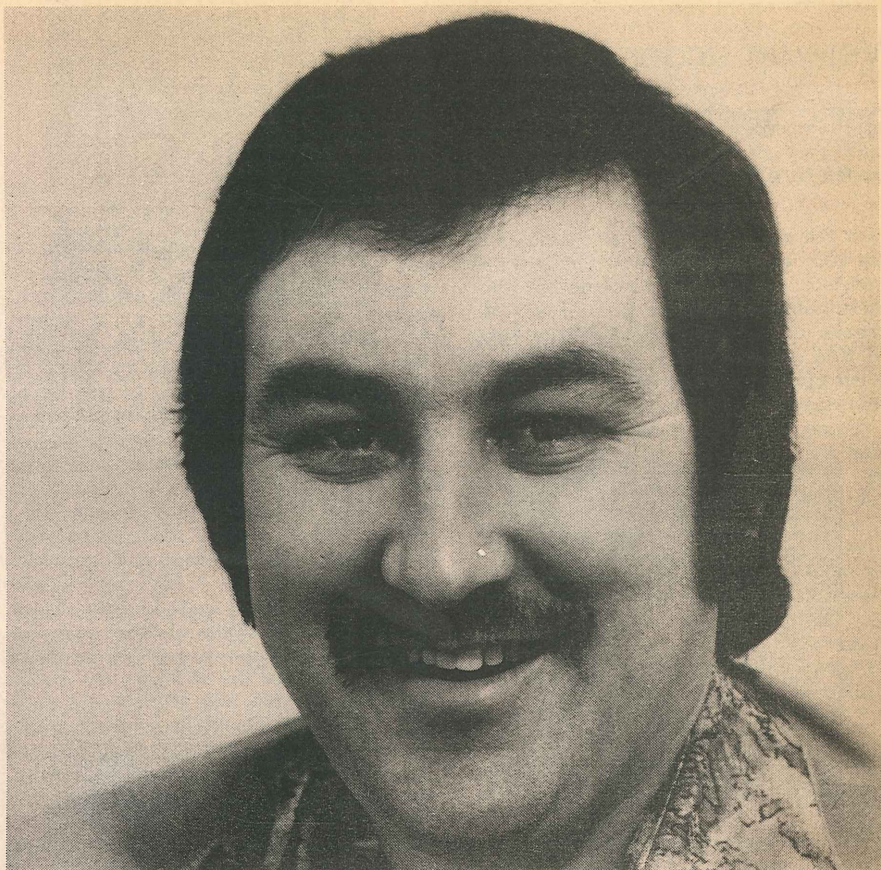

R. Harlan Smith celebrates 3 years of Royalty

Royalty Records is celebrating its third year as one of Canada's top independent country labels, and in no small way is credit due to Royalty's founder and first label artist, R. Harlan Smith.

Some ten years ago, one could find Smith playing in such lounge acts as Two Flats and A Sharp or his own group, Bob Smith and The Common People. Eventually however, he managed to break into the industry via his 1970 BMI-Award winning composition, Ode To Suburbia, which was recorded at a studio he was helping to promote, Damon Productions. A further grasp of the country market occurred in 1972 when Smith had a hit on GRT with Ding-A-Ling Debbie, which made the top ten on RPM's Country Playlist for four weeks consecutively. He experienced other charted singles as well as LPs on the GRT label but R. Harlan Smith decided he wanted to start his own record company which could devote more time and effort specifically with the country field. In July of 1974 Royalty Records was formed with himself as the first artist.

What was once a one-artist company

now boasts such well known country artists as Chris Nielsen, Glory-Anne Carriere, Danny Hooper, Fjellgaard, Jimmy Arthur Orde, Russell Thornberry, and a variety of others. The staff has increased from its original one-man operation to eight plus associated distributors across Canada.

Smith however, is not content to strictly have his own label. As a producer he has racked up over 200 compositions, some of which have earned him the title of Top Country Producer at the 1976 Big Country Awards; three BMI Awards for most programmed productions; two 1975 Juno nominations; four 1976 Juno nominations; two further 1976 Big Country nominations as Male Vocalist and Songwriter; and the national charting of over 30 of his productions (based on national airplay and retail sales).

Along with R. Harlan Smith-Music Ltd. (his production and live performance company), and his publishing firm, Helping Hand Music, Royalty Records is proving to be a strong label just as Smith has proven himself to be an equally strong part of the country industry.

To date, Royalty Records has released 52 singles and 28 albums, while Smith has personally seen seven (four on Royalty) of his own works hit the counter, including his most recent, Here Comes Yesterday. The title cut single from the album is on almost all major market country playlists and shows on the RPM Country Playlist this week at No. 32, and has successfully crossed over to the Adult-Oriented market and enjoys a No. 45 berth on the RPM AOR Playlist this week.

Fans of R. Harlan Smith can see the Saskatchewan native and Director of A&R for Royalty Records at the CRIA Pavilion at the Canadian National Exhibition on September 4th. Appearing on the same bill will be other Royalty artists, Fjellgaard and Chris Nielsen.

As for Royalty Records itself, as it enters its fourth year, President Jack Dubasz comments that the major thrust of the company will be to "establish (our) artists more firmly in Central and Eastern Canada."

Royalty self-distributes its product in the four Western provinces while the Ontario East market is handled by Rebel Music.

Susan Jacks

Veteran singer checks out career possibilities

Over the past year and a half, Susan Jacks has kept a low profile. With her career in transition, things could be better but, then again, could definitely be worse. Her initial releases on Polydor, *Memories Are Made Of You* and *We Had It All*, weren't best sellers but did keep turntables spinning and her name in front of the public.

Susan has been thinking lately about what she will have to do to get back into the mainstream of contemporary music. One priority is to lose her identity as just a 'soft ballad' singer. Nothing against the quiet songs, but she feels able to handle a lot more musical styles. It's hard to convince potential producers of this. They can only mentally slot her into the successful sound she had with *The Poppy Family*. Things are to such a point that she's seriously considering producing herself.

"The studio is not an easy place for me to work in the first place. It's so much easier to go in front of an audience because it's right there - you've sung it, they've

heard it! When I'm on stage, I know what I have to put out if I want any reaction. I'm going to experiment with that in the studio, knowing that with me controlling myself and listening to what's coming out, I can say 'Hey I don't like that'. Producing myself is important because it's going to give me a chance to bring out what nobody else has. I sing for people but I also sing for myself!"

Since her heyday in the early 1970's, Susan has had her share of 'burns' both emotionally and in the pocket book. She doesn't want to make a point of naming names, but instead comes to grips with the overall situation.

"This is really a tough business. Most women are not aware of what happens because it's been run by men for so long. I'm not putting the women's lib thing down, but there are a lot of men who have been doing what they're doing in this business for a long time. They're aware of how to get around people, of how to get their way. They figure, 'here's a chick who's

on her own', so they move right in. A man will automatically assume that a woman cannot handle herself and that he can talk her around in circles. Therefore I don't make decisions right away. I take a proposal home with me, think about it, and then give it to my lawyers."

Helping to alleviate the business hassles is Susan's current manager, Harold Walters of Thumper Audio in Vancouver.

Although she hasn't toured nationally for quite some time, Susan maintains public contact with light gigging through the Western provinces. Backing her up is Charlie Faulkner (bass), Doug Louie (piano), Jim McGillveray (drums), Dave Sinclair (guitar), Ian Berry (horns and keyboard) and Mary Saxton (support vocals).

Although there's a lot of influential people who seem to feel Susan would prosper as a country artist, she doesn't want to get tied down to any one musical form. She loves country music and is well aware of the resurgence in her career which came about after the release of *Anna Marie*. Among her favourite country artists is Carroll Baker.

"Shortly before I went to the Junos (for *Anna Marie*), I heard Carroll Baker on the radio and thought she was great. I didn't even know she was Canadian! During the Junos I thought, 'She's got to win. Here's a lady who has devoted her life to country music'."

Looking ahead to future recording sessions, Susan is now spending a great deal of time listening to new album product and to tapes sent to her by prospective songwriters. She and her band are working on a funky remake of *Bye Bye Love* with an eye to a single release. She's tempted to add new vocals to some old tracks which have never seen the light of day. By no means does she count herself out of the music business.

"Ask me why I'm in this business and I won't know. It's crazy and frustrating. But, the rewards are so worth it. For some reason you stick in there. It's true, there's no business like show business."

Patsy Gallant . . . What A Canadian Should Be

For Attic recording artist Patsy Gallant, the winning of the 1977 Juno Award as top female vocalist in Canada was a culminating point in a road which spans 23 years of professional experience in music beginning at the ripe age of five.

One of the major sources of her success at the Junos was her first Attic single release a remake of a Gilles Vigneault ballad titled *From New York To L.A.* The single, whose new beat and lyrics led to some controversy, sold in excess of 60,000 copies and propelled her into Canadian star status.

Patsy Gallant is a complete entertainer, an energetic, versatile performer. A singer-songwriter-musician, she is also trained in music theory, dance and drama. All of these talents are blended into her extravagant stage show, which includes musicians, vocalists, dancers and an elaborate lighting display. The show is smooth and professional.

Gallant comes from a very musical family from Campbellton, New Brunswick. Of ten children, five have worked professionally as musicians. The family is also fully bilingual. In fact, five of them went to English schools, five to French.

Gallant's first record deal was with CBS, where she recorded four albums, two each in English and French. Then came the move to Toronto-based Attic Records and the release of the product which has broken her across Canada.

Attic has released three singles from her debut album with the label. Following the major success with *From New York To L.A.*, the title cut, *Are You Ready For Love* was released, also meeting with success. A third single, *Sugar Daddy*, has been released recently. Her French language debut album,

Besoin D'Amour, was also released recently. A first single from the album, a remake of *Are You Ready For Love* titled *Libre Pour L'Amour*, did very well, and a new second French single, the title song, is doing even better. Attic predicts a top five hit. All of Gallant's product is produced by Gallant and manager/producer Ian Robertson of Gallant-Robertson.

Gallant shrugs off the controversy surrounding the hit single, and points out that its source was from English Canada, rather than Quebec:

"There was no French Canadian reaction - - how could there be? They never played it in Montreal. As far as I know, the French didn't care at all. The reaction came from the English press. And no matter what they said, the people still went out and bought it. And they're the ones who really help you out, who really decide. No matter what the media say, eventually the public has to make up its mind for itself."

Winning the Juno was a major surprise and a shock for Gallant. Millions of CBC viewers saw her break down while accepting the award: "I've been nominated now something like three years in a row, never expecting to win - - certainly not this year again. I was thinking maybe next year I would win it. I just went totally out of control. I really wasn't ready for it emotionally."

While she is not publicized as a songwriter, she has recorded a number of her own songs in English and French, and received an honourable mention at last year's American Song Festival. At the time she began writing songs, about three years ago, she also began playing piano. Hard work and coaching have helped her reach

the point where she is comfortable accompanying herself onstage.

Gallant's singing career is keeping her very busy. She has completed a very successful June 8 headline at the Ontario Place Forum, and has been doing spots on a variety of television shows. She is currently at Montreal's Studio Tempo recording her second English language album with Attic. She was exemplary on her July 1 performance from Parliament Hill for CBC-TV's Canada Day celebration, and is set for a CNE Grandstand appearance August 24 with fellow Attic artist Hagood Hardy.

Tentative plans are being made for a cross-Canada concert tour in the fall, booked by Montreal-based Donald K. Donald, and a promotional tour of Germany, France and England, where her product is released by Metronome, Gamma and EMI Records respectively.

Patsy Gallant is a very Canadian artist recording on a very Canadian record label. Manager/producer Robertson notes: "People from Quebec think she's English. English Canada thinks she's French. But in fact, she's a Canadian. She is what a Canadian should be. She performs equally well in both languages, and she performs in equal amounts to both audiences."

Gallant herself is very happy with her current situation with Attic: "They've shown me that they really want to work with my records. They're really sincere, and really hard-working."

She is also very happy to be a part of the music profession: "All I can say is I'm lucky to be doing what I like. That in itself is just the greatest thing."

TORONTO

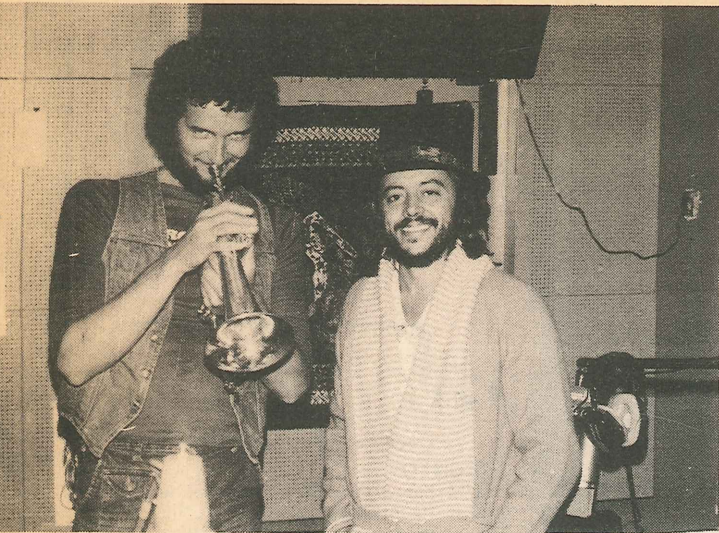
CFRB will be broadcasting the 1977 World Series, it was reported recently. CFRB has acquired the English language rights in Ontario for the Series.

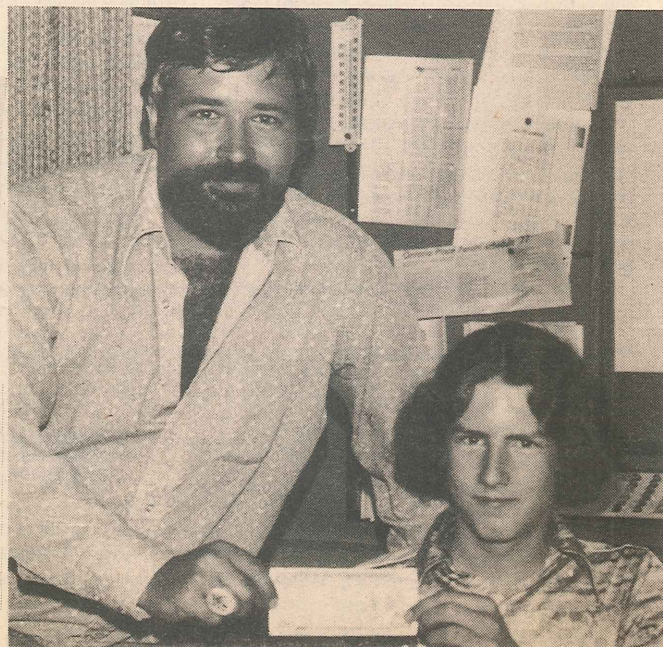

The airwaves are chronically polluted

Radio in Canada is chronically polluted and in imminent danger of prematurely going the way of Lake Erie, fresh urban air and the Dodo bird. And, as I see it, this is

symptomatic of all commercial broadcasting in North America.

A cursory analysis of current programming practices reveals a most alarming trend. Audience needs, desires and taste preferences are, for the most part, being circumvented in favour of inexpensive formula formats tailored to advertiser needs, desires and preferences.

Now, by polluted I simply mean misplaced purpose (tainted), not necessarily dirty or physically unclean. My concern is that business interests (programming for profit) have superseded the more fundamental purpose of radio: to service the public (programming in the public interest). And while this appears to be a fairly generalized phenomenon, it's certainly more acute at the major market-chain operation level

than at the small market-locally owned station level.

Public interest programming ideally means that everyone, regardless of demographic-cohort variable profile, should have reasonable access to radio content which satisfies his/her needs and taste preferences. This notion is firmly based upon several fundamental assumptions germane to the nature and role of radio (and all mass communications media) in a free, capitalist democracy:

First, the public (all Canadians) are presumed to own the airwaves. Yes, theoretically, each of us owns .00000004347% of the Canadian airwaves.

Second, permission to broadcast is a temporary privilege (license) granted by the public, through their competitively elected representatives (MPs) and objectively appointed agents (CRTC employees). Licenses are granted to those applicants who promise the best public service programming (format).

Third, it's assumed axiomatic that the most basic objective of radio is the cultivation of an informed public opinion. This is achieved through an open dissemination of information (news, talk shows) about the vital issues of the day. The public, in

other words, has a seminal right to be informed and the licensee has a fundamental responsibility to inform as well as entertain.

Fourth, it's further assumed that it is undeniably essential for such information to come from diverse and, hopefully, antagonistic sources. Duplication of news efforts by several radio stations in one market is, therefore, deemed more-or-less impossible. No station can, it follows, substantiate a reduction in information programming by saying the community is already adequately informed.

Fifth, radio is presumed to be pre-eminently a local institution. Different

The Moogk touch in Ottawa by Alan Guettel

Edward Moogk arrives at his office in Ottawa's National Archives every morning at 8:00 a.m. to carry on his meticulous work on a project that the firms that make up Canada's recording industry have not been able to do for themselves - sift through and assemble the thousands of details of the history of recording in Canada, compile the most complete discography of Canadian recordings and maintain the largest collection of Canadian records.

He came to the archives as full-time staff member in 1971 after completing 25 years with CBC radio writing and hosting a weekly show, Roll Back The Years - a program which dealt with the music and history of the recording industry's many yesteryears.

During the 1967 Canadian Centennial year he was instrumental in setting up the recorded music section of the archives. And when he himself set up shop in the archives in 1971 he was able to complete, with the help of other knowledgeable record buffs like Jim Kidd, his now-essential book, Roll Back The Years, which includes a detailed history and discography of the Canadian recording industry until 1930.

"I was never able to take working on the book seriously until I came here (to the Archives)" Moogk said in an interview. "Most of the information came from my own program", which, he explained, he researched and wrote himself.

Since the publication of Roll Back in 1975 Moogk has assembled even more information - especially items to fill in the massive, but incomplete discography - about the era preceding 1930. But a lot of that will have to wait until he finishes his current

projects.

The big one he wants to finish is a summary of the history and a complete discography of Canadian recordings from 1930 until the end of the 78-rpm era.

Jim Kidd, whose other identity is station manager of Cornwall's CJSS radio, is working on a discography of the 45 and LP-era of Canadian recording up to the present.

Moogk is interested in records of any era, he stressed; if it seems like he favors older records - and to the youngsters running the industry today that means real old, like 1890-1920 - "it's because the older records are harder to find."

He's also working on a book on the history of Columbia Records in Canada. Columbia, usually one of the top three record companies in Canada, throughout the past 80 years, has undergone a number of corporate changes. Columbia (U.S.) at one time owned the Columbia Broadcasting System - but the record division all but went under in 1929. Later, the broadcasting network, still using the Columbia name - which the record company first used in the 1890s - bought the record company and built it up as a subsidiary.

The Columbia Broadcasting Network is now shying away from the Columbia name in favor of the initials CBS, and when they officially dropped the Columbia name from their record labels last year they ended the longest running label name in the record business.

But the subject of most of Moogk's studies has been, and is, the Berliner family. Emile Berliner (who died in 1929) and his

localities have different needs. Each market must be programmed separately and not from a head office (this, of course, doesn't preclude inclusion of network originated or syndicated materials as part of the overall programming mix).

To summarize, responsible radio programming must have a public interest-orientation of which local news, from diverse and competing sources, is the ultimate manifestation.

It's tautological, however, to state that such a lofty and responsible ideal falls far short of its intended goal.

Over the last fifty years, and especially since the advent of formula formats in the mid-fifties by Todd Storz (Omaha) and Gordon McLendon (Dallas), business interests have affected a fundamental redefinition of radio's ultimate objective to the point where it is now: delivering the largest possible audience(s) to the greatest number of advertisers at the highest possible cost per thousand (CPM). In other words, radio has become little more than a marketing sales tool, volitionally and exploitatively bound to the advertiser.

Priorities have, in effect, been reversed. The advertiser is perceived as the customer, the listener is the pandered product and programming is the bait used to attract the product (audiences).

Programming quality, as a result, is not measured in terms of audience satisfaction. Rather, quality is gauged quantitatively in terms of ratings and rate cards, revenues and expenses, profits and, God forbid, losses. Such preponderant preoccupation with non-listener, non-content, non-affect aspects of radio programming certainly demands challenge.

This reversed priority has also resulted in a socially dysfunctional homogenization of radio formats. My research has revealed that eight formats currently account for 96% of all radio programming in North America (RPM, 11/09/76: pages 25 & 27), of which six are tailored to snare the 18-49 age-group; five are bait for the 25-49 age-group.

What about those under 18 and over 49? Are they to be ignored? or peripherally serviced? Granted, under 18s are not really economically active and since they're in various stages of indoctrination into the rock-pop-pubescence-courtship music genre, they are, to some extent, serviced by Top Forty formats and day-parted rock. The over 49s, on the other hand, are economically very active and they're the fastest growing segment of the Canadian population. I wonder how long it will take radio to devise, organize and implement new formats designed to attract the 50+ listener once advertisers decide to go after them?

The most cogent reflection of this reversed priority is readily apparent in the succession order to top management. Seldom is an orderly transition planned. In most instances, the sales manager or a salesperson slips into the exiting general manager's chair, thereby assuring continuation of the reversed priority. Programming and news people are usually overlooked as potential station managers. They are, after all, more concerned with public service

whereas sales people are goal-oriented revenue generators.

But, we can't forget the reality of the situation. Radio is, after all, a business. It has to profit in order to survive and grow. Stations, therefore, must attract and hold sizable audiences. But must this be done at the expense of the listener? Must all formats be tailored to one demographic segment? This is the crux of the argument!!!! Is there not some profit growth rate which is compatible with a high level of quality public service. Radio management, at some point, must decide to forego ever-increasing profits in exchange for responsible public interest-oriented programming. The equilibrium must be found.

What's particularly interesting, is when one starts to think about the stations that do programme in the public interest it's always the number one stations (in both profits and audience numbers) that come to mind. They have the broadest demographic-cohort variable profile of any station in their market. Their time, when available, is sold at a premium. Their audiences are passionately loyal.

In my opinion, radio must stress public interest programming. Sales must serve as a secondary function supportive of radio's central purpose. This is a stance which requires a lot of guts on the part of management. It's much easier to opt for the tangible (profits) than for the intangible (public interest programming). Few managers are really up to it. So it's necessary that broadcasters, in general, take note of the gravity of the situation and act. As with all pollution issues, the government will eventually step-in, if self-regulation is ignored or bypassed.

When the government does get into the act, it will prove, as it did with the FM Policy, that public interest-oriented programming is a viable product which will attract sizable audiences who will, in turn, interest advertisers. While this doesn't seem all that terrible, consider the connotative implication: you will have willingly yielded part of your right to programme your station as you wish. And that's not very appealing.

That's the way I see it, how about you.

son Herbert built an independent record company in Canada that dominated most subsidiaries of the U.S. giants here for decades - especially in the field of Canadian recording.

After Emile's death, Herbert Berliner became the most prominent individual in the Canadian recording business, and in Moogk's opinion, his individual influence has been surpassed by no one.

After building the Berliner dynasty, before it became Victor (later RCA) Canada, Herbert set up the Compo Corporation - without a doubt the biggest Canadian-owned record company ever.

How did he do it?

Moogk says: "Because he was a smart businessman, he liked records and he was

a bit of a ham when it came to entertainment himself. He contributed a number of things to his own labels: Two Black Crows, he even sang a vocal chorus on an Apex Record - not very well, but he got away with it - and he conducted a concert orchestra in Montreal once. He also was a composer; he composed a patriotic song during the First World War."

In the post-1930 era of the Canadian recording industry, Berliner's Compo Corporation moved into first place among Canadian record companies. Actually it was 'between' Canadian record companies as RCA (who had purchased Victor and its Canadian subsidiary in 1929) was the only other major operating in 1930 and the only label other than Berliner's to survive the depression here.

RCA's corporate bosses, under David Sarnoff, were radio people and in the early '30s let the activities of the firm's record division lapse. At one point there were only two employees of RCA Canada's record division.

Business at Compo boomed when Berliner contracted the pressing and distribution of the growing Decca line of records in 1935. Decca, a British company, had shaken up the popular music business when they introduced a budget-priced line of records - 35 cents a piece or three for a dollar compared to the then standard list price range of 65 cents to one dollar apiece.

RCA-Victor started up their budget line on the Bluebird label to compete with Decca, and by the mid-'30s most of their Canadian artists recorded at RCA's Montreal studio - like Wilf Carter and Hank Snow - were on the Bluebird label.

Compo's Apex label grew into the 1940s, recording mostly French Canadian artists. Compo's English-language line in the '40s centred around the booming radio and recording career of Don Messer and His Islanders.

In the late '30s Columbia Broadcasting purchased the floundering Columbia Records company and Sparton Records in Canada picked up the licencing arrangement here. Sparton pressed and distributed the Columbia catalog until 1950, when Columbia Records of Canada was set up. After that Sparton pressed and distributed the ABC-Paramount line here. Sparton also recorded some Canadian artists on its Sparton label.

Capitol Records started up in the 1940s and were pressed and sold in Canada through Regal Records of London, Ontario. In the early '40s Quality Records was formed to distribute a number of independent Canadian labels that sprung up in the post depression years.

Starr Records, a U.S. firm (the first label pressed by Compo in the '20s), got out of the record business in the '40s, but Berliner kept the label's name for much of Compo's French Canadian product.

But piecing all of this history together is not new for Moogk. He's been collecting records since he was four years old; records from his own 40,000 record personal collection (including 5,000 Canadian discs) are the basis of the Archives' Canadian record division.

And piecing the later history together

couldn't be anywhere near as difficult as reconstructing the events and discography of the early years - when companies re-recorded entire catalogues, often with different artists, to keep up with technical improvements, and often retaining the catalog numbers of the earlier releases.

It was a time when label errors were numerous - "Being part of history," Moogk commented, "never really entered anybody's mind then."

Doug Watters memorial show slated for Hayloft

A special July 10 memorial benefit show is being organized in memory of Doug Watters former lead guitarist of the Blue Diamonds who was killed June 8 in an automobile accident outside his home town of Plaster Rock, New Brunswick. The show will take place at the Hayloft in Markham, Ontario, just north of Toronto.

Slated to appear on the show are RCA artists Carroll Baker and Myrna Lorrie, Condor artists Diane Leigh and Roy MacCaull, Cheyenne artist Sherry Black, Andy Greatrix, George Pasher, and Gary Hooper, and CHOO radio's (Ajax) Bill Johnson and Ron Naugel. The show is being organized by Hooper, with time and space being donated by the Hayloft. Admission is \$3.50 for adults, \$2.50 for children 12 and under.

Proceeds will go to Watters' family.

The Blue Diamonds were a Marathon label recording group with roughly ten albums to their credit at the time of their split-up, two or three years ago. At that time, members Watters and MacCaull remained in Toronto to pursue individual careers. Watters had recorded solo albums as well on Marathon.

The Marathon label was acquired by Lonnie Salazar about two years ago. Salazar acquired Condor Records at the same time, and amalgamated the two labels together under the Condor banner. Among the Marathon artists joining Condor at that time were MacCaull, Leigh, Dick Damron, Smiley Bates and Ray Francis.

Peg's Neptune label readies new releases

Neptune Records, whose offices are in Winnipeg, reports that no fewer than four releases will be announced shortly. Included in the label's itinerary is the release of 5th Avenue Cowboy, the title track single from Dennis T. Olsen's upcoming Sunflower International album. The single should be available shortly.

Jimmy Blease has a single that will be released in early July. Titled (I Sing) Julie, release is on the Sunflower label.

Charlie Gregoire, Ron Paley, and Tim Thorney are also scheduled for individual releases in the near future.

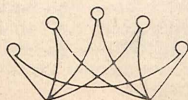

Heather Haig's back up musicians have re-named their band. They're now billed as Sweet Feet.

Jim Allison's Thunderbird label is getting its act together with a solid hit from Roger Quick. It's one of Roger's own tunes, Turn On Country, and the way Big Jim tells the story it most certainly is. Meanwhile, another of Thunderbird's acts is picking up much airplay. Dusty Roads are on the air in many markets with their latest single, I'm Waiting For A Train.

That super-looking lady, Chris Nielsen, gives her Royalty record sales a big push with a personal appearance in Calgary at

the Chinook Shopping Center during Stampede week. I'd Love You Like Nobody Ever Dared To, Chris' new single, has been playing steadily on most stations from one end of this country to another. Chris then teams up with R. Harlan Smith at the Bar K in Saskatoon.

U.A.'s Dave Deeley has himself another bid for the top ten with the latest Crystal Gayle single, Don't It Make My Brown Eyes Blue. He got immediate airplay for Crystal's new hit-in-the-making on CFGM. More hot product from U.A. has to be Dottie West's debut set under that banner. Not to mention the continuing super hit action on Kenny Rogers' product, both the single Lucille, and the album from whence it came. A translated version of the tune has been released on the French-language market. It's by Tex LeCor on Gamma.

The same fellas who gave you Uncle Tom and Whistle On The River, Doug Ballard and Don Cochrane, are getting their songwriting team back into high gear. This time they will augment the collaboration with Doug's wife, Pat, and the third member of their vocal group, The Ballards, Cyril Rawson.

Expect new material from another pair of collaborators shortly. Both stars in their own right, Tim Daniels and Leroy Anderson have been recently pooling their talents to turn out some new country hits.

Tim's singing of the National Anthems at the Bluejay ballgame against the Yankees the other night, prompted this remark from CFGM's Dave Johnson on the air the next day. After the Bluejays surprised everyone, themselves included, by beating the New Yorkers, Dave said, "it could be that Tim Daniels will become to the Bluejays what Kate Smith is to the Philadelphia Flyers."

Michael T. Wall and Sam The Record Man staged another super-successful Newfoundland Day at a Toronto shopping Mall recently. Michael T. reports that they are already well into the planning stages for another renewal of the big show come next June.

Great reviews, for the most part, out of the west in connection with the recent tour by Carroll Baker, Ronnie Prophet and Dickey Lee, supported by Sheila Ann and her band from Regina's Pump. Rene Iles in the Winnipeg Tribune had high praise for both Ronnie and Carroll. He called Ronnie's performance "country-slick". With respect to Carroll, Iles wrote: "... The lady is dynamite. Her forty minute set was non-stop, all-stops-out entertainment."

The Waterford Lakes Bluegrass Festival, set for the July 15th weekend, appears to be one of the most star-studded shows of this sort to be staged anywhere this season. Among the performers that weekend at Waterford will be Lester Flatt and Nashville Grass. The Good Brothers, The Country Gentlemen, Jim And Jesse, Dixie Flyers, Graham Townsend and the Humber River Valley Boys.

Producer of the George Hamilton IV TV series, Manny Pittson, forwards a very interesting letter from a British journalist, Graham Walker. Walker bemoans the fact that he is unable to buy records by either Lynn Jones or Cathie Stewart in England.

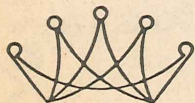

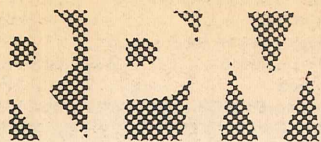
