

MAPLE LEAF SYSTEM CALLS TALKS WITH TOP RECORD EXECS

Toronto: The powerhouse of 12 member radio stations and 2 associate member stations known as the Maple Leaf System have invited record executives of Canadian record companies (most of which are U.S. owned) to participate in talks aimed at improving the effectiveness of the MLS. Although only in operation a short two months, the MLS have proven they are, indeed, powerful, and they can bring attention to the Canadian recording industry.

Chairman of the MLS, J. Robert Wood, program co-ordinator for radio station CHUM, Toronto, has reported excellent reaction by record companies towards the proposed meeting. The meeting has been set at 10 AM in the Stuart Room of the Ports of Call in downtown Toronto, It's rumoured that executives of some of the U.S. parent companies have also shown interest in the MLS and may, in fact, attend the meeting. It's also expected that members of Canadian government commissions (Canadian Radio Television Commission among others) and members of those committees investigating certain aspects of radio, copyright laws etc. will be in attendance, along with members of the trade press.

Purpose of the talks will be to feel out the attitude of record companies with regard to the MLS and to learn something of their plans in the field of Canadian pop music recordings. The System is particularly interested in what is being done by the record companies to:

- 1. Increase the output
- 2. Up-grade the quality
- 3. Improve distribution and promotion
- 4. Search out new talent.

Record companies will, no doubt, take the opportunity to air some of their complaints. There have been grumblings as to the disinterest by some member radio stations in Canadian recordings. Some record companies have been discouraged to find those member stations who are giving little or no play to records "picked" by the System. Noted one observer; "Their

batting average to date puts them in the bush leauge. They seem to think all the strikes are against us (the record companies). If they pick three records, they should make damn sure these records get top exposure instead of complaining about the quality of the product". It was originally planned that those records "picked" by the MLS could, if an "A" record receive up to 8 plays per day and if it were a "B" record (after 6 PM), up to 5 plays per day. Most record companies will agree that the MLS attempts to create hits have met with little success, if any success at all, but at the same time, the record companies inability to develop a strong production schedule will make any record company argument - weak.

There are those on both sides however, who feel that the MLS is far too new to judge its effectiveness. What it has accomplished in its two months is excellent press — nationally and internationally — individual editorializing by member stations to their listeners, about the subject, and, it has increased interest by

some, not all, of the record companies. Record productions have increased, particularly those from independent producers. The influx of U.S. talent scouts has also increased which led one observer to note; "If U.S. producers are becoming that interested in Canadian talent, then it's a good sign the MLS will succeed, but, unfortunately, only because of foreign interest".

One of the most important aspects of the meeting however, will be the breakthrough of the communication gap that has persisted for many years between top record execs and radio management. It is hoped they will come up with hard and fast rules to making the MLS a co-op of ideas and participation from both sides. The Maple Leaf System was a bold new move that has brought national and international attention to the Canadian broadcasters. A team effort of record companies and radio stations would also be a bold move with both carrying the ball to the development of a powerful Canadian recording industry which could add significantly to the Canadian economy.

CANADIAN INVASION STAGE ONE

The Canadian music industry celebrated a new high this week when the Canadian 100 Hits showed strong indication that Canadian content records were finding their place in the sun.

Number one for the second week on the RPM 100 was the Andy Kim recording of "Baby I Love You". The disc is showing a similar trend in the U.S. trade. Number two on the RPM 100 was "Laughing" by the Guess Who which is also in the top ten internationally. Number three in Canada is "When I Die" which is making leaps and bounds up the international charts. All three records are sufficiently Canadian content to indicate that the Canadian talent explosion is well on its way.

The recording of "When I Die" is outstanding, since it is practically wholly Canadian content.

Further indication of a strong Canadian trend on the charts is the fact that "Canadian Pacific" by George Hamilton which is only slightly Canadian in content is No. 9 on the RPM 100 and in conjunction with this single is an LP by the same title which features all Canadian compositions.

"Give Peace A Chance" by the Plastic

One Band on Apple was originally recorded in the Queen Elizabeth Hotel in Montreal and with the engineering and production guidance of Montreal's highly regarded Andre Perry. This record is No. 11 in the Canadian ratings.

More and more ingredients in internationally accepted records are wholly Canadian. The turning point will come when a 100% Canadian content record achieves international recognition.

Foreign talent scouts are today making regular trips to Canada in the search for talent, and at least two record companies in Canada have announced plans to expand their domestic production in view of the outstanding interest in the Canadian record scene.

Five years ago when RPM began to wage the battle of Canadian content, it was hard to believe that it would take this long for Canadians to gain the necessary confidence in themselves.

The advent of the new Maple Leaf System might eventually add even more impetus to the growing interest in records that achieve recognition first in Canada and then throughout the world. Such an achievement would be a feather in the cap of Canadian broadcasters.

CANADIAN APPEARANCES FOR JAMES LAST

Montreal: James Last, who has released a sizeable and successful library of album product and who has become the mainstay of the Polydor label, has been scheduled for several appearances in Canada. His first set of engagements will be at Montreal's Man And His World.



August 22 through the 24th. An August 25 date has been set for Toronto for two shows followed by a Bingeman Park date in Kitchener (26).

Last was born in Bremen, Germany in 1929 and from the age of nine became a top student of music, mastering the piano and double bass.

C-FOX INTEGRATES FRENCH DISCS

Montreal: A report filed by David Brodeur, promotion manager, Quebec Sales for Quality Records, reveals that radio station C-FOX has added three French records to its playlist for the past two months, playing one every three hours on a rotating basis. This move is meeting with mixed reaction. Frank Gould, music director at C-FOX advises that the French play was made to acknowledge the French presence in the city and at the station. The comments have been generally favourable. However, the only unfavourable variety would appear to be from French Canadian listeners who insist they are not tuning in English rock shows to listen to French records.

Part French programming was apparently introduced to the English Canadian listener, four years ago, by Tom Deachman while he was music director at CKGM-FM, and has always amintained that an English station has to program French records to build up a French following which would lead to top ratings.

His policy of French play was reportedly responsible for much of the success of CFGM-FM which placed No. 2 in the overall rating during Deachman's tenure. He has since brought his policy to CFQR-FM and again is sitting in No. 2 spot behind the giant CKVL-FM.

It was in 1955 when he established himself as a composer and arranger in Germany's record capital — Hamburg. Many of Europe's top recording artists received the Last touch including Caterina Valenta, Freddy, Alfred Hause, Helmut Zacharias, and most recently, Canadian George Walker.

It was in 1964 when he signed an exclusive contract as a producer for Polydor Records — and then his popularity throughout Europe, and in particular in the British Isles, began to take hold. A James Last LP release in 1966 remained on the British charts for 46 weeks and each LP release since, of which there are 22, have sold exceptionally well.

Last was relatively unknown in North America until Polydor established a Canadian operation under the general managership of Fred Exon, who, together with his promotion chief Lori Bruner and an enthusiastic network of promotion-minded employees, launched a massive campaign to "LASTICIZE" Canadian record buyers. The campaign was so successful that the Canadian effort spilled over into the U.S. and when Polydor opened a U.S. office just a few short months ago, the demand for Last product was exceptional.

James Last is also well established as an international songwriter, having written "Games That Lovers Play" and "Happy Heart". His latest album "Non Stop Dancing 8"

His latest album "Non Stop Dancing 8" has chalked up impressive sales and is showing as a favourite with radio stations being that it is his first "Non Stop" LP with separated cuts and times for easy programming. The set contains several pop hits of a few weeks ago including "Ob-La-Di Ob-La-Da", "Chewy Chewy", "Those Were The Days" and others.

OLGA FIRMAN TO CMS

Toronto: Newest and prettiest record promotion image belongs to Miss Olga Firman, who has recently been appointed chief promotion and publicity director for Canadian Music Sales. Miss Firman is new to the promotion field but has already displayed an exceptionally keen



sense of promotion awareness in her success with recent releases. The most notable of these being the Dominion LP release of Johnny McEvoy's "With An Eye To Your Ear". McEvoy is currently playing the Golden Nugget in Toronto and drawing capacity houses. Miss Firman has been successfully touting McEvoy and his album with the radio and press resulting in important air exposure and reviews.

QUALITY TO DISTRIBUTE CREWE PRODUCT

Toronto: Quality Records Limited has announced the acquisition rights to the currently very hot Crewe label, for Canada.

Initial single release will be "Jean" by Oliver, an exceptionally strong follow-up to his million selling "Good Morning Starshine", both of which are contained on his LP



"'Oliver". Quality have also released the album across Canada.

"Jean" has now been established as a hit after only one week of release and moves into the #57 birth on the RPM 100 for this week.

The 24 year old native of North Wilkesboro, North Carolina has been tagged Oliver, not to capitalize on the Broadway show from where he has taken a few selections — but because it happens to be his middle name — William Oliver Swofford.

Oliver had been with several groups including the Virginians and the Good Earth before going it alone. His producer, Bob Crewe, suggested he give "Good Morning Starshine" from the hit musical "Hair" a try and together they came up with his first and a million selling single.

Oliver's first LP contains three of his own compositions; "The Arrangement", "Can't You See", and "Let Me Kiss You With A Dream". Also included on the album are compositions by Joni Mitchell, Mick Jagger, Keith Richards and Rod McKuen. It was the latter's "Jean" from the movie "The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie" which caught the ear of most reviewers and obviously that of hitmaker Crewe, resulting in same being released as a single.

It's expected that with the guidance of Bob Crewe, Oliver will become a standout as a solo artist, within the year. One observer noted "If an artist is fortunate to receive the touch of gold from Crewe, his future is secure in the business".

LIFE RELEASES IN UK

Montreal: Lori Bruner, promo chief for Polydor Records Canada Ltd. has received news of the UK release of "Hands Of The Clock" by the Montreal based Life. The single is to be released on the Polydor label.

Life are already experiencing good chart action across Canada and move into the No. 19 position on the RPM 100, this week.

U.S. action on the single has also been encouraging with good sales action being registered along the U.S. Atlantic seaboard.

POLYDOR'S FREE TO TORONTO CIRCUS

Toronto: Polydor's latest recording unit, Free, signed into the Electric Circus (7-10) and found themselves smack in the middle of a crowd that was appreciative of their excitement with blue-eyed soul — with a difference. Their sound is of an individual nature and one hopes they would be more definitive but in the end




the Free sound has completely **enveloped** your senses. The Free could play a totally blues show but stand out as being a non-blues sound but not so foreign as to attract resentment. They've got a hankering for blues but a commercial delivery that widens their scope immensely.

Paul Rodgers, lead vocal; Simon Kirke, drums and vocals; Andy Fraser, bass and vocals; and Paul Kossoff, lead guitar, the four Britishers who make up Free are now on their way to join Blind Faith on the U.S. west coast. They'll play Oakland, Santa Barbara, Houston, San Antonio, Salt Lake City and Phoenix before heading for home. Their follow-up LP expected to be released in the fall will contain all original material by the group's writing team of Fraser/Rodgers. Next release for the group is a single "I'm A Mover" to be culled from their current LP.

Siebert Brothers Tape Stampede LP

Calgary: Off in time to catch some of the after action from the Calgary Stampede is the Siebert Brothers' Banff LP "Rodeo Action". Recorded at Stereo Sound Studios in Montreal and produced by Rodeo's Dougal Trineer, the set includes several Lenny Siebert pennings including "Crazy Me" and "I Never Had It So Good".

The Sieberts have been together as a performing team since 1948 and from their hometown of Calgary have garnered a sizeable national and international following. They have appeared regularly at the Stampede and have had their own CBC-TV network show, as well as successful appearances in Las Vegas and across Canada.



RCA ARTISTS TO PLAY OTTAWA EX

Ottawa: With all the pop and folk festivals now exploiting the teen entertainment dollar, the Central Exhibition in Ottawa has, in co-operation with RCA, devised a scheme that will provide top entertainment and leave enough money for patrons to purchase records of the performers — after the show.

This entertainment package provided by the Central Canada Exhibition Association's youth program "Where It's At" and RCA, is unique in Canada and could possibly set a future trend in festivals and exhibitions.

For the first time, the CCE will be open on Sundays and to help make Sunday August 24 successful, a special grandstand show will be presented. For the price of fifty cents per person, upwards of 50,000 young people will be able to see seven top RCA recording acts. For those who like folk music there's Alistair and Linda, currently happening with their Nimbus 9 single "No One There To Love Me"along with two new and exciting Canadian discoveries lan Oliver and Nora, from Hamilton and David Bradstreet, who was discovered and signed on the spot at the Mariposa Festival by John Pozer, executive assistant to RCA's vice president. Also for the folk buff is a well known Boston folksinger Eric Erickson,

Those preferring the soul music sound will witness the first Canadian appearance of Carolyn Franklin and her 7 piece orchestra. Carolyn has written several of her sister Aretha's big hits.

For the rock fans there's another new Canadian discovery: The Noblemen featuring Harry Youngs. This group is from the Lakehead. RCA's 13 piece Lighthouse have also been included on the bill.

To highlight the big show, the featured hosts will be Mickey Dolenz and Mike Nesmith,

Lone Pine Treatment, "Squid Jiggin' Ground"

Montreal: "Squid Jiggin' Ground", one of the top favourites from the Atlantic Provinces but rarely given professional disc treatment, bows this week on the Rodeo International label by Hal Lone Pine.

Lone Pine, who has been in the Rodeo fold for several years has consistently come up with good sellers due, in part, to the hectic pace he sets for touring throughout the U.S. and Canada. His version of the A.R. Scammell composition keeps him in the country bag which adds interest to the song, usually performed in the down easter' folk style.

The flip, "Prince Edward Island Is Heaven To Me" which was written by Harold Breau and regarded by most Spud Islanders as their anthem, will also create interest with Hal Lone Pine Fans. of the Monkees.

Last year "Where It's At" was named by the Canadian Association of Fairs and Exhibitions as the best youth presentation of its kind in North America. It would appear that the organization has a headstart in capturing this title once more.

If the grandstand show is not enough to capture the award then the merits of the rest of the ten days of entertainment scheduling should make up for whatever may be missing. A Tent-O-Teque will be rocking for a solid ten days to the sounds of the Friends of Dis-

tinction, Tyme and A Half, Carolyn Franklin, and RCA's top international group, The Guess Who, who will appear Monday Aug 25. Another Canadian group, the Copperpenny from Kitchener and who recently signed to Nimbus 9, will appear at the Teen Pavilion Wed Aug 27.

The co-operation between RCA and "Where It's At" is the type of promotion that should prove beneficial to all involved. The consumer will be able to enjoy top entertainment at an inexpensive fee leaving him with enough money to direct to other forms of the entertainment industry. This will also lead to further spending on album and single product by the artists they have just enjoyed.

HIT MAKING MADE EASY the airplay has created.

Judging by the number of records that come out in a week, throughout the world, it is a natural assumption that record companies live with the fact that when a record is released, it goes out into the trade to show its ability to become a hit (after a certain amount of promotion and advertising). This indicates to me that there

is no set formual of what a hit is. The tastes of a large group of reviewers make the final decision. By the time a record is charted, its potential is so well proven, that the sales will result naturally from the "snowballing" effect

After a record is produced, the record company presses the product and sends copies out to radio stations. In a short period of time the record might be picked by a music director who airs it considerably and the record distributor, feeling a reaction, reports its sale, As the regional breakout is reported, other stations program it until it finally gets picks in so many areas, it automatically gets a preferred pick or a chart listing in the trade publications. Few people realize that many records are not submitted for trade publication review until they have been out for sometime and have attained some prominence. Some records are released and get so little action, they are never submitted for trade review.

What becomes very important to a new record by a new artist is a regional breakout that will start the ball rolling. Often, trade paper ads tell the story of a record that sold 10,000 in two days in a certain region. They are making the trade aware that the record has

sales potential. Those sales had to be the result of airplay in that region. Nothing else would move 10,000 buyers to go into a record store and ask for the record. Certainly not a newspaper ad or a fan club drive. Once a record has shown that it has regional appeal ("Where's it happening, Baby?") the trade will take enough interest to give the record a listen and possibly give it airplay.

To the record man, any action, no matter how slight "helps". The accumulation of these bits of action finally can result in a hit.

The anatomy of a hit is really an interesting subject that very seldom gets discussed outside the seminars for record men. It is too often an assumption that hits are made the day a radio station sees their trade listings. Often, weeks before that, a record by a new artist has already made the grade in half a dozen regions. If the act is already established, the routine isn't the same, because the group is "established".

COUNTRY BOY SIMMS TO GRT

Belleville: Jimmy Simms, Canada's country singing marathon walker, is soaring to great heights with his hit single "Shoes Keep On Walking" — particularly in the Belleville area

The Ben Kerr composition is currently in the No. 7 position on the CJBQ charts and "headed for the top", according to Dick Lovering, popular Belleville country radio personality.

Dick is also predicting that "Shoes" could be the biggest Canadian record in 1969.

Simms was first introduced to the Belleville area a few months ago when he headlined the Trent Valley Jamboree in Stirling, Ont.

The handsome young man with the warm smile and the fancy red suit proved an immediate hit with the crowd and Jack McCaughen and Ken Stapley, who produce the Jamboree, wasted no time in inviting him to come back again.

This time Simms returned with a new record in his hand, and a certificate to prove that he'd walked in the 32 mile "Miles For Millions" charity walk-a-thon in Toronto.

Monday (4) Simms once again proved to be the top country attraction in the Belleville area when he performed to two packed houses



in the Tamworth arena.

Next on the agenda for Jimmy Simms in the Belleville area is another marathon walk for charity.

This is one of several charity walks Simms will be participating in prior to starting his 900 mile walk from Toronto to Nashville, Tenn, to sing "Shoes Keep On Walking" on the Grand Ole Opry.

It has been announced that Simms will be a featured performer on the GRT "Record Launch" on the Lake Ontario cruise (Aug 12) which launches GRT's entry into the Canadian recording business. GRT have negotiated with Sparton of Canada and will be releasing several of these Sparton artists on the new GRT label.

FIDDLERS' CONTEST IN 19th YEAR

Shelburne, Ont: August 8 and 9 saw fiddle fans from across Canada and the U.S. flocking to this small Ontario town (pop. 1499) to create its yearly traffic jam and take in the nineteenth annual Canadian Open Championship Old Time Fiddlers' Contest sponsored jointly by the CBC and the Rotary Club of Shelburne.

The first day was set aside for the playdowns in each class: novelty; championship; 65 and over; 18 and under; 12 and under; and ladies. The big night was Saturday when the finals took place in the community arena. The CBC broadcast these finals on the entire radio network August 9 at 11:03 PM EDT.

Hosting the big event was Canada's top country/variety emcee "Cousin Clem" (known at home as Gordie Tapp), with an assist from Bill Bessev.

Johnny Burke and the Caribou Show Band made their first appearance, and featured Ollie Strong, steel guitarist, who has become nationally famous through his appearances on the "Tommy Hunter" TVer. The Caribou group play regularly at Toronto's Caribou Club, an after hours country club.

The contest committee, each year, designates a special salute to some person or persons connected with the contest. This year they saluted Vince Mountford, who's been

master of ceremonies for the playdowns since 1952. Special recognition of his contribution over the years was made on the broadcast.

Edgar Goodaire, who was on the first program in 1951 was at the piano. He's a regular accompanist for the Carl Tapscott Mixed Choir on CBC radio's "Songs Of Faith"

Producer for the Finals broadcast was John Cantelon, who took over last year from Reid Forsee who was killed in an auto accident in March of 1968.

The contest was organized as a charitable venture from the beginning with proceeds going to Rotary-endorsed projects. To date, over \$100,000 has been raised and donated to charity.

Of particular interest this year is the entry of Graham Townsend, World Championship Folk Fiddler, who has taken top honours at the Shelburne event for the past three years. Speculation has it that this will be the last year Townsend will enter the Contest. With three years running as champion with a possible fourth it's highly unlikely that this record will ever be broken. Townsend records for Banff Records (Rodeo) and is currently chalking up good sales with his LP release "I Like Don Messer".

CHARLEBOIS RELEASES ON SIRE

Montreal: Daniel Lazare of Gamma Records reports the release of Robert Charlebois' "Lindbergh" single and the album, both of which became top sellers in Quebec and in Europe, on the Sire label for distribution in the U.S.

"Lindbergh" has now been released throughout Europe and in Mexico. Arrangements are also being negotiated for releases in South America and Israel.

The Charlebois single is reported to have sold more than 100,000 copies in France alone, and has been released in Italy where it is the theme song of a television series.
